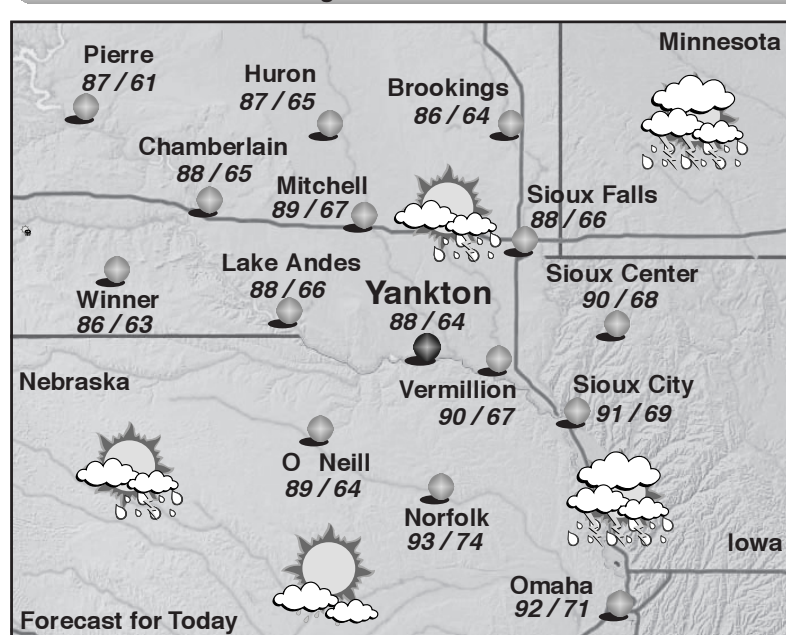

Releases From Gavins Point Dam Reduced

OMAHA, Neb. — Releases from Gavins Point Dam were cut by more than 50 percent Sunday night to reduce downstream Missouri River levels and take the pressure off many levees threatened by high water. Gavins Point releases were cut from 33,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 15,000 cfs. They will be held at this level for several days until flooding begins to subside downstream. Travel time for the lower flows is four days to Nebraska City, Neb., 4.5 days to Rulo, Neb., five days to St. Joseph, Mo., 5.5 days to Kansas City, and 10 days to the mouth. The Missouri River is above flood stage from Plattsmouth, Neb., to its confluence with the Mississippi River north of St. Louis. Nearly all the tributary rivers that flow into the Missouri are also above flood stage.

Gavins Point Dam Road Closed Wednesday

The road that crosses Gavins Point Dam, also known as Crest Road or the spillway, will be closed from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Wednesday, to conduct maintenance on the road. Motorists should seek alternate routes.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery inched up 0.25 cent to \$4.62 a bushel, while July corn lost 5.75 cents to \$3.55 a bushel and oats for July delivery rose 1.5 cents to \$2.645 a bushel. July soybeans jumped 2.25 cents to \$9.6325 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures traded higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle gained 1.12 cents to 89.32 cents a pound; August feeder cattle rose 1.33 cents to \$1.117 a pound; July lean hogs edged up 1.13 cents to 82 cents a pound; and July pork bellies added 0.88 cent to \$1 a pound.
