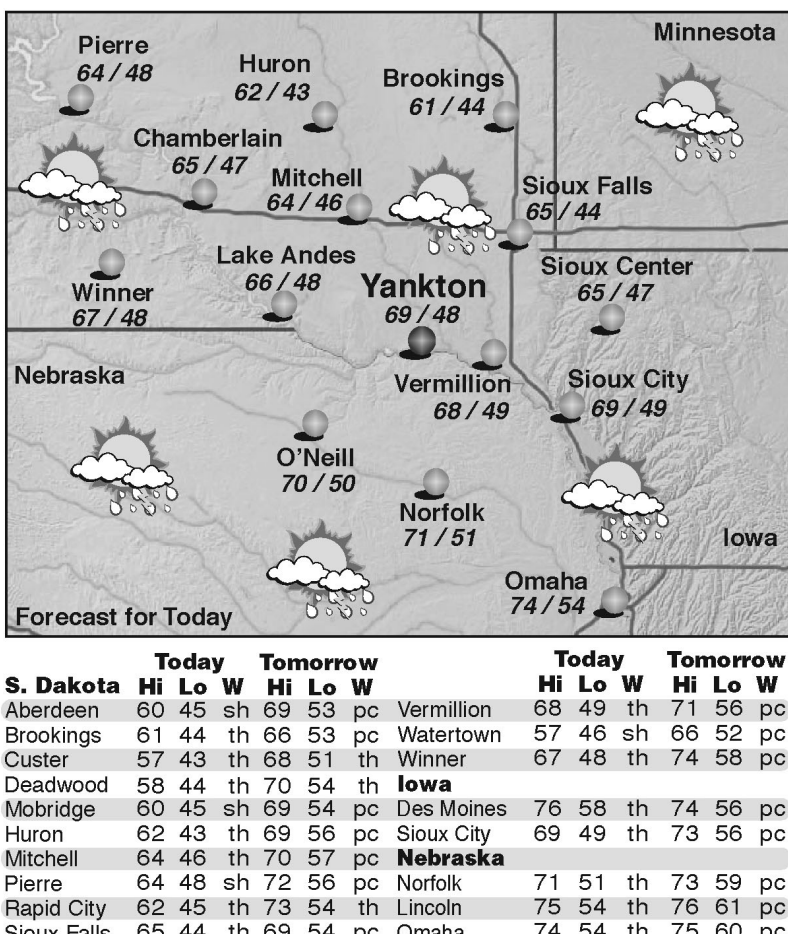

Brooke was airlifted to a Sioux Falls hospital. The extent of his injuries was not available at press time.

Yankton College Working To Preserve Its History

Because Yankton College is a significant part of South Dakota history, a grant opportunity gave the staff at the college office the motivation to implement a preservation plan to ensure appropriate measures of preserving the Yankton College Historic Collection for future generations. Yankton College, a 501c3, was one of six state history organizations awarded a grant this year through the South Dakota State Historical Records Advisory Board (SD SHRAB) through funding from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission. With the \$400 amount awarded, staff concentrated on preserving the oldest historical documents and college items dating back to the late 1800s when college founder Joseph Ward came to Dakota Territory to establish Yankton College, the first institution of higher education. Hand-written letters, certificates, bibles, journals, scrapbooks, photographs and other items were carefully placed in archival boxes and cataloged for future reference. Some of these items were stored in archival display boxes with clear lids for easy viewing. For more than 25 years, items and records related to life on the YC campus since its beginning have been acquired from alumni and friends and stored within the small administrative office. This project met goals of the SD SHRAB strategic plan to identify and protect these items at risk by using acid-free archival supplies and sound archival practices to protect the historical items for future generations. "If there is no action plan to preserve the Yankton College Historic Collection, an important part of South Dakota history will fade away, reaching a crisis point for these historical items," said Jan Garrity, Yankton College executive director. "It is essential that a plan be implemented, and the grant award gave us the impetus to begin our plan."

Residents Reminded Of Proper Sharps Disposal

The City of Yankton reminds city and area residents NOT to place syringes or needles in their garbage or recycling. They can only be disposed of in a special Sharps container. City Sharps containers are free for the asking for any resident at any of the pharmacies in Yankton or from the Yankton Transfer Station. The station is the drop-off location for the free Sharps containers. Businesses using syringes and needles should already have a disposal source. Syringes and needles are a very dangerous health hazard to all individuals who need to handle garbage and recycling products.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery fell 3 cents to \$7.45 a bushel; July corn jumped 21.50 cents to \$7.8550 a bushel; July oats rose 12 cents to \$3.95 a bushel; while July soybeans fell 7.75 cents to \$13.9375 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures rose or remained flat on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle rose 0.87 cent to \$1.0542 a pound; August feeder cattle rose 0.52 cent to \$1.2532 a pound; July lean hogs rose 1.62 cent to 92.97 cents a pound; while July pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.21 a pound.
