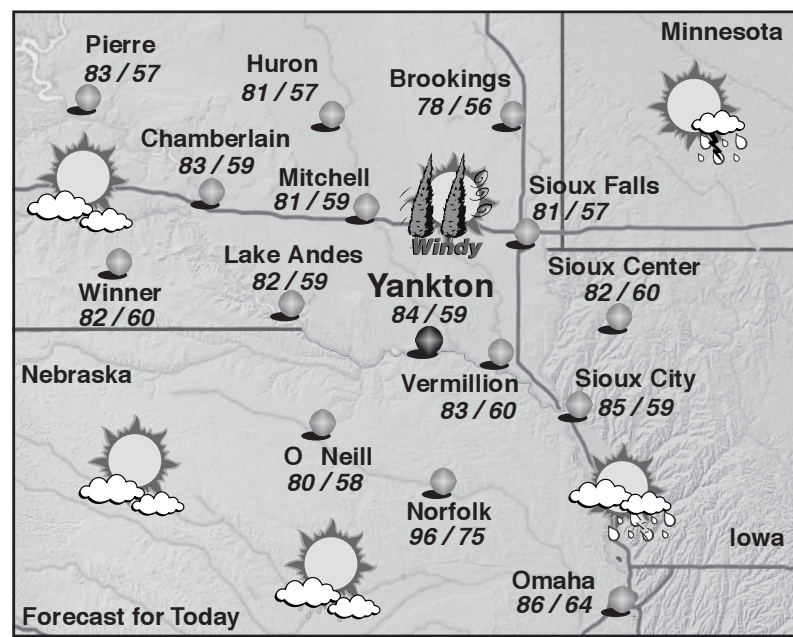

### CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Tuesday. Wheat for July delivery lost 1.25 cents to \$4.6075 a bushel, while July corn fell 3.5 cents to \$3.515 a bushel and oats for July delivery jumped 13.5 cents to \$2.78 a bushel. July soybeans rose 2.25 cents to \$9.655 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle shed 0.52 cent to 88.8 cents a pound; August feeder cattle inched up 0.12 cent to \$1.1182 a pound; July lean hogs slipped 0.05 cent to 81.95 cents a pound; and July pork bellies gained 0.45 cent to \$1.0045 a pound.

# Hundreds of People Cash In at the Vermillion Roadshow Yesterday

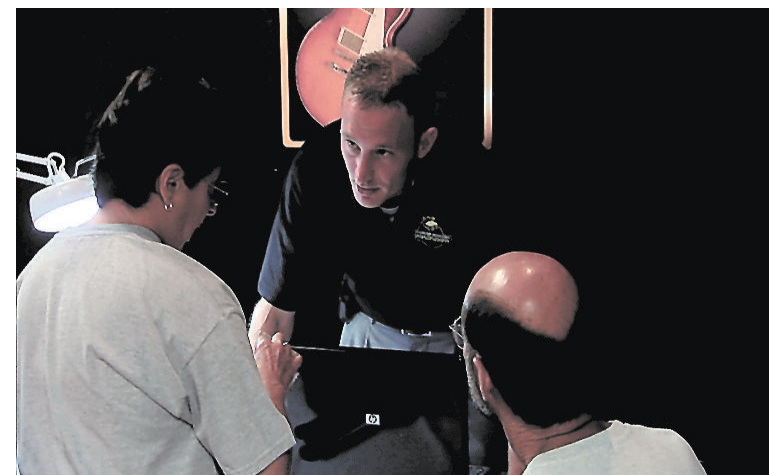

Antiques and collectibles are not the only items the Roadshow is buying. "Gold and silver markets are soaring," says Archie Davis, a Roadshow representative. "Broken

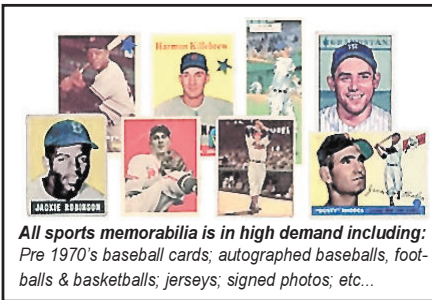
ring, two bracelets, and handful of silver dollars... his check was for over \$650.00. I would say that there were well over 100 people in here yesterday that sold their scrap gold."

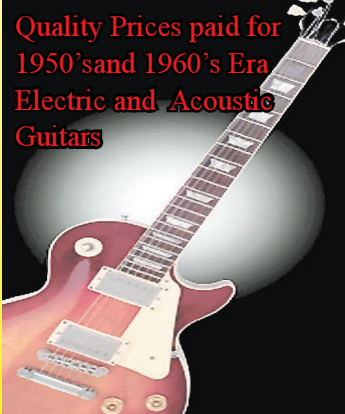
