2015 Schuetzenfest **Set For Bow Valley**

BOW VALLEY, Neb. — The Bow Valley Park Association presents the 2015 Schuetzenfest, a German Heritage celebration, in Bow Valley, Nebraska, on Sunday, Aug. 2.

The festival will feature a 7:30 a.m. fun run, 9 a.m. Catholic Mass at Ss. Peter and Paul Church, a parade to the Bow Valley Ballroom led by the Bow Valley Honor Guard, and the traditional shooting of the wooden bird by members of the Honor Guard. The Honor Guard member who shoots down the locally crafted bird (this year, a duck) from the top of its 30-foot pole, will be crowned King of the Schuetzenfest. The King chooses his Queen, reigns over the rest of the day's events, and purchases refreshments for the rest of the shooters for the remainder of the Schuetzenfest.

The day will also feature a talent contest with prizes, games, food, music, and other entertainment. A quilt featuring the Schuetzenfest logo, names of all past Schuetzenfest Kings and Oueens, this year's shooters and organizing chair will be auctioned off, as will commemorative rifles and other items celebrating German and rural heritage.

"Schuetzenfest is a way we celebrate our German roots and build our community for the future," said Clint Pinkelman, organizing chair, beginning farmer, and son of Rick Pinkelman, Schuetzenfest King of 2000.

great time. Schuetzenfest, which is free to the public, is being held in Bow Valley for 23rd time since 1896. 
Circuit Drug Court Holds Graduation Panel

Missouri National Recreational River, southeast South Dakota's and northeast Nebraska's only National Park, will present the following ranger programs this weekend:

FRIDAY JULY 24

• Pierson Ranch Amphitheater 7 p.m. — Where is Your Park?: Established in 1978, the unique Missouri National Recreational River consists of 126 miles of river way, including 98 miles of the main stem of the Missouri River along with a 20-mile section of the lower Niobrara River and 8 miles of Verdigre Creek. The Missouri River, the longest river (2,341 miles) in North America, serves as the backdrop for preserving and protecting the natural and cultural integrity of this corridor located along the Nebraska and South Dakota boundary from Pickstown to Ponca, Nebraska. The river holds diverse connections to the individual lives of those who know it, but collectively the river unites them. It recalls history, records human stories and provides a sense of place. This section of the river is allowed to meander through a valley and along a shoreline composed of forested chalkstone bluffs adjacent to gently rolling to flat agricultural crop and range bottomland. Recreational boating, fishing and hunting are popular on the river.

• Ponca State Park, 10 a.m.-2 p.m. — Mobile Ranger Station: The Missouri National Recreational River sports the National Park Service's only visitor center on wheels. The unit will be parked in the campground area for visitors to stop by and see with exhibits and activities for all ages. Learn about what makes the park unique and the characters and cultures that have known the marvels of the Missouri River for centuries. Pick up a park brochure, a passport stamp or a Junior Ranger book to complete for a badge.
