A magician was added to the Sunday line-up which includes the ice cream social, pedal pull, Old Time Fiddlers Band and face painting.
"We try to make it a fun family day," he said. "You can do a lot of these things for free."

Today's schedule opens with 4-H and FFA exhibits and competition in the morning, with the activity continuing each day of the fair. Because of concerns about the bird flu, the 4-H/FFA poultry show has been cancelled at this year's Nebraska county and state fairs.

Tonight, a hamburger feed by the fair office starts at 5 p.m. The flag raising ceremony will be held at the grandstands at 7 p.m., and team sorting begins at the rodeo arena at 7 p.m.

The evening ends with a local talent show at the grandstands starting at 7:30 p.m. The talent show offers acts of all ages, sometimes bringing a surprise or two, Heine said.
"We don't know who we have until they show up," he said. "Mostly, it's singing and dancing, but we may have a lot of different things come Wednesday night."

On Thursday, the carnival midway opens at 5 p.m. while the beer garden at the rodeo arena opens at 5:30 p.m. In the evening, the 16th annual rodeo (MSRA/IRA/MRA) will provide the action at the rodeo arena starting at 7:30 p.m.

The sanctioned rodeo has drawn both large crowds and a strong field of competitors, Heine said.

"We get contestants from all over the country," he said.

On Friday, the carnival opens at 3 p.m. while the bingo parlor opens at 5 p.m. and the beer garden at the grandstands opens at 6 p.m. In the evening, the demolition derby by CS Promotions roars into action at the grandstands starting at 8 p.m.

On Saturday, the carnival opens at 3 p.m. while the bingo parlor opens at 5 p.m. and the beer garden at the grandstands opens at 6 p.m.

In the grandstand, the Jason Earl Band opens at 7 p.m. with headline Parmalee playing the grandstand at 8:30 p.m. The Jason Earl Band will return to the stage at 10 p.m.

"Parmalee has a lot of good hits, and now they have an up-and-coming hit with 'Already Callin' You Mine,'" Heine said.

On Sunday, the fairgrounds offer something for all ages with an emphasis on family entertainment.

The carnival opens at 1 p.m. The rest of the afternoon features the ice cream social by the fair office at 1:30 p.m., the strolling magic act on the grounds from 1:30-3:30 p.m., the Old Time Fiddlers in the Open Class Building from 2-4 p.m., and the Colors de Clown Face Painting in the Commercial Building from 2-6 p.m.

The pedal pull by the fair office begins at 3:30 p.m. The Magicreations Magic Show in the Open Class Building begins at 4:30 p.m.

The bingo parlor in the Open Class Building starts at 5:30 p.m. The beer garden in the grandstands opens at 6 p.m.

In the grandstands, the big-name country acts continue Sunday night. Cedar County native Bridget Kruse opens at 7 p.m., followed by the headlining Swon Brothers on the grandstand stage at 8 p.m. Kruse return to the stage at 9:30 p.m.

"The Swon Brothers are very good and were on 'The Voice' last year," Heine said, referring to the national television show searching for the next great artists.

Kruse now lives in Sioux Falls but will return to her roots for Sunday's show.

"Bridget is a local woman, and it's very good to see her and have her on the local stage," Heine said. "She'll be performing before and also after the Swon Brothers."

Tickets can still be purchased at the fair for the grandstand shows, Heine said.

As the curtain rises on another Cedar County Fair, Heine credited the work of his fair board.

"We have a very good board that tries to stay a couple of steps ahead," he said. "We're right on track and right on time."

wanted to focus on and put them all together in one document," Johnke said. "This new system really focuses on all of the 22 components of the Danielson model or the South Dakota Framework for Professional Teaching Practices, unlike focusing on the minimum eight that the state recommends."

In the past, different observation tools were used throughout the district. Now, the same observation tool will be used for pre-school through grade 12. This will provide one unified system for all the schools within the 63-3 School District. This document involves a convenient drop-down menu for descriptions of classroom observations and additional space for free comments.

"We know that not every classroom is going to be a cookie cutter," Johnke said. "Within this observation tool, it gives us this flexibility to make those comments if necessary."

The committee also decided to add evaluations for activity coordinators in addition to classroom teachers.

The new system allows administrators to include activity observations. Activities Director Ryan Mors is going to take on an individual observation for each of the activities advisors and coaches, who are also teachers, throughout the district. This activity observation will be included in the number of observations required per year per teacher.

"Our coaches and advisors are doing great things in activities but were not being included in their teacher evaluations," Johnke said.

Since approximately 95 percent of the activity heads are also teachers, adding these evaluations won't add any extra evaluations or work for administrators but simply include the work teachers do in activities outside the classroom.

Another major action taken by the board Monday night was the approval of a bus route to establish student pick-up points and drop-off points in the Gayville-Volin School District

for students living in the Yankton School District.

In 2011, South Dakota state law revised the transportation of transfer student law. If the school boards in both the receiving school district and the resident school district annually approve the pick-up locations for those students, the parent or guardian of a student who has been accepted for transfer would be no longer be required to provide transportation to the student to a school in the receiving district without reimbursement.

In the first year it was allotted, Gayville-Volin School District approved the request from the Yankton School District to provide pick-up and drop-off locations in Yankton for students in the Gayville-Volin district and has provided this service for several years.

"It's a pretty well-known fact that the Gayville-Volin buses come into our community and people see that," said Superintendent Dr. Wayne Kindle. "I have had a number of inquiries asking why we don't consider this as a service."

Now the Yankton School District has approved taking a bus route into Gayville and arrange pick-up and drop-off locations for Yankton students.

According to YSD Business Manager Jason Bietz, the maximum total annual cost of providing a new route, aside from the existing bus route, to accommodate Gayville-Volin students would be about \$18,000. The total cost could be covered by adding four new students that are not currently enrolled in Yankton.

But both Kindle and Bietz agree that they could accommodate students while using an existing route, which would cut down on costs.

The additional stops and travel to Gayville would add about 35 to 40 miles to one of the current bus routes. Operational cost of adding stops to an existing route would be approximately \$5,000 to \$6,000, the total cost of which could be covered by adding two new students to Yankton schools.

The recommended route would include stopping points at Ma & Pa's C Store

on Highway 50 and the Post Office on Main Street in Gayville.

"We are not sure how many students we would serve immediately so it makes the cost estimator purely driver time," Bietz said.

According to Johnke, there would be about 10 to 15 students at the high school level that might utilize this bus service. The total amount of students that would utilize this service is unknown at this time. The addition of this bus route could also prompt more students to enroll in Yankton as a result of the transportation arrangement.

The agreements are on a yearly basis. This coming year will be a trial run for the process. According to state law, every year the Gayville-Volin School Board has to make a formal request to the Yankton School Board that allows the Yankton bus system to have the drop-off and pick-up points.

"This could be a one-time thing," Kindle said. "If it doesn't work, the board can choose to no longer continue it in the future."

Also Monday night, the Yankton School Board reorganized for the new year. As a result:

- Matthew Pietz was elected the new chairman, replacing Kathy Greenaway.
- Both Greenaway and Pietz renewed their oath of office and will serve another three-year term as board members, after running unopposed this past spring.
- Board member Sarah Carda was sworn into office as the new vice chairman.
- The board also must appoint new standing committee members for the building and grounds, personal and negotiations and the finance committee, which will be decided at the Aug. 10 School Board meeting.
