CROFTON, Neb. - Before the sound of fireworks popping behind the outfield fence, Rand Thygeson had the catcher's mitt popping at home plate.

Gordon, a three-time Daytona 500 winner, announceď in January he plans to retire from full-time racing and become part of Fox's broadcasting crew in 2016.


