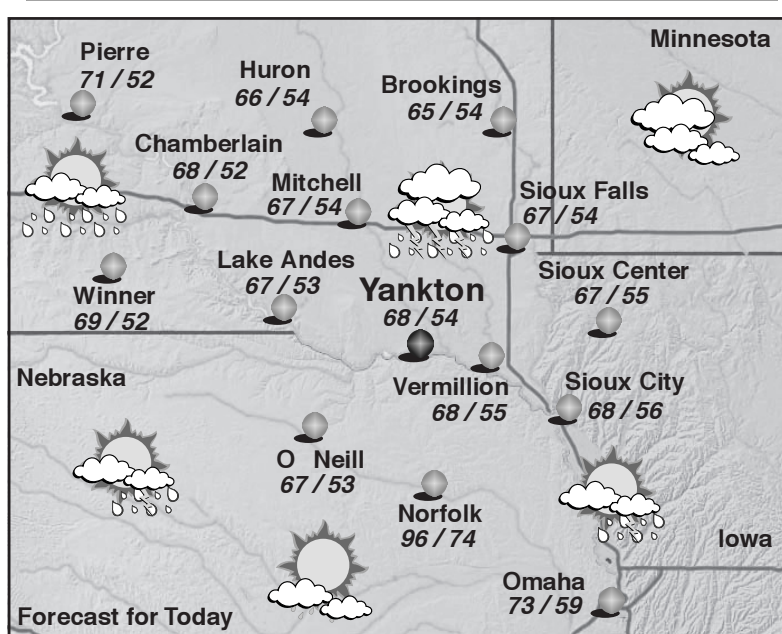

relief to join funding already given to Charles Mix for spring floods earlier this year, but fears that relief will be unable to go toward this latest damage.
 Meanwhile, the South Dakota Department of Transportation has closed Highway 44 on the James River north of Olivet in Hutchinson County, according to Dave Hoffman, the county's emergency manager.
 Highway 37, which goes through the town of Parkston, was closed at 7 p.m. Saturday night but was reopened Sunday.
 Hoffman said he feels flooding has been controlled for the moment, but many township and county roads remain closed.
 Bon Homme County escaped the brunt of the storm compared to other counties, according to Jon Vavruska, Bon Homme County's emergency manager.
 He said while the county experienced only minor flooding

with very little wind from the storm, he asks drivers to use caution.
 "We may not know what roads have water on them, so continue to be careful about traveling on roads that may possibly have water running across them," Vavruska said.

Also, in response to the heavy rains, the City of Yankton has closed down the Auld-Brokaw Trail due to high runoff along Marne Creek.

Meanwhile high water was reported on Interstate 90 near Mount Vernon Saturday. The National Weather Service reported traffic being backed up for almost two miles.

Flood warnings were still posted throughout much of the region due to swelling rivers and creeks. The heavy rains have caused a sharp rise on the James River. The Yankton County gauge has shown a rise of more than six feet since last Thursday. The Scotland gauge has risen more than five feet during that same period and is nearing its late-March levels, when major flooding occurred throughout the val-

ley, closing numerous roads.
 In Nebraska, residents of North Loup have returned to their homes after flooding forced the evacuation of the small town in central Nebraska.
 The town of 340 was evacuated Saturday afternoon because of street flooding that followed failure of a small dam. Residents were allowed to go home later Saturday.
 Sheriff Casey Hurlburt said a few basements had fallen in and floodwaters caused sewer problems, but no injuries were reported.

Flood warnings have been posted for most of the state, and there are reports of minor flooding and washed-out roads.
 Gov. Dave Heineman's office said he planned to examine several flooded areas of the state on Sunday.
 Meanwhile, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers announced Saturday that it is reducing its releases from Gavins Point Dam due to excessive flooding issues along tributaries from Nebraska City, Neb., to the Mississippi River. Releases were reduced from 26,500 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 22,000 cfs.

report some of these abuses are unaware elderly abuse can happen or that it is so common.
 "The bad thing is that (elderly abuse) is underreported or the people who report it often report it to their abusers," he said. "Many people don't believe

those who are abused due to their age, for example."

In fact, abuse can occur anywhere, he said. It can occur in the victim's home, a trusted person's home behind closed doors or in a care facility.

As a person ages, it becomes more difficult for them to fight back or stand up for themselves. An elderly person's decreasing mental health can also be taken advantage of, not just by criminals but also adult children or

relatives looking for financial gain.

While the Haven House will not have an official event to mark World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, Sievers said they plan to spend all of June promoting awareness, as well as talking to nursing homes around the area to educate staff about the realities of elderly abuse.

"One of our steps for awareness is to just give people the message," he said.

there's always lots of wind," Lee said. "But one thing we've missed is snow, but not by much."

In fact, wind has prevented them from keeping a finished scorecard for each course they have visited, as their scorecard for Aberdeen's Moccasin Creek Country Club was blown away by a sudden gust. They did, however, receive a half-finished replacement from a friend playing alongside them.

Lee said he was inspired to try playing every South Dakota golf course from a state brochure listing courses statewide. He was then told by current state House Rep. Bernie Hunhoff of Yankton that others had tried the task but could not complete it within a year.

But completing this goal is not meant to be something to boast about, Lee said, but more as a way for him and his son to spend time together.

"I started playing golf again more when (Jake) started playing two years ago," he said. "Now I only really play with him — I don't have much time otherwise."

Neither Schoenbeck would describe themselves as great golfers.

Throughout the first nine holes at Hillcrest, both father and son teased each other with playful taunting and occasional praise for a great shot. While the course's narrow fairways and abundance of trees caused many shots to go off-target, both stayed fairly positive.

"For me, that's a great shot — we're not giving up our day jobs," Lee said after a ball landed properly on the third hole's green.

"The point is to just get over the bad shots," he said later. "We're here to enjoy this."

Both had plenty of positive things to say about Yankton's two golf courses.

Lee described Hillcrest as a nicely designed, challenging golf course, with the 17th hole being one of the most difficult holes he has played in South Dakota so far.

Fox Run, on the other hand, was described as a much friendlier course for amateur golfers.
 "They're beautiful courses, the community has put some real effort into those," he said.

The Schoenbecks said they have completed at least 44 courses as of Saturday and hope to finish playing every course by Labor Day.

The duo is letting others follow them on their "personal challenge," as described by Jake, through a public Facebook group called "Schoenbecks Golf South Dakota," where they post photos and comment on courses as they play them.

According to the Facebook group's description, the plan is to play the around 120 golf courses in South Dakota. "It includes all the par 3s, small town 9-hole sand greens, and of course every other normal golf course," as written on the website.

Because both have continued obligations back in Watertown, they cannot play every day. They plan to play every weekend, but approximately once a month, they will play a stretch of Friday through Tuesday.

"You have to make yourself play at least five courses a day, otherwise the math doesn't work out," Lee said.

The obligations are more family-based than work-based, Lee said, as family events are harder to arrange around than his admittedly fluid work schedule.

But again, Lee said the time spent with his son might be the best reason of all to complete this journey.

"With my son, he's getting a lot of chance to see South Dakota, Lee said. "I also think there are a fair number of life lessons you impart with this. ... Your kids learn from you, and if you spend time with your kids, then when they have kids they'll know when to spend time. Kids learn what they live."
