Names Released In Hutchinson Co. Crash

PARKSTON — The South Dakota Highway Patrol has released the name of a Parkston man who was killed in a three-vehicle crash that occurred Friday afternoon two miles north of Parkston.

Paul Bader, 52, was pronounced dead at the scene of the crash, which was reported at 1:19 p.m. Two other people were injured.

The Highway Patrol says Bader was driving a 1998 Honda GL100SE motorcycle northbound on South Dakota Highway 37. Southbound on the same highway was a Peterbilt semi truck followed by a 2015 Buick Enclave. The Highway Patrol says the Enclave attempted to pass the semi and collided with the motorcycle and then the semi.

Two Parkston residents were in the Enclave. Walter Caldwell was the driver and Kimberly Caldwell the passenger. Both were trapped in the car and had to be extricated. Both sustained serious non-life threatening injuries.

Jason Long of Mitchell was the driver of the semi. He was not injured.

Charges are pending. The investigation continues.

Other agencies responding to the scene were the Parkston Police Department and Parkston Fire Department. The Highway Patrol is part of the South Dakota Department of Public Safety.

Services NOT provided by SHC at this time include dental, diagnosis or treatment of sexually transmitted diseases, HIV testing, prenatal care, treatment for Emergency Medical Conditions, radiology, immunizations and chiropractic care. The staff does not prescribe any narcotics.

Future clinics are planned for the first and third Monday of every month. The date of the next clinic is Aug. 3.

He also performs with the Sempre Saxophone Quartet, which recently recorded a CD released on Centaur Records. He is a member of the Kocher Duo with his wife Stephanie, performing literature for flute and saxophone. Kocher has premiered new works at the World Saxophone Congress and other North American Saxophone Alliance events. He toured Japan two times, in 2013 and 2014, playing lead alto with the Billy Vaughn Orchestra. He has also played with Frank Mantooth, Matt Wilson, Steve Wiest, Denis DiBlasio, Al Jarreau, and others. Kocher completed the Doctor of Arts degree at the University of Northern Colorado and also holds degrees from Wichita State University and Washburn University.

The Little Big Band is a brand new group made up of some of the finest jazz musicians in the region: Joel Shotwell, tenor saxophone; Lincoln Havranek, baritone saxophone; Scott Olson, trumpet; Jim Spiers, trumpet; John Mathews, trombone; Jeremy Hegg, piano; Andrew Reinartz, bass; and Darin Wadley, drums. The ensemble is dedicated to playing jazz classics, standards, and Latin jazz.

right is a big responsibility.

"We have to have programming there that satisfies all the different areas of NASFAA," said Kocer. "There's private, non-profit and public institutions. We need to come up with programming that can have intercessions for all those involved with NASFAA and give them what they're looking for to advance their training skills."

The task force consists of six individuals from each region of the country, with Kocer representing the Rocky Mountain region. Each of the other representatives also work in colleges ranging from Yale University to the University of South Florida College of Medicine.

All task force members have the same basic responsibility, which is to work together to set up the conference.

"We have to make sure the programming is appropriate and is going to help our members," Kocer said.

Juggling duties between MMC and NAFSAA has proved

easier with the college's support.

"MMC has been very supportive of us employees by encouraging us to not only hone our leadership skills, but also to look for professional advancement opportunities," said Kocer. "This is a great opportunity for me to meet and cooperate with financial aid administrators from the six regions of the country that make up NASFAA and come together to work on a common goal."

Kocer is proud to have a more prominent role in NASFAA, even if it is a brief one-year term.

"NASFAA is our advocate for students at a national level," said Kocer. "They look for the best practices that schools can do to service students, which is one of the reasons I wanted to be on this task force. I appreciate what they're doing for college students and I'm glad I can be part of assisting that goal."

Kocer's major goal is to make sure next year's conference is the best yet, as it will be NASFAA's 50th anniversary.

"If we can get the administrators the training they need, I will be very happy," Kocer said.
