## Ariz. Man Named To MNRR Post

OMAHA, Neb. — An Arizona man has been selected as the new superintendent for the Missouri National Recreational River (MNRR), headquartered in Yankton.

Steven N. Mietz will begin his new assignment Aug. 15. He currently serves as deputy chief of science and resource management at Grand Canyon National Park.

Mietz succeeds Mike Madell, who transferred to Vicksburg National Military Park in Mississippi earlier this year.

The new superintendent brings experience that will greatly benefit the Yankton region, said Ernest Quintana, Midwest regional director for the National Park Service (NPS).

"Steve's experience working on adaptive management of the Colorado River will be invaluable as he assumes this leadership role at Missouri National Recreational River," Quintana said in a press release. "Also of great benefit will be his work with endangered species and other natural resource management issues."

Mietz said he looks forward to his new role as MNRR superintendent and his move to Yankton.

"I am very excited about working with the staff and our partners along the Missouri River," he said. "(We will work) to preserve and restore the native ecosystem while enhancing the exceptional recreational opportunities that already exist."

A New Jersey native, Mietz earned his bachelor of science degree in policy analysis, with a minor in Park Management, from Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., in 1992. He graduated with summa cum laude honors.

In 1994, he earned his master's degree in environmental studies, minoring in park management, from the University of Montana.

His wife, Stephanie, was a librarian for the Grand Canyon Monitoring and Research Center. She now takes care of their young son, Jack, and dog, Willie.

Mietz enjoys a variety of outdoor activities, including hiking and camping.

The MNRR, authorized in 1978, protects two reaches of the Missouri River. The 59-mile portion originally set aside still exhibits the river's dynamic character and ever-changing nature in its islands, bars, chutes, and snags.

### CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures fell Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery dropped 8 cents to \$4.57 a bushel, while September corn slid 9 cents to \$3.3325 a bushel and oats for July delivery sank 13 cents to \$2.485 a bushel. November soybeans edged down 6.5 cents to \$9.12 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded mostly lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle lost 0.92 cent to 88.75 cents a pound; August feeder cattle fell 1.1 cents to \$1.1287 a pound; August lean hogs shed 1.22 cents to 80.95 cents a pound; and July pork bellies were flat at \$1.012 a pound.
