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Hudson Sentenced For 2014 **Killing**

Joshua Hudson has been sentenced to 150 years in the South Dakota State Penitentiary with 100 years suspended and restitution Thursday morning at the Yankton County Courthouse for the death of his uncle, Todd Hudson, in March 2014.

Earlier this month, Joshua pleaded guilty to one count of first-degree homicide as manslaughter. He had originally been charged with homicide in the second-degree, aggravated assault and grand theft. His original plea was not guilty by reason of insanity.

Thursday morning, the defense called Dr. Melissa Spangaard of Avera Behavioral Health to the stand. Spangaard conducted two evaluations on Hudson on behalf of the defense — a competency evaluation two months after the killing and a forensic psychiatric evaluation.

Spangaard said the first evaluation determined that Hudson was suffering delusions and hallucinations and was not competent to stand trial. She testified that, while Hudson's state of mind had improved with treatment by the follow-up evaluation, she still determined that he was suffering from schizophrenia fueled by the recent death of his brother at the time he killed his uncle. Spangaard further testified that the family had been encouraging him to seek psychiatric help beforehand.

The prosecution called no witnesses during the sentence hearing.

Deputy State's Attorney Erich Johnke had originally asked for a cap of 40 years on the sentence as part of the plea deal made earlier this month.

Before the sentence was read. Hudson addressed the courtroom by apologizing to friends and family for the events that had transpired.

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Progress was shown Thursday morning when several Yankton Area Progressive Growth (YAPG) members involved in creating Westbrook Estates alongside Yankton's West City Limits Road pushed golden-tipped shovels into the dusty dirt.

"It's really come about relatively quickly for how housing developments can work," said

YAPG chairman Rob Stephenson. "Our lack of affordable housing in the area needs to improve.

This is what the YAPG hopes to accomplish with the creation of Wesbrook Estates, which will include a 70-unit apartment complex, single family homes, twin homes and a fourplex.

"We are shooting to have some housing foundation started by the middle or end of August depending on rain delays," said Kelly Nielson, owner of Nielson Construction in

Harrisburg. "The plan is to put six to seven single family homes, a twin home and a fourplex in right away so all those projects will go into the ground right away."

Construction trucks were at work Thursday morning putting in underground utilities. It was a promising sound.

According to Stephenson, all the work leading up to that day can be traced directly to YAPG housing task force director Dan

"Dan's been heavily involved in organizing us, thinking about property and what's available and negotiating with builders," said Stephenson. "Dan knew what he was getting into when he said yes, and he's been fantastic."
