Pujols Shifts To Third Base Again To Aid Cardinals

ST. LOUIS (AP) — For the second time this month, Albert Pujols is starting for the St. Louis Cardinals at third base. Anything to help manager Tony La Russa get another productive bat in there.

La Russa's lineup on Tuesday night against the San Francisco Giants leaned heavily to offense and got Jon Jay, batting .390 his last 14 games and .343 overall, back into the mix. Lance Berkman moved from right field to first base and Jay started in right and batted second ahead of Pujols against Giants right-hander Ryan Vogelsong.

La Russa said he anticipated Pujols would be back at first base Wednesday when the Cardinals face Giants right-hander Tim Lincecum. He praised Pujols' willingness to move around but didn't want him playing too much at third base because he considers him one of the best first basemen in the majors.

Pujols made his first start at third base since 2002 on May 16 at home against the Phillies and fielded five chances flawlessly. Pujols is a two-time Gold Glove winner at first base, and La Russa said defense wouldn't be a problem at third.



Webster's Storley Earns First-Team Wrestling Nod

Logan Storley, a six-time state wrestling champion from Webster High School, headlines the 26th annual ASICS All-America Wrestling Team, according to a press release Tuesday.

Named to the First Team at 171 pounds, Storley will be honored prior to the finals of the ASICS Vaughan USA Wrestling Junior National Freestyle Championships in July in Fargo, N.D.

Storley, a University of Minnesota recruit, became the second South Dakotan and third wrestler nationally to win six individual titles, as he led Webster Area to a Class B team championship earlier this year. The only other South Dakotan to win six titles was Freeman's Kirk Wallman, who accomplished the feat from 1984-89.

Storley finished his career with a 262-3 record and won a state title at five different weight classes.

The ASICS All-America Team, selected by a nationwide panel of wrestling experts, is the only national all-star team for which wrestlers enrolled in all four high school grades are eligible.

The only other wrestler from South Dakota recognized was Rapid City Stevens senior Kris Klapprodt, an Honorable Mention at 171 pounds.

NHL's Thrashers Moving To Winnipeg

ATLANTA (AP) — First, the Flames. Now, the Thrashers.

Atlanta has become the first city in the NHL's modern era to lose two hockey teams as the Thrashers' owners agreed Tuesday to sell the struggling franchise to a group that will move it to Winnipeg next season.

True North Sports and Entertainment announced the deal during a news conference at Winnipeg's MTS Centre, where the team will play.

"Our objective was always to find a solution to keep the team in Atlanta, and we spent a considerable amount of time, effort and resources trying to do so," said Co-Owner Bruce Levenson. "This is not the outcome we wanted and it's extremely disappointing

that a buyer or significant investor did not come forward that would enable us to keep the team in Atlanta."

The deal is reportedly worth \$170 million, including a \$60 million relocation fee that would be split by the rest of the league.

Winnipeg has been without NHL hockey since the Jets moved to Phoenix in 1996. The Thrashers entered the league three years later as an expansion franchise, but ownership problems, a losing team and dwindling attendance doomed the club.

The team ranked 28th out of 30 teams this year with an average attendance of less than 14,000.

The deal still must be approved by the board of govern-

ors, which meets June 21, but that shouldn't be a stumbling block.

"I'm excited beyond words to announce the purchase of the Atlanta Thrashers," Mark Chipman, chairman of the board of True North, said during a news conference.

Assuming the deal goes through, Atlanta would become the first city in the NHL's modern era to lose two teams. The Flames moved to Calgary in 1980 after eight seasons in Atlanta.

The deal was completed early Tuesday.

"It's nice to be back in Winnipeg after all these years," said NHL Commissioner Gary Bettman, who attended the news conference.

Backup QB Green Transferring From Nebraska

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska backup quarterback Cody Green has decided to transfer after getting beaten out by Taylor Martinez for the starter's job last fall and having failed to make headway in the spring against new challengers.

Green and coach Bo Pelini confirmed the transfer in a statement Tuesday.

"The decision to leave was very difficult for me and my family," Green said. "It was by far one of the hardest things I've ever done. I talked to coach Pelini and he has offered to assist me in finding another school to continue my playing career. I wish coach Pelini and Nebraska nothing but the best this year and in the future."

Recruiting services pegged Green as one of the top 10 quarterback prospects in the nation when he was coming out of Dayton, Texas, two years ago. Fans be-

lieved Green was destined to be the next in a line of Nebraska quarterback greats like Tommie Frazier, Scott Frost and Eric Crouch.

Green, who backed up Zac Lee in 2009, wasn't up to the task when Pelini declared the starter's job open before the 2010 season. The more elusive and faster Martinez beat out Green and Lee, and blossomed into one of the top freshmen in the country before injuries slowed him the second half of the season.

Green didn't appear to have the coaching staff's confidence last season. It was Lee who took over for an ineffective Martinez in a 20-13 loss to Texas. And after Martinez sprained his right ankle late in the first half against Missouri two weeks later, Lee got the nod to take over in the second half of the 31-17 win.

Green did start in wins over Iowa State and Colorado.

USD's Snyder Caps Freshman Season With Shot Put Win

VERMILLION — University of South Dakota freshman Cody Snyder capped off an impressive freshman season for the men's track and field team with a strong showing at the Great West Conference Outdoor Track Championships, which were held in

Orem, Utah, on May 12-14.

Snyder, a native of Lake Andes and former Andes Central standout, was the highest-scoring freshman at the meet and accounted for 18 points as he helped the Coyote men's team finish second. Snyder won the

shot put (52-1.5) and placed second in the discus (157-10).

Snyder finished the season with a personal best of 162-3 in the discus, which he set at the Howard Wood Dakota Relays on May 6 in Sioux Falls.
