### CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Grains futures were mixed Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery jumped 5.25 cents to \$4.3325 a bushel, while July corn rose 5 cents to \$3.4325 a bushel and oats for July delivery climbed 10.5 cents to \$2.145 a bushel. July soybeans fell 8.5 cents to \$9.35 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures advanced and pork futures traded lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle added 0.42 cent to 90.07 cents a pound; August feeder cattle rose 1 cent to \$1.1022 a pound; June lean hogs slipped 0.18 cent to 77.27 cents a pound; and July pork bellies lost 0.75 cent to 95.75 cents a pound.

Simply covering the vehicle with a blue tarp will not rectify the violation, Morrow added. If something other than a building is used to cover the vehicle, it must not draw attraction and has to cover everything but the lower portion of the tires.

"It's very difficult to get a tarp to meet the ordinance," Morrow said, noting that an actual car cover may be a solution. "I think the intention of our ordinance is to get rid of these cars, but there are people who may have a classic or antique car. If it's properly stored - screened and covered - we're happy with that. Our intent isn't to cause hardship."

If a vehicle is not removed per the notice, the case will be taken to the court system.

"We will work with our city attorney to file a summons to get the violation in front of a judge," Morrow said. "The judge can order ... the owner to remove the car or fine the owner anywhere from \$50-\$200 per day."

Morrow said he believes the focus on nuisance ordinance enforcement is something supported by members of the community, and he hopes the city once again has the resources next year to hire a seasonal employee.

"Enforcement of the nuisance ordinance is the right thing to do and makes the community better," he said. "It removes a lot of dangers to children."

The study will determine if changes to these purposes and the existing federal water resource infrastructure may be warranted. An open house/comments will be held from 5-7 p.m., and a public speaker comment period will be held from 7-8 p.m.

showing that South Dakota dairy producers are some of the most efficient in the nation, and are producing more milk while minimizing the impact on the environment.

The U.S. dairy industry announced last year its commitment to reduce greenhouse gas emissions that result from the production of fluid milk by 25 percent before 2020, or the equivalent of removing more than 1.25 million passenger cars from the road every year.

According to the South Dakota Department of Agriculture (SDDA), dairy is the sixth largest agricultural business in the state generating \$319 million each year. About 390 dairy farms in South Dakota produce milk, cheese, yogurt and other dairy foods for residents of the state, and across the U.S. And about 99 percent of all South Dakota dairies are family-owned.

"A healthy dairy industry in South Dakota is important not just to our rural economy, but to every citizen of the state," said David Skaggs, dairy development specialist for the South Dakota Department of Agriculture. "Dairy farmers are an integral part of South Dakota agriculture and have a tremendous positive impact on our communities," he said.

According to SDDA, South Dakota's dairy processing industry employs nearly 950 workers,

## Lesser Known Facts About Dairy Products

- Obesity - Low fat dairy foods such as milk, yogurt and cheese, may help control body fat, according to several studies.
- Women who consumed the most calcium and ate at least 3 servings of dairy foods per day were 80 percent less likely to be obese than those with the lowest intake.
- A low fat diet providing 3 servings of low fat dairy products and 8 to 10 servings of fruits and vegetables, significantly lowers blood pressure as much as some medications, especially when combined with a low sodium intake.
- The results of a study published in The New England Journal of Medicine show calcium may help reduce the risk of colon tumors.

in addition to the state's 1,100 dairy farm laborers. Overall, the dairy industry has an annual economic impact of more than \$1.27 billion in South Dakota.

"Agriculture is South Dakota's No. 1 industry, and our state's 94,000 dairy cows are one of the driving forces behind our economy," said South Dakota acting secretary of agriculture Jon Farris.

Agriculture has a \$21.3 billion economic impact on South Dakota; employs about 40 percent of the workforce and generates nearly 50 percent of the state's tax revenue.
