Winterringer added. "This is the direction the world is going and we want to make sure we stay up on that."

Communication is the main thing ABS wants the people they help to get out of the new technology.

"Technology helps people keep in contact with family and friends, especially through social media," said Oien.

"People use Internet services a lot more now to find out what's going on in the community and find out about the various activities and clubs they might be interested in Winterringer said.

Last fall, ABS received a grant from the Department of Rehabilitation Services that enabled it to hire an additional employment specialist to assist people with finding jobs in the community.

We've always had a huge emphasis on supported employment, but I think nationwide, there's an even bigger emphasis on employment in the community," explained Gigi Healy, director of vocational services. "We have a big impact on the Yankton community.'

ABS does this by working with several other local companies, from banks to schools to Yankton Transit

'We work with everybody that the average person would," Winterringer said.

ABS's main goal is to help everyone they can to the best of their abilities.

We're using the grant to support them and help them accomplish their goals through the use of technology," said Winterringer.

Bruguier is listed as a Native American standing 5-foot-6 and weighing ap-

proximately 150-180 pounds with black hair and brown eyes.

He resides on tribal land near Lake Andes.

wrapped up its family casework relief efforts in Delmont, according to The Associated Press. The agency opened cases on 60 families after the May 10 tornado, and the last of the cases was closed this week.

The Red Cross says volunteers served more than 15,000 meals and snacks the week following the disaster. The agency also has provided some financial assistance to impacted families and helped refer them to other agencies for additional aid.

The Red Cross says staff and volunteers will continue attending community meetings and working with leaders as the rebuilding continues.

While the Red Cross has concluded its casework, Lutheran Social Services (LSS) will continue its casework for the rest of the year, Gunnare said. The Delmont Disaster Relief Fund will be disbursed to meet victims' needs, she

A community meal and meeting was scheduled for Thursday evening at the Delmont Community Center. The gathering intended to help residents with financial and legal needs, the mayor

The Donation Warehouse will reopen at 5 p.m. Tuesday, July 21, at the Delmont Community Center. The hours are 1-5 p.m. Mondays, 5-8 p.m. Tuesdays and 1-5 p.m. Saturdays

Currently, the warehouse is taking only men's jeans - preferably new - for clothing donations, Gunnare said. The warehouse is also taking non-perishable food items and school supplies.

Looking ahead, Delmont city officials

are facing the prospect of losing a large percentage of its residents.

"We lost 44 structures (that were destroyed), and the way it looks and we are going right now, we will have six structures rebuilt, along with the fire hall and Zion Lutheran Church," the mayor said.

As a result, Delmont stands to lose about 70 residents. Gunnare said. With those losses, the town is dealing with its infrastructure including a sewer bond and water loan. The town has already eliminated a voting ward because of the anticipated population loss, she

On the positive side, four residents displaced from their homes have relocated into formerly vacant homes, meaning every house in town is now occupied, Gunnare said.

As a housing option, one prisonerbuilt residence – popularly known as a "governor's home" – will hopefully arrive in September, Gunnare said.

The reconstruction of the new fire hall should begin in late August or early September, the mayor said. The new fire hall should be completed next spring, with the old fire hall used in the meantime.

'We're still using some donations of firetrucks," she said. "We're also still using back-up service with Armour. If we need them, they're there.'

In another positive development, Zion Lutheran members have voted to rebuild after losing their century-old church, Gunnare said. Zion Lutheran members are currently attending Emmaus Lutheran in Tripp as the two congregations share the Rev. Brian Bucklew as pastor.

Gunnare welcomed Zion Lutheran's decision to rebuild.

"Just to have that building back on Main Street will mean a lot," she said.

"We want to get back to normal with two churches in Delmont on a Sunday. The other one is Hope Lutheran Church, and they share a pastor with

Tripp. Also, the All-School Reunion will continue as planned Aug. 7-8, Gunnare said. The reunion events will be held at the community hall, Legion Hall, fire hall and on Main Street.

Volunteers are needed to set up for the reunion at 8 a.m. Aug. 7 on Main Street in Delmont.

Delmont will hold alumni work days Aug. 6 and 9 to help with tornado cleanup efforts. Volunteers should call Lisa Adler at (605) 212-9605.

People who want to volunteer at other times, particularly for raking after the final homes are torn down, can call the donations center.

Gunnare expressed gratitude on behalf of her residents for the tremendous outpouring of support in the weeks following the tornado. A helping hand came from far beyond the town's borders, she said.

"Our theme is 'Back To Normalcy,'" she said. "We want to make sure we keep thanking the folks not only from South Dakota but the Midwest.

opportunities and resources to attract

"Resources are always limited in this state," Hagen said. "That is a struggle, but we want to make sure those resources are available so we can market the incredible interactions that are here to see and to experience."

Tourism officials have big plans for the fall. They will be holding a regional marketing meeting in October. This event will bring together representatives from the four tourism regions throughout the state. A presentation will be given on the department's marketing strategies and locations for the coming year. They will then ask region officials if they would like to join the campaign, contribute ideas or simply ask if they need help marketing their own local events.

The meetings will be held on an annual basis in Sioux Falls and possibly

'South Dakotans don't get to see a lot of the marketing we do because most of it is geared outside our boarders," Hagen said. "It's a good opportunity to share the industry.

There are many major events that attract tourism to Yankton such as June's archery tournament and the Riverboat Days celebration next month. Hagen notes that how a town reacts to such

a flood of tourists is very important to the future of the community.

"I had so many people tell stories of how the community truly rolled out the red carpet for those archers," Hagen said. "There may have been some states that may have not had that level of guest services and hospitality, but that's not the South Dakota way.'

With all the encouragement and hospitality that Yankton offered for the archery tournament, the town also learned some valuable lessons. Making people feel welcome keeps them coming back and generates more revenue for the community, Hagen said.

"Our audiences are interested in those local festivals like Czech Days and Riverboat Days." Hagen said. "Families are looking for those unique experiences.

South Dakotans can't deny that the western part of the state is the better ith the Black Hills and the Badlands, the rest of the regions can sometimes get lost. With all the differences between the regions. Hagen and other tourism officials want people to explore more of the central and eastern regions, as well.

The potential to showcase those other regions is higher than ever. According to Hagen, more people are willing to explore the rest of the state.

'We always tell people, if you're going to the Black Hills, on your way back, head east and stop at the Corn Palace or several other attractions," Hagen said. "If we can keep those visitors here longer, it benefits all of us.'

The department is currently working on the upcoming plans for the National Park Service Centennial Celebration to be held next year. The National Park Foundation will celebrate the achievements of the past 100 years and kick off a second century of stewardship for America's national parks.

The Department of Tourism will attempt to personalize this celebration be enhancing the theme, "Finding your Park." South Dakota has a total of six national parks in the state, including the Missouri National Recreation River at Yankton.

We get so used to seeing the same thing every day, we take it for granted," Hagen said. "But when you get an outsider's perspective vocalizing the beauty and the peacefulness of this area, it makes you stop and know you are truly blessed." To publicize the campaign, South

akota will have its owi Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. Also, the state will have a float in the 2016 Rose Bowl parade on Jan. 1 for the first time. This will be a Mount Rushmorethemed float to highlight the 75th anniversary of the completion of the monument, which will also coincide with the National Park Centennial.

"I'm excited as we grow and mature as a state and as an industry, the potential that exists for us," Hagen said.

beginning of July there was over 1 million acres on fire at once. That's where that smoke's coming from — you have a tremendous number of acres on fire up to the north, and anytime we have a northerly wind or a strong trough system digs in and we get that northwest flow, it's pulling down all this smoke.'

While agriculture isn't seeing a major impact from the smoke, Fuchs added it does affect the area's climate in the short-term.

"There is going to be some impact to air quality," he said. "Anyone with

any type of health issues may be seeing some problems associated with the smoke, but for the most part, that's the only impact in our part of the country. In the northern plains, the weather

has been much less turbulent over the

last month. Fuchs said the drought situation east of the Rockies has seen drastic

improvements.

Through much of the plains and Midwest, we see a lot of white," he said, denoting areas of the map not reporting any drought or abnormal dryness. 'There's pockets of dryness from Kansas, to Iowa, northeast, southeast South Dakota, the eastern Dakotas, we're still seeing some dryness, but really no impacts being reported to this time."

In the Yankton area, the drought pocket has steadily shrunk since late spring, although one pocket of abnormally dry conditions remains. The area is relegated to Yankton and Clay counties in South Dakota and Knox, Cedar, Dixon and Antelope counties in Nebraska.

As of Thursday, Yankton has unofficially received 9.28 inches while the average rainfall for that point in the year is 13.94 inches.

A special webinar to cover the current El Nino cycle has been scheduled for July 30 at 1 p.m.
