S.D. Officials Target Vehicle License Plate Fraud

SIoux FALLS — It's no secret that South Dakota's low taxes and lenient vehicle registration policies have made the state a haven for out-of-staters who license vehicles here.

License plates are cheap, and so is the state's excise tax on vehicles. There's no state income tax, and the law allowing out-of-state people to register their vehicles does not require them to set foot in the state to get South Dakota plates. The state is especially popular with people who live full time in recreational vehicles, a growing trend among baby boomers heading off to retirement.

But South Dakota officials are attempting to crack down on abuses of the system. Debra Hillmer, director of the state Division of Motor Vehicles, recently sent a memo to county treasurers asking them to demand more information from out-of-state residents before issuing licenses. A similar memo went to 10 mail-forwarding businesses, services popular with people who live outside the state but have vehicles registered here.

The goal, Hillmer said, is to discourage falsified applications and collect information on where people really reside. Ultimately, that information could be used by other states to crack down on their residents who license cars, boats and motor homes here.

But critics say it could cost South Dakota millions of dollars by discouraging out-of-state registrations. South Dakota's licensing fees help counties pay for road repairs, and the state collects a 3 percent excise tax on vehicles purchased and then licensed in South Dakota. New motor homes can cost hundreds of thousands of dollars and the tax revenue adds up.

Larry Sroufe, who owns the Sioux Falls mail-forwarding business Your Best Address, said his customers are wary of the new rules. He thinks they could deter registrations and hurt his business. He said it's not just the taxes that South Dakota will lose if that happens. Sroufe said many of his clients use South Dakota insurance brokers, lawyers and other professionals who also stand to lose business.

"There's a small fortune in annual renewals that are cumulative," Sroufe said. "The average RVer is an RVer for years. If someone just dismisses this and says it's not that important, this is someone that's not very bright."

Ronald Triebwasser, who owns My Home Address in Emery, also is upset. "It's ridiculous, and we're going to have a lawyer look into it," he said. "I don't know what they're thinking up there. They bring a lot of jobs and money into South Dakota, and they're screwing it up."

State law allows a person to license a vehicle by providing a South Dakota driver's license or a Social Security number with the application. Hillmer is requiring county treasurers, who handle licensing, to get a copy of photo IDs from people outside of the state, and she wants their applications to include their true residential addresses. Applicants who use a South Dakota mail-forwarding address now are required to sign an affidavit swearing they have no other residence outside of South Dakota. A person who lies on the affidavit could be charged with a class-six felony.

Hillmer said rule changes were needed because some people listed campgrounds as their residential addresses, even though they never had been there. Others used bogus Social Security numbers. By law, she added, anyone can register a vehicle here. She just wants accurate information on their applications.

2 Struggling S.D. Cemeteries Need Help

SPENCER — Twelve years later, the Spencer tornado continues to affect not just those living in this small community, but those who will stay here forever.

The Spencer Cemetery Association "is broke," according to cemetery board member Mike Moriarty.

"We've got \$259 left in our checking account," said Moriarty, 62, a retired UPS driver whose family ties to the community go back to the turn of the 20th century.

Cemetery board members want relatives of those interred at the

cemetery to know that unless donations are received — and soon — the community will no longer be able to care for graves at the South Spencer Cemetery.

The May 1998 tornado that leveled Spencer killed seven people, but it also forced many longtime residents to move from town.

Spencer's population of 370 dropped to 170 after the tornado. Moriarty said. Some tornado victims who did not end up in the cemetery moved to other towns or went to live with relatives.

With them went much of the cemetery's financial support.

The grass grew well during last year's cool summer, and that was

hard on the cemetery budget. Even with a bargain rate of \$160 per moving, it cost the cemetery association \$3,200 to pay for upkeep in 2009.

Moriarty said five-acre South Spencer Cemetery has the most pressing financial problem, but the town's Pleasant Hill Cemetery also is facing similar financial pressures.

Cemeteries are about personal connections, he said, and most of Spencer's newer residents haven't had time to make those connections.

"I've got my own reasons to keep this place looking nice," he said. Mike and Kay Moriarty's daughter, Alicia, who died in an auto accident at age 16, is buried in South Spencer Cemetery.

Neb. Man Sentenced For Child Porn

OMAHA (AP) — A Sidney man has been sentenced to five years in prison for possessing child pornography. A news release from U.S. Attorney Deborah Gilg says 36-year-old Christopher Merritt was also ordered Friday to serve five years' probation after his release from prison.

Merritt was indicted in January 2009 on a charge of possession of child pornography. He faced up to 10 years in prison.

Gilg's office says the Nebraska State Patrol was investigating the distribution of child pornography over peer-to-peer computer networks and was able to access material on Merritt's computer. A search of his home yielded two computers, which authorities say contained about 13 pornographic videos.

Arguments Expected In Neb. Murder Case

DAKOTA CITY, Neb. (AP) — Opening arguments are expected to be heard Monday in the trial of a Mexican man accused of killing a 3-year-old Nebraska girl.

Jury selection in the murder case against 30-year-old Melecio Camacho-De Jesus began last Monday and concluded Friday, with 180 potential jurors narrowed to 12.

Camacho-De Jesus is accused of killing Evelyn Verdugo Paniagua on May 23, 2009, in her South Sioux City home as her family slept. Prosecutors say he sexually assaulted the girl before suffocating her.

Camacho-De Jesus, a Mexican national, had been living in Sioux City, Iowa, when he was arrested. He pleaded not guilty in August to first-degree murder and burglary. If convicted, he could face the death penalty.

His trial has been scheduled to run through the end of June.

New S.F. Mayor Targets Cell Phones

SIoux FALLS (AP) — New Sioux Falls Mayor Mike Huether says he wants to trim spending on cell phones for city employees.

Huether says half the city workers — more than 500 — have a city-paid cell phone. He says many employees need one in their job, but not that many.

He also wants to trim spending on printers because the city has one printer for every three employees.

Railroad Worker's Funeral Set For Tuesday

NORFOLK, Neb. (AP) — A funeral has been set for Tuesday for a railroad worker who died when floodwaters brought down a bridge over the Elkhorn River.

The service for 38-year-old Jeffery Scholl of Norfolk will be at 10:30 a.m. at St. John the Baptist Catholic Church in Petersburg. Burial will follow in the parish cemetery.

Scholl was among three Nebraska Central Railroad workers checking on the railroad bridge in Norfolk last Tuesday when it collapsed, dumping them into the fast-moving current. Two of the workers were pulled out of the river alive. Scholl's body was found Friday.

Scholl is survived by his wife, Suzie, and two young sons.

S.D. Drowning Victim Gets Special Honor

RAPID CITY (AP) — The family of a Madison man who drowned last summer in Lake Madison while rescuing two others will get a special honor for his sacrifice.

The South Dakota Army National Guard will hold a ceremony next Saturday in Brookings to honor 18-year-old Dylan Nelson. His family will be given a Soldier's Medal, an award given to military members who risk their lives to perform heroic acts in noncombat situations.

Nelson, a private, is credited with helping save his younger brother and cousin from drowning when they were overcome by turbulent water, before succumbing to the water himself.

In March, the Congressional Medal of Honor Foundation posthumously honored Nelson with its Citizen Service Above Self Honors, which recognize selflessness and courage.

Neb. Artist Creates Mural For Library

WAHOO, Neb. (AP) — Artist Rhonda McClure revealed a new chapter of her career.

McClure, a longtime resident of Saunders County, wanted to draw attention to the Wahoo Public Library.

She created a mural depicting the building that housed the former library in the 1920s — City Hall. The library board had given its stamp of approval. Board member Rita Lindahl had a postcard of the old building.

"That's all I had to go on," McClure said. She used a limited palette of just two colors of acrylic paint.

"Going with the same idea as a black and white photo," she said. The 6-by-10 foot painting in a handmade frame was recently unveiled.

The library began through the efforts of the Wahoo Women's Club.

"They thought there should be a public library and began a fundraiser in 1923," McClure added. "The mayor said they could use a room in City Hall."

"The mural is a fabulous addition to our library — it is nice to have work from a local artist," said Denise Lawyer, library director.

McClure's work speaks volumes. "It has sparked conversations about the past," Lawyer added.

"It's excellent. I think it's a wonderful display of what someone can do," said Milrae Anderson of Wahoo, a retired kindergarten teacher.

Anderson began frequenting the library as a young girl in about 1930.
