SD Begins Implementing Juvenile Justice Changes

In recent years, South Dakota has incarcerated juveniles at the second-highest rate in the nation, often because the system lacks alternatives, according to state officials.

Seven of 10 juvenile incarcerations are the result of misdemeanor offenses, children in need of supervision (CHINS) violations and probation violations.

These commitments cost South Dakota as much as \$144,000 per youth per year. Currently, more than 40 percent of juveniles released from the Department of Corrections (DOC) return to state custody within three years.

However, the 2015 Legislature's passage of Senate Bill 73 – known as the Juvenile Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JJRI) – will give the courts new options. As a result, incarceration and detention would be used for serious offenders. Juveniles with minor offenses can be placed in community-based and diversion programs.

Gov. Dennis Daugaard called the bill "ground-breaking legislation."

"Senate Bill 73 represents an important step forward for juvenile justice in South Dakota," he said in a news release. "The passage of this bill will lead to less

World Cup Win A Triumph For Yankton Soccer

Last Sunday, the U.S. soccer team defeated defending champ Japan in a 5-2 victory in this year's Women's World Cup. This victory made USA the first team in history to win three women's World Cups.

A victory for USA also meant a victory for Yankton soccer. The Yankton Youth Soccer Association (YYSA) hosted a World Cup watch party fundraiser at Czeckers Bar & Grill for each of the seven American matches. Players, parents and community members gathered to watch the U.S. make history for a good cause.

"There were a lot of current soccer player and their families (there); from our younger teams to high school players," said YYSA president Deb Lillie.

Czeckers agreed to donate \$1 for each order of three select menu items during the matches each night of the seven games, including chicken tenders, wings and cheese balls. Soccer fans ordered just under 500 of those menu items.

"Dinner & World Cup' is about coming together as a soccer community, having some fun, cheering on Team USA and raising a little money for sanctioning soccer along the way," said YYSA Sponsorship Board member Sondra Jensen.

In addition to the money Czeckers donated, YYSA volunteers had donation buckets available where many fans left tips for YYSA.

At the end of the final game, the soccer team earned an estimated \$750, including food orders and individual donations.

"It was really nice to see former players that are back in town," Lillie said. "Some of them had big families that were down there several times."

This money will go toward providing the funding necessary to keep soccer a sanctioned sport with the school board.
