Such bids are to provide for the construction of **Project P 0ENH (178), Deer Boulevard Shared Use Path** for Yankton County, South Dakota.

Bids are invited on the following major items and approximate quantities of work:

was him. We've just treated it like it's a possibility."

Harris-Moore has become a folk hero to some. National media outlets have profiled him, and Harris-Moore shirts are a hot seller for at least one retailer. More than 40,000 people have signed on to his Facebook fan club, where he is described as "the real life 21st century outlaw. The world is his playground."

In May, he left \$100 and a note at an animal clinic in Washington, adding to his populist appeal in some people's eyes.

Whether Yankton was a brief backdrop to the alleged young criminal's exploits is uncertain, but what follows is what is known about the events that transpired in the city last week.

At 7:21 a.m. Wednesday, a report was received from the Chan Gurney Airport of

a burglary. Keys to a vehicle were taken, along with a few other miscellaneous items. During the investigation into the incident, police discovered a vehicle in the airport's parking lot that had been reported stolen from an airport at Spearfish.

It wasn't until 3:02 a.m. Friday that the Yankton Police Department received a report of a burglary in the 400 block of Belmont Avenue, which is located near the Hillcrest Golf Course in the northeast portion of the city. Kelly Kneiff and his family had just returned home from a vacation and noticed a door was ajar that had been locked when they left. Upon learning a man was in his home, Kneiff chased the burglar into the basement. However, the intruder pointed a laser and threatened to shoot Kneiff if he did not get out of the house. Kneiff complied and the police were contacted. By the time authorities arrived, the suspect had fled the residence.

Kneiff never saw the intruder's face and could not identify him beyond say-

ing he was an approximately 180-pound, more than 6-foot tall white male. Harris-Moore is described as being 6-foot-5.

Police also found evidence that the man had attempted to break into other neighborhood homes.

A search of the area was conducted into the daylight hours. Believing the suspect would not move during the day, authorities stepped back and kept an eye out for anything unusual while waiting for reinforcements to arrive. Codington County Search & Rescue brought in some bloodhounds to assist in the search, and a couple helicopters were brought in by the South Dakota National Guard.

"We did not want to contaminate the area for the dogs out of Codington," Hisek said. "The search really ramped up again when the dogs got here around 4 p.m. It went on from about 4 p.m. to between 10 p.m. and 11 p.m."

Information received from other law enforcement agencies convinced local authorities to take the

search to the level it was taken, according to Hisek. Contacts included FBI agents from South Dakota and Washington.

"When you start getting calls from different jurisdictions out west, saying, 'It sounds like it could be this guy,' we have to take it one step further," he said. "We would have had egg on our face if we said, 'It's just a burglar. We're not going to do anything,' and the next night he's found in a house again with another family and someone got hurt."

"I don't remember the last time we brought in dogs and helicopters from outside the area for (this kind of) search," Hisek added.

However, the suspect apparently managed to escape detection. Authorities believe he was responsible for the theft of a white 2008 Toyota Sequoia a few miles east of Yankton early Saturday.

"That was found down in Norfolk, Neb., near their airport, and their airport was also broken into," Hisek said.

By Monday afternoon,

there were media reports that the 2000 Cadillac Escalade stolen in Norfolk had been recovered in Pella, Iowa.

Hisek said the investigation into the local case will continue.

"We'll be requesting DNA tests on some of the evidence to verify whether it was (Harris-Moore) or not," he said. "If it wasn't him, maybe we'll get a hit on the nationwide DNA database."

He stated that he didn't know how long it will take for DNA results to come back from the lab.

The incident is a reminder to residents that the best security is your neighbors, according to Hisek.

"Nobody is better at identifying a stranger in the neighborhood than the neighborhood," he said. "If you see someone walking between houses and you don't recognize them, give us a call. We'll ID them. It's not that we're going to stop everybody that is walking around, but if they're in that neighborhood and nobody recognizes them, call."

The family got into its vehicle and backed out of the garage. By that time, Kneiff's 12-year-old daughter had dialed 9-1-1 and was speaking with a police dispatcher. He grabbed the phone and explained what had just occurred.

However, by the time police entered the house, the intruder had fled.

Although there has been speculation in media reports that the man was Colton Harris-Moore, also known as the "Barefoot Bandit," law enforcement has not conclusively identified the suspect. He has not been apprehended.

Kneiff said he never saw the intruder's face and was not able to identify him for police.

"All I saw was his backside," he said. "I saw elbows, knees and a butt. I did not get a good look at his face. The police brought me a picture of (Harris-Moore), and I could n't make an ID. He just appeared to be a white male, young and about 6-foot-3-inches."

Nothing much appeared to be missing from the home but some food, according to Kneiff.

"It looked like he was just needing a place to hide out," he said. "It appeared at the time we surprised him that he had just taken a shower. It appeared he was shaving his head. There was a razor and black hair all over the place. He had his clothes in our washing machine. It appeared he ripped open the lid to the washing machine, broke the latch and got dressed before sneaking out of the basement window prior to when

police arrived."

In the days following the incident, Kneiff said he has been trying to comfort his family.

"It was certainly unnerving," he stated. "Right now, I'm trying to give my family some peace of mind that this guy is no longer around and won't be bothering us. That's kind of hard when he hasn't been caught. The first night, (the kids) all slept in our bedroom. We've gradually been trying to get them back to their own bedrooms and get things back to normal. It's been tough."

The Kneiffs moved into the home in the northeast corner of Yankton about a month ago. The experience has brought the neighborhood together, Kneiff said.

Other homes in the vicinity had evidence last week that a break-in was attempted, according to the Yankton Police Department.

"A lot of neighbors are keeping their lights on at night," he stated. "I have a feeling (the intruder) is not going to do a repeat performance."

The Kneiff home was "locked up tight" when the man broke into it, but the experience has put the family on guard.

"Every night now, we go around and check all the locks to make sure everything is secure," Kneiff said. "We're more diligent."

He stated that he was very pleased with how law enforcement handled the situation.

"I think the police force did a good job in getting to everybody's house, letting them know what's going on and letting them know we had someone in the area," Kneiff said. "They collected a lot of evidence from our house. I'm very appreciative of their help."
