### Work To Begin On Fort Randall Spillway Bridge

MITCHELL — The U.S. Army Corp of Engineers is scheduled to begin work repainting the U.S. 18/U.S. 281 Fort Randall spillway bridge on Monday, June 6.

One lane of the bridge will be closed to complete the painting in phases. Traffic will be required to stop and take turns going over the structure. A 12 foot width restriction will be in place and over-width traffic will need to find an alternate route.

All work is scheduled to be completed by Oct. 28.

### Free Child ID Kits Available Tuesday

Check 'n Go, a leading provider of consumer financial services with more than 1,000 retail locations in 29 states, is teaming with the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) to distribute free Child ID kits and child safety information Tuesday, June 7, running from 5-7:30 p.m. as part of the 20th annual Kids Art Festival in Riverside Park, Yankton.

An estimated 800,000 children may be reported missing in a single year or more than 2,000 children per day. Check 'n Go and NCMEC first partnered in 2007 to help families keep their children safer and help recover missing children.

In addition to the ID Kits, which help families keep the vital tools like up-to-date photos of their children that law enforcement would need in the case of a missing child. ern Canada to the Texas Gulf Coast — a project that has drawn fierce opposition from environmental groups who call the pipeline an ecological disaster waiting to happen. The proposed pipeline, like the existing pipeline, would carry crude oil extracted from tar sands in Alberta, Canada, to refineries in the U.S. Critics say the tar sands produce "dirty oil" that requires huge amounts of energy to extract, while supporters say the two pipelines would create thousands of jobs and help cut \$4-a-gallon prices at the pump.

Anthony Swift of the Natural Resources Defense Council, an environmental group, said the federal order blocking the Keystone line "should be a clarion call" for the U.S. State

Department to seriously consider safety concerns posed by the proposed pipeline from Canada through Montana to Texas. State Department approval is needed because the project crosses the U.S. border.

Pipeline regulators need time to sort out what has gone wrong with the current Keystone project before moving forward with the new one, dubbed Keystone XL, Swift said.

"The history of Keystone has shown that these pipelines are dangerous. State shouldn't fast track the review of Keystone XL until we know how they can be built and operated safely," he said.

Terry Cunha, a spokesman for TransCanada, said the company is focused on ensuring it complies with all 14 conditions set out by the U.S. order. The company hopes to have the pipeline system "up and running within a few days," Cunha said, although he could not give an exact timetable.

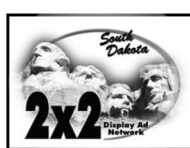
