Vermillion Considers Adopting Downtown Streetscape Plan

VERMILLION — The Vermillion City Council heard a report last week from Jose Dominguez regarding potentially adopting a streetscape plan for downtown Vermillion developed in 2004.

Dominguez, who spoke at the noon meeting on Monday, said that the council has several steps they need to take in the next few months, beginning with adopting the plan originally developed more than 10 years ago by a committee of Vermillion residents.

"Our steps would include adopting the plan at a meeting in August," Dominguez said. "Then in September, we would need to set the rules and parameters for setting a committee."

The next step would be for the committee to decide on aesthetics and design for the project, then sometime this winter to hire a landscape architect to create official drawings of what downtown would look like. Following receipt of the drawings, city officials could use them to develop projects for the downtown Vermillion area.

Dominguez said several of the recommendations of the plan have already been started.

While no budget has been set for the project, Dominguez estimated that just for the sidewalk reconstruction, the city would need to budget \$1.8 million.

City Manager John Prescott told the council that if they do adopt the plan, it needs to be clear it is just a conceptual plan.

"We can concentrate on the goals, not each individual idea," Dominguez said. "We are not married to the plan. This is just the first stepping stone."

It was decided to bring the plan to a vote at the first City Council meeting in August.

The city has also announced the final Prentiss Park Swimming Pool schedule.

Originally scheduled to close at the end of July, delays in construction due to the special election held in June have allowed the dates to be moved.

Currently, The Prentiss Park Swimming Pool is scheduled to be open through Sunday, Aug. 16, weather permitting.

An updated proposal to construct a new swimming pool during the 2016 construction season has been set. With this schedule the new pool would be constructed while the existing pool is operational during 2016. The current pool would need to close early in 2016 to accommodate construction.

Mount Marty Hosting Camp Invention, Showcase

Mount Marty College is hosting Camp Invention and Inventor's Showcase this week on the MMC campus in Yankton.

Led by local educators, the weeklong Camp Invention experience immerses elementary aged children in hands-on activities that reinvent summer fun. During this summer program, Yankton area children seek innovative solutions to real-world problems. The program is held through July 31, running from 9 a.m.-3:30 pm each day, and is for students entering grades 1-6.

The week will wrap with an Inventor's Showcase at 2:30 p.m. Friday in the Main Dining Hall located on the second floor of the Roncalli Center, where the students will display and demonstrate their inventions. The public is welcome to attend.

This nationally-acclaimed STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) enrichment program is offered by Mount Marty College in collaboration with the non-profit, Invent Now. The Camp Invention program will be presented by local teachers and directed by Dr. Tamara Pease, Mount Marty College assistant professor of chemistry. Throughout this week, children work in teams to solve real-world challenges. Some activities include:

- Reverse engineer a household appliance
- Experiment with circuits and gears
- With inspiration from famous inventors, create their

own invention

- Create a freestyle race kart that can withstand water and navigate the ultimate wet terrain obstacle course.
