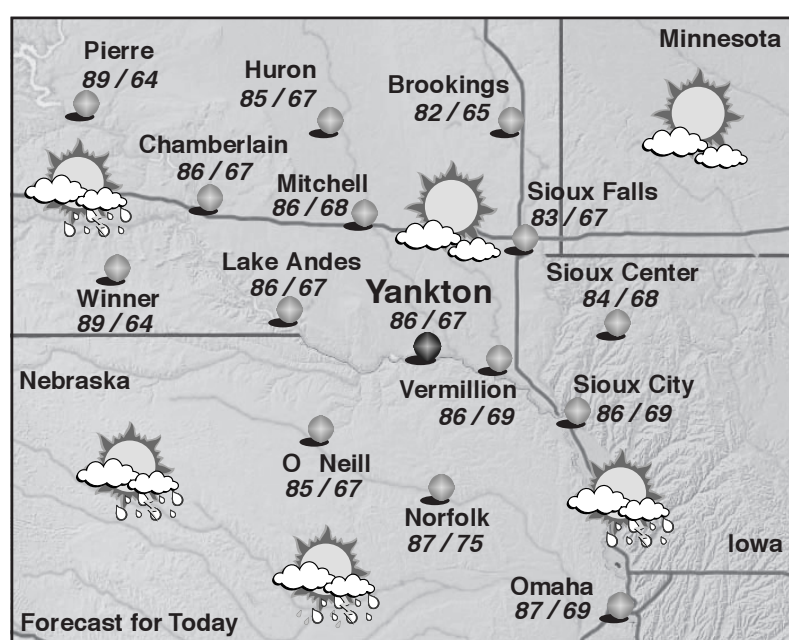

are followed," Hein said Tuesday. The Yankton Sioux Tribe in May 2002 passed a resolution seeking to acquire the travel plaza site and 26 other parcels. In April 2009, the Interior Board of Indian Appeals affirmed the Bureau of Indian Affairs regional director's decision to accept the land into trust. The board in its decision said the site was originally allotted to the tribe member Anna Kutena Wahachunka, who took the land out of trust in 1916 and sold it in 1919. The tribe bought the land from Charles J. and Alice M. Fuchs in 1992, but it remained under Charles Mix County's jurisdiction. Hein said having adjacent sites under differing jurisdictions can create law enforcement issues. A different parcel in the city of Wagner consists of 40 acres in the middle of town, creating a situation in which officers could arrest someone on one side of the street but not the other. "In the heart of a city, you can imagine what kind of nightmares that can create," she said. The recent suit was filed against the U.S. Department of Interior, Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs Larry Echo Hawk, Bureau of Indian Affairs Regional Director Michael Black and Ben

Kitto, superintendent of the bureau's Yankton Agency. A call to the BIA's Great Plains Region in Aberdeen was referred to the agency's public relations office in Washington, and that call was not immediately returned. In an 1858 treaty, the Yankton Sioux Tribe gave up 11 million acres in exchange for cash and a 430,000-acre reservation, which once encompassed about 60 percent of Charles Mix County. A federal law passed in 1887 allowed each tribal member to get 160 acres, and more than 260,000 acres were allotted to individual members of the tribe. Most of that land has since been sold to non-Indians. The federal government agreed in 1894 to pay the tribe \$600,000 for 168,000 acres later opened to white settlers. The dispute over the status of the reservation began in 1992 when a regional landfill was proposed for construction in Charles Mix County. U.S. District Judge Lawrence Piersol of Sioux Falls has ruled that at least a small part of the once-huge Yankton Sioux reservation continues to exist and remains under the legal jurisdiction of the federal and tribal governments. A federal appeals court last summer upheld Piersol's ruling that the reservation covers more than 30,000 acres, which is mostly land the government holds in trust for the tribe and individual tribal members.

According to the American Heart Association Web site, the National Survey on Drug Use and Health estimates that each day more than 4,000 people under 18 try their first cigarette. It estimates that the tobacco industry needs to recruit 5,000 new young smokers every day to maintain the total number of smokers (due to the number of people who quit or die from tobacco-related illness each year). The Department of Health and Human Services estimates that 90 percent of smokers begin tobacco use before age 20; 50 percent of smokers begin tobacco use by age 14; and 25 percent begin their smoking addiction by age 12 (the 6th grade). "When we talk to the kids, they admit that they have seen (peers smoking) — they know it is going on," she said. "The tobacco companies are making an effort to try to get the children as young as they can because the younger they start smoking, the

harder it is to quit. Nicotine is an addiction and it takes both time and resources to quit." One of the resources that the coalition advises current smokers who wish to quit use is the state QuitLine. The Department of Health reports that the South Dakota QuitLine's success rate increased significantly from 29 percent in 2007 to 43 percent in 2008. A quit attempt is considered successful once 12 months have passed without tobacco use. In comparison, only about 5 percent of people who quit on their own are still abstinent a year later. "Tobacco prevention and control is a priority in our state, and it's paying off," said Doreen Hollingsworth, Secretary of Health. "Fewer people who smoke means fewer people suffering or dying from tobacco-related diseases. It also means our state will save millions of dollars in future health care costs. We must continue to look for ways to reach people who are addicted to this deadly habit, and keep kids from ever starting so they'll live longer, healthier lives." The adult smoking rate in South Dakota has dropped more

than 21.5 percent since the Department became the lead agency for state tobacco control efforts in 2001. According to estimates from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention there are now at least 38,600 fewer people smoking in South Dakota and an estimated 1,836 people will be spared early, tobacco-related deaths. The decline translates into at least \$65 million in healthcare cost savings through 2011 and at least \$325 million in healthcare cost savings through 2018, assuming healthcare costs and smoking rates stay at their current levels. "I think everyone understands that cigarette smoke is harmful, even those who smoke," said Michael Pietila, M.D., Pulmonology, Critical Care, and Internal Medicine, Yankton Medical Clinic. "Data suggests that 70 percent of smokers want to quit and greater than 90 percent have tried. Successful cessation usually requires multiple attempts and only about 7 percent of smokers attempting to quit are smoke-free at one year. Smokers know they need to quit — they just have a hard time doing it. Several studies show

that the more treatments that you utilize the better your chances of successfully quitting smoking." People in South Dakota can receive free quit support by calling the toll-free South Dakota QuitLine at 1-866-SD-Quits (1-866-737-8487) or visit the Web site <http://www.befreesd.com/quitline.html>. Callers speak with a trained quit coach who works with them to identify smoking triggers, provides information about coping with withdrawal symptoms, helps develop a personal plan to quit and sends a packet of quit materials. More than 54,000 South Dakotans have called the QuitLine for help since it launched in 2002. "It takes a complete community effort to help reduce tobacco usage," Hochstein said. "Yankton is in the forefront. Our parks are tobacco-free. We have a great medical community and together with the city we are standing together to combat smoking. ... We try to be mindful that people have rights, but we want everyone to have the information, as well." CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery inched up 0.25 cent to \$4.5175 a bushel, while oats for July delivery surged 27 cents to \$2.74 a bushel. July soybeans lost 2 cents to \$9.495 a bushel, while July corn was

unchanged at \$3.5375 a bushel. Meanwhile, beef and pork futures traded higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle gained 0.28 cent to 90.05 cents a pound; August feeder cattle rose 0.55 cent to \$1.1097 a pound; June lean hogs added 0.07 cent to 80.12 cents a pound; and July pork bellies edged up 0.75 cent to 98 cents a pound.
