

Collison Contributes To Health Book

Dr. Patrick J. Collison M.D., staff physician at Avera Sacred Heart Hospital and Yankton Medical Clinic, has contributed several chapters to a recently released book, Health of the Seventh Cavalry: A Medical History, edited by P. Willey and Douglas D. Scott. This non-fiction work, published by the University of Oklahoma Press in May of 2015, is available for preorder through Amazon.com and other retail outlets. The research behind this multiauthored volume began nearly twenty years ago with the abstraction of information from the medical records of over 8000 nineteenth century U.S Army troopers, stored at the National Archives in Washington, D.C. Dr. Collison wrote chapters on "Head and Neck Diseases and Injuries of the Seventh Cavalry", "Pulmonary Diseases of the Seventh Cavalry", and a general overview of nineteenth century medical care. He also served as an advisor on other portions of the book.

This book covers in detail various topics related to illnesses and injuries suffered by members of the Seventh Cavalry serving under Colonel George Armstrong Custer and others during

the period of the Plains Indian Wars, from 1866 to 1883. Reviewers describe The Health of the Seventh Cavalry as "an important contribution to the history of military medicine...skillfully gleaned from primary sources and presented in broad historical and medical context." Another reviewer notes that "It is rare to have such an extensive body of nineteenth-century medical records so well surveyed and expertly interpreted."

The book should be available for purchase in August of 2015.
