Saturday, July 27, 1940

- The death of a widely known humanitarian and service worker in both hospital and public works occurred yesterday, July 26 when Sister M. Flavia (Ragina Degio) superintendent at Sacred Heart hospital, succumbed to an illness which had sapped her strength and vitality for sometime.
- Several Yankton County Democrats in addition to the three delegates are expected to attend the state Democratic convention to be held in Pierre on Monday, according to Chairman John E. Walsh. Some of those going expect to leave Yankton tomorrow and some early Monday morning.

50 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, July 27, 1965

- A petition for a four-way electrically operated traffic signal at Third and Cedar streets, because of increased traffic flow resulting from the use of the drive-in window, will be presented to the city commission Monday evening.
- Three traffic accidents in the city were reported to Yankton police Monday. A semi-trailer truck operated by Melvin A. Weise of Wakefield, Nebr., parked on the Second street east of Walnut near the port-of-entry, rolled away and struck two autos parked near the alley at the southside of Royal Cleaners.

25 YEARS AGO

Friday, July 27, 1990

- Contingency plans are being made with the U.S. Postal Service and with some area businesses in anticipation of a possible United Parcel Service strike.
- High school teachers from across the state are learning how to teach advanced science and mathematics courses in their districts. The Rural Science and Math High School Without Walls project is training 19 teachers from 16 high schools, said Arlen Gullickson, University of South Dakota professor of education and computer science.

Transportation Board Sets Hearing on New Administrative Rules

PIERRE — The South Dakota Transportation Commission set a hearing date of Aug. 27 to review and adopt rules for the County Highway and Bridge Improvement Plans and the Bridge Improvement Grant (BIG) fund.

During the 2015 Legislative Session, legislation was passed which included the establishment of a new grant program to assist with repair and maintenance of bridges on the local highway systems. Once fully implemented, the fund will provide \$15 million annually to address local bridge needs.

The bill gives the Transportation Commission authority to promulgate rules on the application process, timelines, guidelines and criteria it will use to award and distribute money from the newly created BIG fund.

Cyanotype Class At Vermillion Library

VERMILLION — A cyanotype workshop with photographer John Banasiak will be held at the Edith B. Siegrist Vermillion Public Library at 2 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 15.

Banasiak, a University of South Dakota professor, will lead a workshop in the cyanotype technique. This 19th century printing process is as versatile and economical as it is beautiful. Banasiak will instruct participants on how to create cyanotype prints with their resulting rich blue hue. The process is relatively non-toxic, and printing techniques can be carried out in normal ambient light, which makes this printing technique ideal for a home workshop or studio.

All materials will be provided, but registration is required, and space will be limited to 12 participants.
