latest Missouri River information from Corps and local officials involved in the flood response effort.

At the opening of Thursday's special meeting, the County Commission approved a resolution declaring Yankton County a disaster area because of the flooding and requested a Presidential Declaration of Disaster in order that assistance from state and federal agencies may be made available to Yankton County, utility companies, residents and communities affected.

Scherschligt said 300,000 sandbags have been placed on the ground so far. On Thursday, 50,000 sandbags were produced thanks to the ongoing efforts of 100 South Dakota National Guard troops, 120 Yankton Federal Prison Camp inmates and 40 South Dakota Department of Corrections trustees. The county still has 600,000 sandbags on hand that can be filled.

In addition to the Yankton County Highway Shop and Riverside Acres Park, residents who need sandbags can pick them up at the intersection of 12th Street and Pine Street from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily. Drivers are advised to approach the site from the south on Pine.

A fourth sandbag pick-up location has been established at Dakota Premium Hay, 3704 E. Highway 50, on the east side of Yankton.

In addition to keeping an eye on flooding and erosion along the Missouri River, Scherschligt said his office has been monitoring the James River.

"The Jim River is high, but the water is still flowing outward," he said.

Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen noted that he has received

In response, the Corps must take actions to protect those species. Those efforts include habitat construction for the fish and birds, hatchery support for the pallid sturgeon, a rigorous research and monitoring program, and a bimodal spring pulse release from Gavins Point Dam intended to trigger spawning of the pallid sturgeon.

Those spring pulses may be canceled if conditions warrant. A

many phone calls about septic system flooding. Information on that can also be found at the YCOEM website.

Scherschligt said things have been going smoothly, largely because of the support of the Yankton community and beyond.

"I want to thank all of the volunteers, businesses and organizations in the community and abroad who have helped out with this disaster," he said. "Without them, it would have been tough."

In other business Thursday, the commission unanimously agreed to hire a 4-H coordinator on its own, as well as split the time of a second coordinator between Bon Homme and Clay counties if they agree. Both neighboring counties have expressed an interest in working with Yankton County under a new 4-H organizational plan put forth by the South Dakota Extension Service Cooperative earlier this spring.

Commissioner Allen Sinclair suggested the arrangement, whereby Yankton County would pay for 20 percent of the second employee's time, while Bon Homme and Clay would each pay for 40 percent.

He called it a no-lose situation that would allow Yankton County to have a little extra help for its primary coordinator while helping out its neighbors.

Because Yankton County has more than 2,500 youths, it is eligible for a .5 FTE and qualifies to receive \$16,750 annually to pay for the position. If the county (or counties) provides a matching \$16,750 to make the 4-H advisor a full-time job, the state adds a benefit package worth approximately \$9,000 annually.

Also Thursday, the commission approved a lease-buyback agreement with First Dakota National Bank for its new Highway Shop with terms that had previously been agreed upon, and it held an executive session for a contractual matter.

two-day pulse planned for March of this year was canceled because the Missouri River was already high at three downstream points, and the Corps didn't want to raise the river level even more.

Because of the multiple authorized purposes the Corps has in regulating the reservoir system, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service also allows the Corps to "take" (or drown) a number of tern and plover eggs and chicks every year. The Corps does what it can to minimize that "take" through minor flow manipulations that do not affect reservoir storage levels.

motorists who don't obey the flaggers are endangering those workers.

The flaggers will take down the license numbers of violators and forward the information to the authorities, who will issue citations, Henery said.

"The State Patrol and my office are patrolling the area," the sheriff said.

Hintz joined in emphasizing the need for keeping unnecessary traffic away from the scene of flood-fighting efforts.

"I know there has been a problem with 'lookie-loos' driving into flooded areas," she said. "If you're not a volunteer or a resident of a flooded area, you don't need to be there."

The unwanted spectators create a hazard and hamper flood relief, Hintz said.

"There is heavy machinery trying to work," she said. "If you're just driving around, looking to see what you can, you are in the way."

With the imminent closure of Highway 12, and possibly the bridge, authorities are focusing on providing other travel avenues in and out of northern Knox County, Hintz said.

Those options include main-

taining Nebraska Highway 14, which runs north and south from the western edge of Niobrara.

"The NDOR has been directed by the governor to do everything necessary to keep Highway 14 open by building up the portion of the road by the Highway 12/14 junction that would be flooded by the Niobrara River backing up," Hintz said.

Henery and South Dakota authorities are working on maintaining a route for first responders to reach Knox County residents living between Highway 12 and the Chief Standing Bear Memorial Bridge. Those residents would find themselves cut off by highway flooding.

"I have met with the Bon Homme County Sheriff and made arrangements in case we need (emergency medical services) in the area by the bridge," Henery said.

"(We have) four residences south of the bridge that we won't be able to reach because of (Highway) 12 being under water."

Avera Sacred Heart Hospital (ASHH) of Yankton is also working with first responders and health professionals on a flood preparedness plan, said ASHH spokesman Jay Gravholt.

"We receive ambulance patients from both Knox and Bon Homme counties," he said. "Avera Medical Group in Niobrara is (also) apprising us daily of their situation."
