BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were higher Friday in early trading on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery was 3 cents to \$5.81 a bushel; September corn was 4 cents higher at \$4.3260 a bushel; December oats were unchanged at \$2.6775 bushel; while November soybeans gained 9.60 cents at 10.1575 cents a bushel.

Beef was lower and pork higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle was .75 cent lower at \$1.4875 a pound; August feeder cattle was .10 cent lower at \$2.1165 a pound; August lean hogs gained .80 cent to \$.7408 a pound.

U.S. stocks gained Friday as Greece moved closer to sealing a deal for new loans from its creditors. European markets also rose sharply. China's stock market climbed for a second day, reversing course after a monthlong slump.

Be On Guard Against Heat-Related Illness

LINCOLN, Neb. — High temperatures combined with high humidity can increase the potential for heat-related illness according to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

The risk for heat-related illness and death is higher for infants and the elderly, whose internal thermostats do not regulate body temperature well. People with chronic medical conditions, outdoor workers and people who exercise outside are also at increased risk.

Stay cool and help prevent heat-related illness by following these tips:

- Drink plenty of water and don't wait until you are thirsty to drink.
- Avoid alcohol and limit drinks with caffeine.
- Wear loose, light-colored clothing and sunscreen (SPF 15 or higher).
- Never leave children
- Try to limit your outdoor activity to morning and evening hours. If you don't have air conditioning, go to a public building where you can cool off.
- Electric fans may provide comfort, but when temperatures reach the high 90s, fans won't prevent heat-related illness. Take a cool shower or bath or move to an air-conditioned place.
- Check on elderly friends and neighbors. Make sure they're staying cool and hydrated.

Heat exhaustion can develop following exposure for several days to high temperatures. Symptoms include rapid heartbeat, cold, pale clammy skin, nausea, dizziness, weakness and fatigue.

Heatstroke, the most serious heat-related illness, is a medical emergency characterized by a body temperature of 103 degrees F or greater. Symptoms include hot, red skin, rapid heartbeat, shallow breathing, disorientation, delirium and coma.

Anyone suffering from these conditions should be moved into the shade or air conditioning. If heatstroke or serious heat exhaustion is suspected, get emergency medical assistance.

SDHHC Announces 2015 Statewide Homeless Count Results

PIERRE — The 2015 Statewide Point in Time Homeless Count that was conducted on Jan. 27, 2015, revealed that 1,036 individuals were homeless in South Dakota. This number represents a 17 percent increase from the 2014 count of 885 individuals.

Sixty-one percent were adults over the age of 24; 26 percent were children under 18; and 13 percent were adults 18 to 24 years of age. Eighty-seven percent were sheltered on the night of the count, either in emergency shelter, transitional housing or motels being paid for by a non-profit. Thirteen percent were unsheltered on the night of the count. Unsheltered includes the street, vehicles or places not meant for human habitation.

The Point in Time Homeless Count was conducted by the South Dakota Housing for the Homeless Consortium (SDHHC) in collaboration with community agencies and homeless service providers. The statewide, one-day count was a snapshot of people experiencing homelessness.

To further define the snapshot of homelessness of the 1,036 counted in January, 17 percent were veterans, 81 percent were individuals, 17 percent were households with children and two percent were unaccompanied children.

To establish strategic goals and objectives to address homelessness in South Dakota, the South Dakota Housing for the Homeless Consortium has drafted a Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness. SDHHC is currently asking for the public's review and comments with community meetings being held during July.

School Board To Meet Monday

Details of a comprehensive facilities study are set for discussion at the Yankton School Board meeting to be held this Monday night.

At June's School Board meeting, discussion was held during the Crane Youngworth/Williams Field presentation about an interest by school board members to not only consider this project, but to also take a much broader look at district facility needs.

These considerations will have to align with the five-year strategic capital outlay plan. Similar to the public meetings and surveys regarding the Crane Youngworth project, the same community input will be made available to all patrons regarding a possible comprehensive facilities study.

Topics also to be discussed Monday include changes made to the YHS online curriculum policy, setting the 2015-2016 in-state tuition rate and discussing the standards, criteria and procedures of teacher evaluations.

The Yankton School District has also been approached by patrons regarding the possibility of the YSD also providing bus transportation to students in the Gayville-Volin School District. That issue is scheduled to be discussed.

The Yankton School Board will hold its regularly scheduled meeting on Monday, July 13 at 5:30 pm at the district administration building located at 2410 West City Limits Road.

City Commission To Meet Monday

The Yankton City Commission will address and discuss a proposal to hire a radio consultant as part of new business during Monday night's meeting.

Police mobile and portable radios, as well as 911 radio consoles, need to be upgraded and the City is proposing outside assistance in finding the best coverage.

Monday's meeting will also include a special presentation by Yankton Police Department (YPD) Chief Brian Paulsen and Lt. Todd Brandt. Paulsen and Brandt will recognize and present awards to detective Stewart Bass, Bryan Davis and Levi and Martin Rohde. The four individuals, during their time off, reacted to an incident on the river last week that could have ended fatally had they not acted.

The commission meets Monday at 7 p.m. at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St.

Recycling Center Accepts Glass For Free

The Yankton Transfer and Recycling Center is now accepting glass for free.

The following types of glass will be accepted:

- All colors of glass bottles and jars that are emptied, rinsed, and free of contaminants; labels and lids may remain on the jars.
- Drinking glasses and vases.
- Unpainted plate glass (windows) as long as the framing is removed (just the glass).

The following will not be accepted: Borosilicate lab glass; Windshields or safety glass; Ceramic or porcelain; Leaded crystal and Pyrex.

Bring all glass to the Recycle Center at 1200 W. 23rd St. for disposal during normal business hours Monday through Saturday 8 a.m.-3:45 p.m. No glass will be accepted on the city curbside routes.
