Law now permits the governing board of said entity to establish a tax amount which may be levied and such amount can increase each year with the amount of inflation and new construction. Therefore the board does now establish a base property tax in the amount of \$.90 per one thousand dollars of taxable valuation starting with calendar year 2015 taxes payable in the calendar year 2016. This action has been taken by the board and approved by at least a two-thirds vote of the board.

This decision may be referred to a vote of the people upon a petition signed by at least five percent of the registered voters in the district and filed with the governing body within twenty days of the first publication of this decision.

Unless this action is referred to a vote of the people and reversed by such vote, this resolution authorizes the county auditor to spread a levy to raise tax dollars in the above stated amount, allowing for percentage increases from inflation and new construction in subsequent years.

Planned Parenthood Official Says No Profit **From Fetal Organs**

WASHINGTON — The president of Planned Parenthood said her organization's clinics never adjust the abortion procedure to better preserve

fetal organs for medical research and that the organization's charges cover only the cost of transmission to researchers. Planned

Parenthood has come under congressional scrutiny after the release of two stealthily recorded videos that showed officials discussing how they provide aborted fetal organs for research. Abortion opponents say the videos show the organization is illegally harvesting and selling organs. Three congressional committees are making inquiries.

Planned Parenthood's president, Cecile Richards, said Sunday the group has done nothing illegal and is the target of a political smear campaign.

Richards appeared on ABC's "This Week." It was her first Sunday talk show appearance since a group called the Center for Medical Progress released two videos secretly recorded in 2014 and 2015 by people posing as buyers of fetal tissue. The videos were part of longer discussions, and Richards said the longer videos showed doctors repeatedly saying that Planned Parenthood does not profit from the tissue donations.

In the videos, Planned Parenthood officials discuss the amounts the group

charges to provide the organs and the abortion procedures used to obtain the organs. The officials, Richards said, were reprimanded for the tone they used. She also called those who released the video "nothing but militant anti-abortion

extremists.' David Daleiden of the Center for Medical Progress issued a statement saying Planned Parenthood will attack him and his organization, but that

does not change what he said the investigation uncovered, an enterprise-wide operation that traffics and sells baby parts." He told ABC that 10 to 12 more tapes would be released.

Richards said fetal organ donation takes place in a handful of states and that the tissue goes toward medical research.

"This is actually laudable, that women and their families choose to make fetal tissue donations in order to potentially save the lives of other folks," Richards said.

sands of people that attend," he said. "They also look for a place suitable for a largescale mission project.

During this, they were able to interact directly with the people they'd come to help.

"A memorable moment for me was meeting a couple ladies who lived there," said Oswald. "They were really nice and had really strong faith considering the conditions they were living in."

"There was one kid that lived in the area we were cleaning and he volunteered to work with us," he said. "I found out that he didn't have much but he still, on his day off, chose to help us clean up and make his neighborhood better.'

Every evening, the thousands of youth groups met at Ford Field, home of the NFL's Detroit Lions, to listen to speakers discuss topics such as immigration and

education. They also had one off-day where they visited a convention center and spent the day doing various fun activities. "I enjoyed seeing the kids

iump into activities and not be shy meeting new people," said Yankton group leader Dan Negard. In addition, the trip

helped change perspectives of those who attended. The kids really understood that there are places

where racial discrimination really happens," said Moser. "We don't have a high minority population in Yankton, so I think they're able to take that experience and focus on what the issues are here." The youth were also

exposed to a level of urban poverty they were unfamiliar with, and the persevering attitudes of Detroit's residents. "A lot of those people are

Lawsuit Reveals Extent Of Ethiopian Hacking

WASHINGTON (AP) — As President Barack Òbama faces pressure to discuss human rights in his first official visit to Ethiopia this weekend, a unique lawsuit back home is challenging whether the African country can spy on an American by turning his computer into a giant recording device.

The federal case alleges Ethiopian government agents gobbled up months of a Maryland man's Skype calls and his family's Internet activities. But the man, born in Ethiopia and now a U.S. citizen, isn't wanted for a crime. Instead, he helps out a political opposition

group outlawed in his home country.

The alleged intrusion was investigated after the software left behind bread crumbs, underscoring a larger pattern: The use of commercial hacking software by foreign governments, sometimes with poor human-rights records, to electronically snoop on their adversaries.

White House press secretary Josh Earnest said this past week that the U.S. "regularly conveyed to Ethiopia's leadership our concerns in such areas as press freedom, transparency, space for civil society and the political op-

South Dakota is one of several fronts where Trans-Canada is stalled in getting approval for the pipeline, which would go from Canada through Montana and South Dakota to Nebraska, where it would connect with existing pipelines to carry more than 800,000 barrels of crude oil a day to refineries along the Gulf Coast. It could also transport some crude from the Bakken oil field.

The pipeline proposed in 2008 has not received the required approval from President Barack Obama and is also delayed by a Nebraska court case from landowners who oppose it.

The project is routed through John Harter's property in Tripp County. Harter said there's no reason to risk water supplies to transport

"I worked all my life for what I've got, and it ain't a lot," Harter said. "All I've got is my land to make a living. I don't appreciate my family being endangered for the profits of some greedy oil pipeline company." Corey Goulet, TransCan-

ada's president of Keystone Pipeline Projects, said the project will create construction jobs and spur about \$20 million a year in tax revenue in South Dakota. Sam Mickelson, whose

Meade County land is part of the pipeline's proposed route, said he'd rather get energy from Canada than from a country that's not friendly toward the U.S. "I'm in the farming busi-

ness, so I know you can't build everything positively, 100 percent foolproof, but as long as they're doing the things to make it the safest pipeline, that shows me they're dealing in good faith,' CO TDACAPTH AU MSPP LSHPX
