4-H'ers Ride At County Horse Show

Leadership, initiative, self-reliance, sportsmanship – these are character traits Yankton County 4-H members learn in the 4-H horse program.

On Saturday, June 27, 2015, Yankton County 4-H members within the horse program displayed these traits and many others at the County 4-H Horse Show.

The show began at 9 a.m. at the Pine Acres 4-H Grounds in Yankton with a Pleasure Driving Class. Eleven-year-old Mackenzie Steinbrecher directed her pony Doozie to pull the cart she was sitting in around at various speeds and in different directions. Mackenzie received a purple ribbon – the top ribbon placing available — for her efforts. It was the first of many purple ribbons awarded that day.

The horse show continued with Showmanship Classes, where youth show their horses while leading them on the ground. The 4-H member is judged based on how well they can control their horse and present their horse so the judge can evaluate its confirmation and appearance.

Various performance classes followed Showmanship. The Equitation, Western Riding, Reining and Trail

Classes recognize the 4-H member's ability to ride a horse correctly and to use various aids required for a horse to perform basic maneuvers.

During each class, the 4-H member guides their horse through a specific pattern

that the judge has chosen. The speed events closed the day. Beginner riders could participate in Flag Racing. All of the 4-H members could participate in Barrel Racing and Pole Bending.

This year, Yankton County 4-H had two 4-H members participate in Break-Away Roping. Levi and Josh Heckenlaible both tried their luck

at throwing a rope around a steer's horns or head. If they were successful and the steer's head passed through the loop, once the rope was drown tight it would break from its connection on the 4-H member's saddle. Levi missed his throw, resulting in a no-time for this event. Josh made his throw at a time of 30.09 seconds.

The purpose of the 4-ri Horse Program is to help the 4-H member: develop desirable traits of character; experience the pride and responsibility of having an equine and learning about its care, feeding, management, and related costs; and appreciate horseback riding as a healthy and wholesome form of recreation.

4-H members gain skill in horsemanship, patience and understanding when humanely handling horses and ponies and will nurture a greater love for animals. They acknowledge safety precautions to prevent injuries to themselves, others, and horses. They prepare for citizenship responsibilities by working together in

groups and supporting community horse projects and activities.
