Vermillion To Invest In Historic Theatres

VERMILLION — A non-profit association formed to invest in growing Vermillion's downtown cultural attractions and relationship with the University of South Dakota has purchased the Coyote Twin and Vermillion Theaters on Main Street.

The group, the Vermillion Downtown Cultural Association, worked with community and USD leadership to acquire the historic locations at 10 E. Main St. and 4 W. Main St. Group members plan to raise money to accelerate renovations and to enhance the cinema experience for Vermillion residents and USD students.

"The project started with an idea and a belief that the theaters are a critical draw to downtown Vermillion," said Bill Anderson, Vermillion Downtown Cultural Association Board president. "The theaters were on the market for several months and a small group of us were concerned that if they weren't purchased, they would be at risk for closing. That wasn't an option that we believed the community could or should consider."

Harris, who also serves as director of music and choir-master at the Winnetka Congregational Church in Winnetka, Illinois, held the position of professor of conducting and director of choral organizations at Northwestern from 1977 to 2012. Active as a conductor, composer, clinician, lecturer and adjudicator, he has also held guest professorships in conducting at Wayne State University in Detroit, the University of Texas in Austin and the University of South Africa in Pretoria.

In 1974, six choral directors formed the South Dakota All-State Honor Choir to provide a quality musical experience for the state's top high school vocalists. Black Hills State University provided the first setting for the 150 select high school singers with Rod Walker of Kansas State University as conductor. Each year, one of South Dakota's universities or colleges hosts the event.

The presentation is based on letters written in German and addressed to Shrag's great-grandfather. The letters have been carefully saved, never translated, and handed down through the generations. They detail faith, personal experiences and the agricultural way of life for Dakotans between 1878 and 1889.

Shrag's visit is made possible through a grant from the South Dakota Humanities Council.
