Do not blow grass onto the street before the streets are sealed or permit underground irrigation systems to run water onto the streets while the No Parking signs are up. In the event of rain, the process may be postponed.

Traffic will be reduced to one lane during working hours and guided through the project with the use of flaggers and a pilot car and motorists can expect delays up to 10 minutes.


