summer interns in the office area, volunteer campground hosts and five naturalists who both work with coordinating with other agencies for providing programming such as this week-end's Heritage days and providing their own programming.

"Memorial Day weekend, June through the end of July, we are booked solid, then Riverboat days through Labor Day we are usually full as well," Bertch said.

Those high visitor numbers are reflected at the Lewis and Clark Visitor's Center, located above the Gavin's Point Dam.

"We have an average of about 2,000 visitors come through the Visitor's Center each week," said Park Ranger Karla Zeutenhorst of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. "Some weeks we have less; of course, a lot of it will depend on the weather, but then on the very busy weekends, like the holidays and Fourth of July, it will be even busier."

Zeutenhorst said the center provides a great resource for visitors to find out what entertainment options are available in the area including in the city of Yankton.

"They come out and take advantage of all the great camping in the area, both on the South Dakota and Nebraska sides," she said. "After a few days or if it is a rainy day, they are ready to do something indoors and they come here both for the great displays depicting the area, and also to find out what other events are going on."

Zeutenhorst she has a great working relationship with all of the area agency officials, including Anne Doherty-Stephan the new Chief of Interpretation and Education of the Missouri National Recreational River located in Yankton. The partnerships with the other agencies and organizations is ongoing and growing.

Doherty-Stephan said that even though this is her first summer in Yankton, she is enjoying seeing what programs have already been established and working to build new ones.

"We have our new teacher-ranger-teachers working on strategic planning for programs of the future," she said. "We had our first teacher in-service program last week for teachers in the area on how to incorporate what the river offers into their lessons. Things are progressing very well."

Along with the teacher-ranger-teacher program, the summer staff is also working with guests along the river, providing junior ranger programs and educating visitors on the resources that the river provides to the area both as a natural resource and as a recreational area.

With the agencies working together to help create a fun destination vacation area, new programs and changes to the parks are being implemented each summer.

Perhaps the biggest change that the parks services have seen this summer is the implementation of the same-day reservation system.

"Before we would have people camped out front overnight waiting to get spots," Bertch said. "Now they can call in or go online at 7 a.m. the day they want to arrive to make their reservations. It just makes it a (fairer) system for those people who couldn't be here because of work, travel time or any other reason."

'Toy Story 3' Scores Big

LOS ANGELES — Movie fans have not outgrown the "Toy Story 3" gang.

The animated sequel about toys that come to life leaped to the No. 1 spot with a \$109 million opening weekend, according to studio estimates Sunday.

"Toy Story 3" became the third animated film to top \$100 million in the first weekend, joining "Shrek the Third" at \$121.6 million and "Shrek 2" at \$108 million.

It was by far the best debut for a film from Disney's Pixar Animation, topping "The Incredibles" at \$70.5 million. "Toy Story 3" took over the No. 1 spot from Sony's "The Karate Kid," which pulled in \$29 million to raise its 10-day total to \$106.3 million.

The weekend's other new wide release, the Warner Bros. action tale "Jonah Hex," bombed with just \$5.1 million.

seen its Hispanic population surge in the past two decades. That increase is largely because they were recruited to work for the Fremont Beef and Hormel plants, and the city maintains an enviably low unemployment rate.

Nonetheless, residents worry that jobs are going to illegal immigrants who they fear could drain community resources.

Clint Walraven, who has lived in Fremont all his 51 years, said the jobs should go to legal residents who are unemployed — something he believes the ordinance would help fix. Discussions on the issue can get heated, he said, particularly if racism is mentioned.

"It has nothing to do with being racist," he said. "We all have to play by the same rules. ... If you want to stay here, get legal."

When he worked at the Hormel plant in the 1980s, Walraven said, he had one Hispanic co-worker.

From about 165 Hispanics — both legal and illegal — living in Fremont in 1990, the total surged to 1,085 in 2000, according to census expert David Drozd at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. He said an estimated 2,060 Hispanics lived there last year. In May, Fremont recorded just 4.9 percent unemployment, in line with the statewide rate and significantly lower than the national average of 9.7 percent.

If approved, the measure will require potential renters to apply for a license to rent. The application process will force Fremont officials to check if the renters are in the country legally. If they are found to be illegal, they will not be issued a license allowing them to rent.

The ordinance also requires businesses to use the federal E-Verify database to ensure employees are allowed to work. Supporters of the proposal say it's needed to make up for what they see as lax federal law enforcement. Opponents say it could fuel discrimination.

Results are expected Monday night.

Ron Tillery, executive director of the Fremont Chamber of Commerce, which opposes the

measure, said businesses are concerned the E-Verify system isn't reliable and that they would be subject to fines if forced to rely on it. He pointed out that the main targets of the ordinance — the Fremont Beef and Hormel plants — would not be covered by it anyway because they are located outside the city.

Walraven said the measure is necessary because workers send their salaries to family in Mexico instead of spending it in the city. "I understand supporting your family," he said. "But it's very much at our expense. We're footing the bill."

Those costs include spending on education and medical care, said Jerry Hart, a Fremont resident who petitioned for the vote. He said the ordinance would help curb that spending and protect jobs.

He said it would also end the divisiveness that's taken over. "The division is because the illegal aliens are here and nobody's taken care of it," he said. "If it does not pass, it's going to get worse."

The Fremont Tribune has reported several instances of legal Hispanic residents being told to return to Mexico, includ-

ing a woman who was shoved and yelled at by an elderly white man in a grocery store.

Hart said he's been called a Nazi. "Fear is kind of guiding," said Ostrom, adding that frustration about immigration issues nationwide ignites a misconception that all Hispanic immigrants in Fremont are illegal.

Sandra Leffler, 69, who owns a downtown antique store with her husband, Marv, said she knows not all Hispanics are illegal immigrants, but that it's hard not to think that way. She said she scrutinizes her Hispanic customers.

"I have to admit, when I see them come into the store ... I can't help wondering if I'm profiling someone who's completely honest," she said.

The Fremont City Council narrowly rejected a policy similar to the proposed ordinance in 2008, but proponents got it to a public vote and the state Supreme Court refused to block it.

The Nebraska chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union has threatened a lawsuit, and the city worries about the cost of defending the policy. The city has estimated the legal action

would cost \$1 million per year to fight — costs that would have to be covered by property tax raises and city job cuts.

Kansas City, Mo.-based attorney Kris Kobach, who worked on the Arizona law and has been in legal battles over local ordinances elsewhere, said Valley Park, Mo. paid between \$250,000 and \$300,000 in legal fees in a similar case. Valley Park, like Fremont, is covered by the 8th Circuit.

State Sen. Charlie Janssen of Fremont, who has said he may introduce an Arizona-style bill in the Legislature next session, said it's unfortunate residents have to decide how to vote amid threats of a lawsuit. He has declined to give his position on the ordinance, saying residents need to decide on their own.

"A vote for or against the ordinance does not make you more or less patriotic," he said in a posting on his legislative blog. "Just as a vote for or against the ordinance does not make you racist or not."

Tips from the COUPON QUEEN

Shopping with Coupons: The More, the Merrier?

Q: "I really enjoy your column. It is amazing how much money I have saved since I started using coupons! But I have a question. Are you allowed to use more than one coupon on any given item? I feel that if you have more than one coupon for an item you should be able to use them. Otherwise, where is the great savings that so many people talk about? I have heard of people having their entire grocery bill paid by the use of coupons."

A: Can you ever use more than one coupon on the same item? To answer this, you'll need to first determine what kind of coupon you're dealing with. Coupons fall into two major categories: manufacturer coupons, which are issued by the manufacturer of a product; and store coupons, which are issued by the store itself.

A manufacturer coupon will always have the wording at the top, "Manufacturer Coupon." As we discussed in last week's column, regardless of whether the coupon bears a store's name or logo, if it contains the words "manufacturer coupon" it's been issued by the manufacturer.

A store coupon typically looks different from a manufacturer coupon. The bar code is usually a different size or format than the one that appears on a manufacturer coupon. It also typically contains the words "Store Coupon."

Now that the difference is clear, here are the rules. Manufacturer coupons state "Limit One Per Purchase." This legal wording can be confusing, but what you need to remember is this: each item we buy is considered a purchase. Each trip through the checkout lane is considered a transaction. So, keeping in mind that each item is considered a purchase, the coupon limit statement becomes clear: "Limit one manufacturer coupon per item purchased."

You can always, only and forever use just one manufacturer coupon per item purchased. The register will not accept more than one manufacturer coupon for the same item and the legal terms of the coupon itself prohibit it. If I have two \$1 manufacturer coupons for a bottle of juice I cannot use them both on the same bottle of juice. The coupons are limited to one coupon per item purchased. I would need to buy two bottles to use both \$1 coupons.

You may think that just because you have two manufacturer coupons for the same item that you should be able to use them together, but this is never the case. The register will not allow it and neither will the store. When a store redeems those coupons with the manufacturer, the manufacturer can audit the store and ask for proof that it sold as many items as it submitted coupons for. If the store cannot provide proof and if, in fact, it violated the terms of the coupon and accepted more than one manufacturer coupon for the same item, the manufacturer can refuse reimbursement.

Store coupons are completely different. These typically can be stacked with a manufacturer coupon and used on the same item. Store coupons function as sale price reductions for the store.

If I have a 75-cent store coupon for juice and a \$1 manufacturer coupon for the same brand and size of juice, I can use these together. Coupon shoppers call this "stacking." If I stack the 75-cent store coupon for the juice with the \$1 manufacturer coupon, I save \$1.75 on a single bottle of juice, an excellent discount.

You asked where the "great savings" are if shoppers can't use more than one manufacturer coupon on the same item. Great savings comes by combining high-value coupon discounts with low sale prices on a week-by-week basis. More on this in next week's column.
