Is There Such A Thing As A Born Leader?

Dear Dave,
 Do you feel that some people are born leaders, or do you have to read and study to become one?

Dear Michael,
 I don't believe anyone is born a leader. I've watched all three of my kids being born, and not once did the doctor say, "Congratulations, Dave! You have a little eight-pound, six-ounce leader!" No, I believe people make choices.

I'm 49 years old, and I've been studying leadership ever since I opened my company almost 20 years ago. I was really awful when I first started. I made so many bad, dumb mistakes! But I'm a world-class leader now. I've learned how to do this stuff, and it's taken thousands and thousands of hours of reading and studying and lots of experiences—both good and bad—to get to this point. It's also meant having to realize that I don't know everything and taking time to examine my mistakes and learn from them.

Malcolm Gladwell wrote a fabulous book called *Outliers*. In it, he studied people who are unusually successful. In the process, he discovered that while some people may have a natural predisposition toward some areas, the key was they took the gifts they had and then practiced and studied for thousands of hours to turn their gifts into world-class talents. In other words, these people made choices, and their "talents" were really

This stuff doesn't just occur. You're not a born leader any more than you're a born football player, actor or musician. You may start with a gift, but you have to make a choice to work your tail off if you want to develop that gift to its fullest potential!

SHOULD I STILL BUDGET BLOW MONEY?

Dear Luke,
 You bet! The key is to make that category very, very small. You shouldn't run around spending money on all kinds of fun stuff when you're trying to get out of debt. I want you to be really focused—gazelle intense—when it comes to getting out of debt. If you reach this level of intensity, there's naturally going to be less wiggle room in your budget,

because you'll be squeezing out every dime you can find to kill the debt!

Keep in mind that I'm not saying you can't have any fun at all when you're getting out of debt. But keep that category very small. We're talking about extreme sacrifice for a short period of time. I know it can be tough, but trust me—it's worth it!

LOCAL STUDENT COMPETES AT BAJA SAE CONFERENCE

Shane Grimme, a mechanical engineering student from Yankton, recently competed in the Western Washington Baja SAE Competition with a team from the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology.

The contest pitted the School of Mines against more than 80 teams from across the country and around the world and tested the team's ability to design, fabricate and race an off-road vehicle. The School of Mines Hardrock Gold team finished in second place overall at the competition. The university also raced an underclass team vehicle, Hardrock Blue, which received ninth place overall. The teams also received a number of event trophies including third place in cost and third place in dynamic events for the underclass car and second place in dynamic events and third place in rock crawl for the senior car.

The Baja cars were judged on design, cost and safety. Teams gave presentations about their cars, and showed off their performance during hill climb, maneuverability and acceleration events. The Baja cars and drivers were also put to the test during the four-hour endurance race over rugged terrain that tested the durability of each vehicle.

Mini Baja simulates real-world engineering design projects and their related challenges. Engineering students are tasked to design and build an off-road vehicle that will survive the severe punishment of rough terrain. The object of the competition is to provide students with a challenging project that involves the planning and manufacturing tasks found when introducing a new product to the consumer industrial market.

LOCAL STUDENTS COMPETE AT NASA'S LUNABOTICS MINING COMPETITION

Brandon Eisenbraun, a mechanical engineering student from Yankton and Nathaniel Hicks, a mechanical engineering student from Utica were recently part of a team of students from the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology who took fourth place at NASA's first annual Lunabotics Mining Competition, held in Titusville, Fla.

The goal of the competition was maneuver team-built robots to deliver more than 10 kg of regolith simulant within 15 minutes. The regolith simulant was a finely crushed volcanic rock mixed with pebbles, rocks, and very large rocks to simulate the lunar surface. Lunar regolith contains minerals that can be processed to produce oxygen and other materials to support a lunar colony and lunar missions to Mars and beyond.

The School of Mines team, the Moonrockers, competed against 22 teams at the event. It took them nearly 12 hours to establish communications in order to control their vehicle remotely from within the Astronaut Hall of Fame while the competition regolith pit remained outside of the building. The team's robot was able to collect 28 kg of the regolith simulant, but was unable to deliver it to the collection bin, resulting in a fourth-place finish.

CASSANDRA SCOBIC NAMED A DIMMITT SCHOLAR AT MORNINGSIDGE COLLEGE

SIoux CITY, Iowa — Cassandra Scobic, daughter of Jay and Gretchen Scobic of Yankton, S.D., was named a Dimmitt Scholar at Morningside College in recognition of high academic distinction for the 2009-10 academic year.

Scobic, a junior who is majoring in elementary education and Spanish, is a past graduate of Yankton Senior High School.

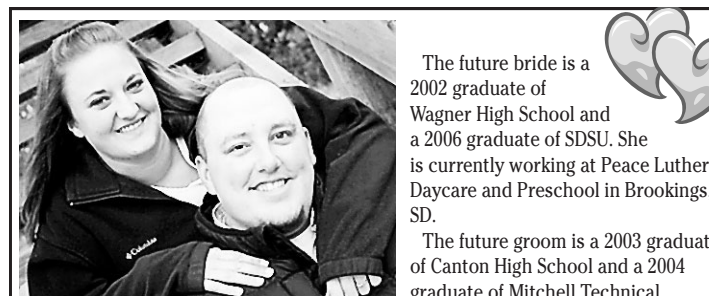

FIRE SCHOOL



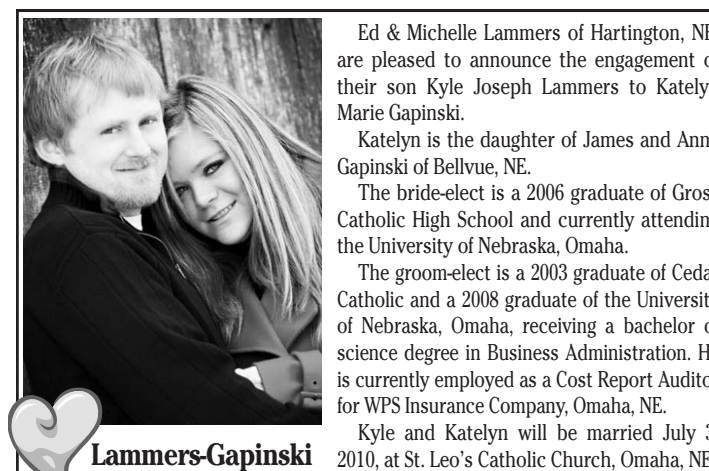

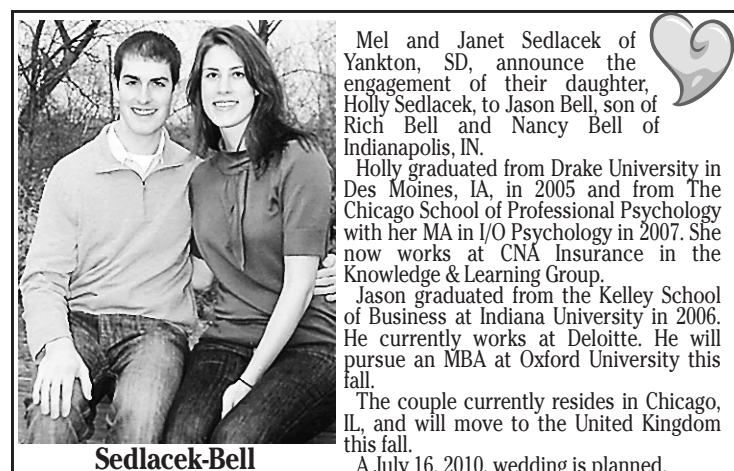
