

# Football-Bowling Hybrid Sport Takes Hold In Detroit

HAMTRAMCK, Mich. (AP) — A Detroit-area entrepreneur believes he has scored a touchdown with his new business idea. Or thrown a strike.

Actually, it's both.

Chris Hutt owns the Fowling Warehouse, a 34,000-square-foot repurposed industrial site in Hamtramck that's devoted to a football-bowling hybrid sport — fowling — he and some buddies invented while tailgating years ago at the Indianapo-

lis 500.

The facility features 20 lanes, where players or teams try to be the first to knock down all 10 of their opponents' bowling pins by tossing a single football from a distance of up to 48 feet.

The game is not complicated, Hutt said, but it's not easy, either. In the Fowling Warehouse's first six months of operation, only 29 strikes had been thrown over 100,000-plus games.

There's another quick way to end a fowling match: A unique shot called a Bonk, which occurs when a player knocks the middle pin — and only the middle pin — off the board on the first throw. The other nine pins must remain standing.

According to Hutt, there are about 60 Bonks per month. Those who record one are allowed to "honk your Bonk," or sound a Great Lakes freighter horn at the bar. The sonic blast is deafening, Hutt said, but it

lets "everyone know ... that you're the coolest person in the room."

Hutt's business, which also has a 175-seat beer garden and a stage for live music, has drawn big crowds on weekend nights. Some take advantage of a deal that allows unlimited play for \$10 until closing at 2 a.m. Others reserve lanes for group play, up to 10 players per lane, in two-hour increments.

Peter Grace's third fowling excursion came on a recent Friday

night, when he and about 20 others celebrated a friend's birthday.

"It's just a great place to hang out," said Grace, a 27-year-old from Detroit. "It's the best of both worlds. You're bowling and you're playing football at the same time."

Hutt, 46, said he eventually would like to expand his fowling empire.

"This will work in any major city," he said, "and we really want to target the college towns."

## Nebraska's Smith To Transfer

LINCOLN, Neb. — Nebraska Coach Connie Yori announced on Tuesday that sophomore guard Chandler Smith has elected to transfer from the Husker women's basketball program.

"Chandler is a good person and a good player, but she has decided that she wants to be closer to home," Yori said. "While we are disappointed that she will no longer be a member of our program, we understand and support her decision. We wish her nothing but the best in the future."

As a freshman, the 6-0 guard from Brewster, Wash., missed significant time early in the season with a foot injury, before playing in 18

games with one start. She averaged 1.8 points and 1.9 rebounds per game. She was a two-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll and a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team. Before arriving at Nebraska, she was a two-time Washington Class 1A Player of the Year.

## Iowa State's Meyers Finishing Chemo For Lymphoma

DALLAS (AP) — Iowa State defensive lineman Mitchell Meyers is close to wrapping up chemotherapy for Hodgkin's lymphoma, a process during which he didn't miss any summer workouts with his teammates.

Cyclones coach Paul Rhoads said Tuesday that Meyers has his last scheduled chemo appointment Friday in Iowa.

Rhoads said Mitchell, who is from the Houston area, will then return to Texas for radiation treatment before rejoining the team in September.

Iowa State announced in February that Meyers had been diagnosed with Hodgkin's lymphoma and was beginning treatment.

Rhoads said prayers are still extended for Mitchell and his family, and that the team watches "in admiration and appreciation each

and every single day."

Mitchell, listed at 6-foot-4 and 260 pounds, was one of only four ISU players to start every game last season.

## UAB To Resume Playing Football In 2017

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — UAB football will take the field again in 2017 and remain an FBS program.

Athletic director Mark Ingram said Tuesday that rifle will return in the upcoming season, while bowling will compete in 2016-17 and football in two years.

UAB dropped all three sports in December to cut costs, then announced six months later that they would be reinstated.

The NCAA cleared UAB to resume playing football in 2017 and continue competing in the Football Bowl Subdivision, Ingram said.

UAB supporters pledged enough money to cover the projected \$17 million cost to operate football over the next five years, plus millions more toward facility upgrades.

The NCAA won't subject UAB to FBS minimum scholarship numbers for three academic years beginning with 2015-16.
