Panel members include Barb Fitzpatrick, FEMA floodplain specialist; Kelly Ingenthron, 30 year State Farm agent; Josh Nicholls, Hoffman Insurance Agency; Mary Sterk, 17 year Certified Financial Planner; and Jeana Goosmann, Attorney from Goosmann Law Firm. Each will give short presentations and answer questions.

Department Of Public Safety Dispatches IMAT

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Public Safety has dispatched an Incident Management Assistance Team (IMAT) to southeast South Dakota to help local entities coordinate their response to recent flooding on the Missouri River.

The 10-member team has been sent to Dakota Dunes to assist officials in Union, Clay and Yankton counties. This team will replace the Type 2 Incident Management Team (IMT) team that has been working in the area for the past two weeks.

IMAT teams were created by the department in 2007 for the purpose of increasing local incident management capability by providing situation assessment, coordinating resource requests, and helping to plan ahead for additional resource needs during and after the incident.

For this flood event, the team will work with local county emergency management as well as tribal officials, first responders, electrical cooperatives and other utility officials to assess and determine immediate response needs.

The team will not take over incident management activities. It will assist local officials in the impacted area with responding to the incident.

The IMAT team members are from South Dakota and include state, city, and county personnel who bring a wide variety of expertise including finance, administration, fire, law enforcement, and emergency management. Each individual has also completed nearly 200 hours of training. Each time a team is dispatched, they bring all of that experience and training with them.

Currently, there are four teams in the state with a total of 50 people located in western, central, southeast, and northeast South Dakota. The size of the team dispatched is based on the needs of each particular incident.

Since its inception, the IMAT teams have been dispatched eight times in addition to the current incident.

cross the Missouri River into Yankton County, where it damaged many residences.

"Tornadoes are always in the back of your mind, but our largest weather danger is a lightning strike," added Barry Schloss, the director and property manager of the Lewis & Clark Scout Camp.

Macke is a member of the properties committee for the Sioux Council, which governs the local camp, and lobbied the body to set aside funds for the housing/storm shelter facility.

Construction began in May 2010 and was largely complete by Memorial Day of this year. It features 12 living quarters that can each fit up to four camp staff members. Underneath the living facility is a concrete storm shelter that will be able to fit everyone that happens to be at the camp during a storm.

The living quarters have individual heating/cooling units that were purchased with the help of a donor.

"We have the ability to put in plumbing at some point if we

choose to, but I don't think we're going to do that," Schloss said.

"The staff lodge is immediately adjacent and has showers and bathrooms."

Macke said it feels good to have the project complete.

"I didn't sleep so good some of those weeks while working on it," he stated. "There were a lot of challenges. Getting volunteers is difficult, because everybody is busy. But I made a promise, and I wanted to fulfill it."

Macke and a handful of other core volunteers — Todd Sage and Matt Story, in particular — worked many weekends to complete what amounted to about a \$90,000 project. In all, a couple dozen volunteers were involved in the construction at different times.

"We're really tickled pink about it. It came out nice," Schloss said. "All the volunteer labor was a godsend. It wouldn't have been built otherwise."

Being a Boy Scout as a child and seeing the organization's positive impacts over the years have driven him to make a contribution, Macke said.

"This is a program I've believed in," he stated. "I've seen the benefits of it. I've seen it help youth and assist them in making the right decisions. I wanted to pay it forward a little bit."

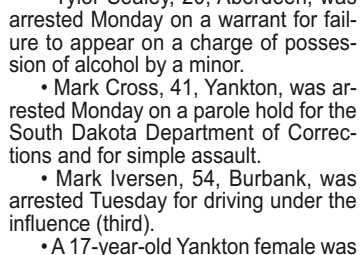

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures fell Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery dropped 11.75 cents to \$7.3125 a bushel; July corn fell 27 cents to \$7.5550 a bushel; July oats fell 13.50 cents to \$3.8750 a bushel; while July soybeans fell 14.75 cents to \$13.68 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures either rose or were flat on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle added 1.33 cent to \$1.0535 a pound; August feeder cattle gained 2.48 cents to \$1.2725 a pound; July lean hogs rose 0.93 cent to 94.45 cents a pound; while July pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.21 a pound.
