"We are putting together a team of experts to inspect our system top to bottom," Mayor Wendell Strom said in the news release.

Strom could not be reached by the Press & Dakotan for additional comment.

At this point, city officials aren't releasing many details, Hendrix told the Press & Dakotan.

However, the City Council has placed the matter on its agenda for the next regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday in City Hall, she said. Should the meeting draw a large audience, the proceedings

could be moved to the neighboring city auditorium, she added.

The meeting will provide residents with information on the review team and

its work, Hendrix said. "My hope is to release a preliminary report to the public that will set forward as clearly as possible what the (review) team is, how it works and why the team is formed," she said.

The meeting also looks to provide information on the alleged reporting irregularities themselves, Hendrix said.

We had initially thought it would take four to six weeks to get the preliminary information, but we should have enough to be able to present most, if not all, of it on Monday," she said. "The committee will continue and still needs to meet.

A written report of preliminary

information will be made available to the public, Hendrix said in the news release. Updates will be available at all regularly scheduled council meetings.

"We need the public to be part of this process," she said. "If anyone has information that they think might assist in the investigation, we ask that they please come forward."

In the news release, Councilman Michael Guenther said the city wants to clear up any questions surrounding city operations.

The City of Crofton is a great place with a great reputation," he said. "We will do what it takes to keep it that way.'

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
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
