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At The Levy

County Mulls Tax Tool To Repair Infrastructure

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Large portions of the hundreds of miles of paved roadway, along with many of the vehicles maintaining them in Yankton County, are quickly falling into various states of wear and disrepair — and the County Commission feels it's time to act in the form of a levy authorized by the state Legislature with the passage of Senate Bill 1.

During a public forum to discuss the potential levy, County Commis-

Woods discussed using the law created by Senate Bill 1, which allows the county eligible to raise the necessary funds through a levy, emphasizing the money can't go anywhere else.

sion chairman Todd

"Pierre's given us the opportunity to raise our taxes, and it can only be used for roads and bridges,' Woods said. "It can't be used for

anything else. ... If this levy is something the commissioners pass, it's money that can only be spent on roads and bridges. It can't be spent on something in the sheriff's

office or the auditor's office."

The deadline to pass the levy that can be applied to the 2016 budget is Wednesday and would require a two-thirds majority for passage. There is also an opportunity to refer the levy to the public upon passage. The levy allows a maxi-

School Board Hears Concerns About Facilities

At Monday night's school board meeting, members of the school board and the community expressed their concern with the conditions of school facilities.

With all the discussion concerned with the Crane Youngworth project, the board also expressed concerns about the school facilities. As another school year approaches, the board wants to make sure classroom and learning facilities are being made.

Superintendent Wayne Kindle discussed a similar project that took place eight years ago where the district hired LR Group, a design firm out of Omaha, to do a comprehensive study of the elementary and middle school buildings.

Most of the improvements made during that time were to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 as well as consolidating issues. But the overall architecture of the building was not discussed.

According to Kindle, this project would be much more in-depth by considering the facilities of each of the buildings and discussing what improvements would benefit

the learning environment. 'We know that we have some needs throughout the

other districts and the other buildings," Kindle said. Along with supervisor of

buildings and grounds Chuck Turner, Kindle would continue to work on the scope for the Request for Proposal (RFP) between now and the next board meeting. This would consider what aspects of the facilities would be up for improvements.

Kindle will then present that scope to the board and they will decide on the approval of such a scope and the possibility of opening the RFP up to other design firms. The potential firm would meet with each of the building's administrators and have a discussion about each of the buildings and what individual staff members would like to see as far as improvements.

If the board chooses to move forward, the engineer firm could be hired, do a study and report back to the board on improvement details and cost by February or early March. At that time, a bidding process will take place similar to the Crane Youngworth project.

An outdated radio system and the current coverage with RAYCOM ending soon has led the City of Yankton to consider hiring a radio consultant to assess the best options for upgrade, as discussed during Monday's Yankton City

Commission meeting.
"Trying to identify what the best approach is to take on our radio system (is that it) exceeds our abilities in terms of the technical information – we don't have radio expertise," said city manager Amy Nelson. "We're going to have a major expenditure regardless of how we choose to proceed and (we want) to have an expert take a look

at the coverage, if we would need more towers, all those

The contract with the prospective radio consultant from the Twin Cities is for \$25,452.50 and would include consultation in upgrading 911 radio consoles and mobile and portable radios. The cost would cover the assessment, not the total upgrade.

Yankton Police Chief Brian Paulsen explained the need for an upgraded system, as well as outside expertise.

"Our current radios are 18 years old and what's considered a good lifespan for a portable radio is about 8," he said. "We've doubled
