Through its "Be The Cure" initiative, the National Lieutenant Governors Association (NLGA) is bringing awareness about the need for people of all races to become involved with the drug development process to help find treatments for cancer. diabetes and Alzheimer's disease.

"Succe require diverse and robust volunteer participation," said South Dakota Lt. Gov. Matt Michels. "It is important that people of all races understand the benefits of clinical trials. Different racial groups can be affected by different diseases and may respond differently to certain kinds of medications. Unfortunately, minority groups are typically underrepresented in clinical trials, resulting in limited evidence for how effective such treatments may be for those individuals."

Box Elder Bugs Loom As Summer Pest

You may have seen a large number of box elder bugs around, now that the temperature outside has increased. They like the heat. and the bugs seem to be everywhere - on your deck, climbing outside your doors and on the sidewalks.

Adult box elder bugs are black with orange or red markings and about a half-inch long. They feed on vegetation and seeds on the ground. Adult box elder bugs can typically fly several blocks, but has been known to travel as far as two miles. They are short-lived, only surviving for a few days up to a week.

Box elder bugs are most abundant during hot, dry summers. The last time they were very numerous was in 1988. Since this is not a superhot summer, the bugs are in moderation.

Some homes attract the bugs, while others repulse them. The box elders like warm areas and are unaffected by the color of the building. You may see an increased number of the bugs in areas where the sun shines down. They become mobile when the temperature increases. The hotter is gets, the more they travel.

Box elders are a nuisance because they enter homes and other buildings. They do not bite people and are

usually harmless to property. But in an exceptionally large numbers they have been known to stain walls, curtains and other surfaces with their excrement.

Starting in mid-July box elders move to female seedbearing box elder trees, but seldom found on male box elder trees. The bugs may also be found on maple or ash trees. The male box elder tree flowers twirl to the ground. (Some call them helicopters.) These gutter-clogging seeds show up before leaves sprout in the spring. The female flowers are long, thin and downward. The box elders feed off these leaves, flowers and seeds.

In the late summer and fall, the bugs start to leave the trees to find protected areas for the winter. Cracks or spaces in buildings or homes are a favorite of the box elder. This is a good time to check your home for bug entrances. You can keep them out of your home by repairing windows, door screens, thresholds and any other place the box elders can get into the home.

Should the bugs get into your home, insecticide is not recommended. Remember, the box elders live no more than a few days: you can outlast them. Unlike cockroaches, the box elder does not reproduce inside, so you don't have to be concerned by an invasion.
