Jeter Limp Toward First Base, Leaves Game Monday
 NEW YORK (AP) — Yankees star Derek Jeter limped out of Monday night's game with a sore right calf in the fifth inning, stalling his pursuit of 3,000 career hits. There was no immediate word on the severity of his injury. Jeter singled his first time up against Cleveland for his 2,994th hit. He looked fine when he grounded out the next time up and seemed to be having no problems at shortstop.

But the New York captain looked to be having trouble as soon as he hit a fly to right field in the fifth. He was limping with his first step out of the batter's box — he wasn't totally hobbled, though it was noticeable — and jogged down the line. He touched first base after the ball was caught, returned to the dugout and left the game.

Great West Commissioner's Cup
 NAPERVILLE, Ill. — The University of South Dakota finished third in the Great West Conference Commissioner's Cup, the league announced on Monday. It is the second straight year the Coyotes have finished in the top three in the cup.
 The GWC Commissioner's Cup is given each year to the Great West member which accumulates the most points in relationship to placement in conference-sponsored championships for its combined men's and women's athletic programs. South Dakota finished with 63.5 points.
 South Dakota won Great West titles in men's and women's indoor track while placing second in women's basketball and men's and women's outdoor track.
 The Coyote track and field teams led the way by earning a three-peat at the Great West Conference Indoor Championships, accounting for 16 points. Coaches Lucky Huber and Dave Gotsleben were named GWC Coaches of the Year for the third straight year.

Houston Baptist To Add Football

HOUSTON — Houston Baptist President Robert B. Sloan, Jr., announced Monday that the Division I is prepared to begin the sport of football, should an appropriate league opportunity present itself. The announcement, which has the unanimous acceptance of the HBU Board of Trustees, follows a significant study conducted by a special committee of trustees, University staff and outside consultants.
 "Intercollegiate football will assist us in reaching our goals as we move HBU to the next level as a significant Christian university in a major city," Sloan said in the release. "We feel that adding football to our existing lineup of varsity athletic programs is an integral component of the Ten Pillars vision for the future of the University."
 HBU is returning to NCAA Division I competition as a member of the Great West Conference. HBU fields teams in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, track & field, and volleyball. The Huskies are the reigning conference champions in women's golf, soccer and softball and are past winners of the Great West Conference Sportsmanship Award.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) — Chris Taylor hit a two-run single with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning Monday, lifting Virginia to a dramatic 3-2 victory against UC Irvine and back into the College World Series.
 The Cavaliers (54-10) were down to their last out against Anteaters ace Matt Summers, making his first relief appearance of the season, when David Cole-

man singled to center, Jared King singled off Summers' leg and pinch-hitter Reed Gragnani drew a walk to load the bases.
 Taylor then took a called strike and singled up the middle, just out of the reach of second baseman Tommy Reyes as two runs scored, causing Davenport Field to erupt in a huge celebration.

tinued his brilliant postseason for Texas A&M, allowing two runs on three hits in 7 1-3 innings as the Aggies defeated Florida State 11-2 on Monday night to advance to the College World Series.

 Texas A&M (47-20), which won two of three games in the Tallahassee Super Regional, reached the CWS for the first time since 1999.

 Sandwiched between the State-U men's game on Thursday, Feb. 9 and the State-U women's game on Monday, Feb. 13 is a Saturday, Feb. 11 doubleheader against North Dakota State.
 By moving the series to during the spring semester, students can also avoid the potentially

hazardous travel conditions when they're not ready on campus, Saylor said.
 "I didn't want a bunch of students driving long distances, because you never know what the weather is like," he said. "I just felt much better having the games when they were already right here."
 A new aspect to the basketball schedules, according to Saylor, is that the women's game will likely begin earlier, to ensure that both contests are over sooner.
 "We'd like to see those women's games more in the 4 p.m. slot," said Saylor, who men-

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
