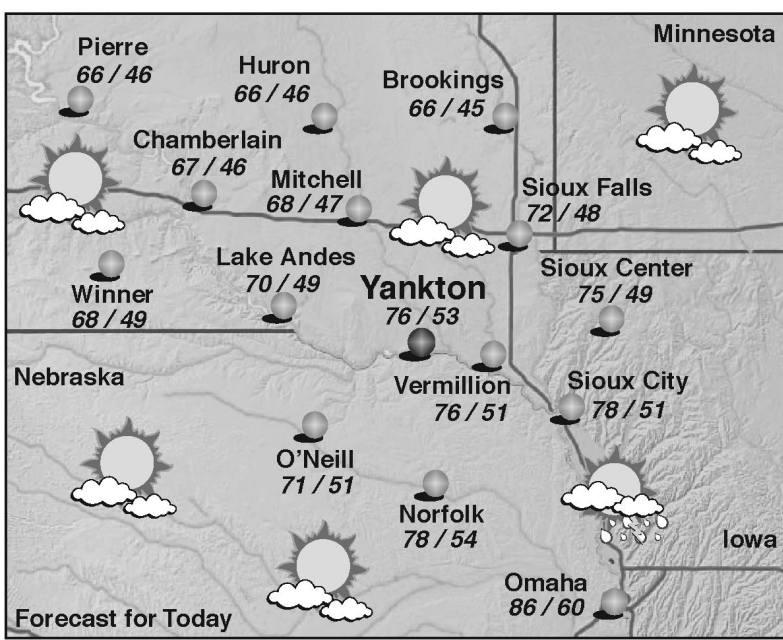

"Efforts continue to monitor the effect the rising Missouri River is having on the James River," he said. "Crews from the Emergency Operations Center are meeting with residents who live east of Yankton to evaluate the potential impact on their properties."

Raschke plans to visit Yankton County next week to review the flooding threat at the mouth of the James River.

He doesn't know what he will find when he arrives.

"We have never had this (historic) flooding before," he said. "We have no idea what 150,000 cfs is like. That's 1.1 million gallons a second."

Tuesday brought a number of other flooding developments:

- Nebraska state officials have closed a portion of Nebraska Highway 12 just south of the South Dakota/Nebraska state line because of Missouri River flooding.

S.D. Highway 37 south of Running Water meets up with Nebraska Highway 12 on the south side of the Chief Standing Bear Memorial Bridge over the Missouri River. This essentially creates a dead end on S.D. Highway 37 as well as cuts off access to Niobrara, Neb., from this route.

Motorists will need to find an alternate route.

At the request of the State of South Dakota, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and local officials, the U.S. Coast Guard has closed portions of the Missouri and Big Sioux rivers to recreational boating traffic.

Effective immediately, the Missouri River is closed from Sioux City to Gavins Point Dam. The Big Sioux River is closed from the confluence of the Missouri River to Military Road in the North Sioux City area.

These closures will remain in place until further notice.

Gov. Dennis Daugaard said the rivers are closed to help protect boaters along with protective structures in and around the rivers to mitigate flood damage.

"Our local rescue teams tell us high water levels and strong currents would make water rescues

extremely difficult," he said. "The safety of our citizens is always a top priority."

The South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks has closed all of its boat ramps in the affected areas. The state is encouraging local officials to do the same.

People who violate the closure order are subject to civil and criminal penalties.

- The river downstream from Gavins Point Dam provides a dangerous combination of flood currents and debris, Daugaard said.

"Everything from refrigerators to propane tanks to logs to parts of decks are floating down the river," he said. "Those things often are submerged just below the surface."

Daugaard stressed the need for exercising caution during the flooding danger.

"Personal safety should be our first priority," he said. "Everyone, please stay out of the river downstream from Gavins Point Dam."

On the other hand, Daugaard reminded the public that the reservoirs, including the boat ramps at Lewis and Clark Lake, remain open. He welcomed visitors to use those waters.

The levees from Gavins Point downstream are handling the increased flows, the governor said.

He also noted that the Missouri River topographical maps, including the Yankton area, are improved and posted on breadysd.com. Those maps are easier to read than previous models, he said.

- The Corps announced that Fort Randall Dam at Pickstown will see releases of 140,000 cfs today, reaching 150,000 cfs by next week.

Unlike Oahe Dam affecting Pierre-Fort Pierre and Gavins Point Dam affecting Yankton, the flows below Fort Randall Dam don't significantly impact communities, Daugaard said.

"There are campgrounds upstream from Fort Randall Dam that are impacted, but it's mostly farmland that is experiencing inundation," the governor said.

"The areas below Fort Randall, I have canoeed. There are either isolated islands, or there may be a few islands occupied by some residents along the river. But many (residents) are on bluffs along the river."
