LifeServe Asking For Blood Donations

DES MOINES, Iowa — The flooding of the Missouri River in the greater Siouxland region has severely impacted blood collections in the area. LifeServe Blood Center (formerly known as Siouxland Community Blood Bank) has watched the blood supply dip to a critically low level during the past few weeks. Severe flooding has caused mobile blood drive cancellations or postponements in the area and low donor turnout. This has led to a loss of more than 200 units of planned blood collections. That number is projected to increase over the next few weeks as the flooding continues.

"We typically have a 3-5 day blood supply on our shelves at all times, however, the massive flooding that is occurring throughout the region has severely impacted our ability to collect blood. We have uneasily watched our

supply dwindle to very uncomfortable levels of less than a day supply of some blood types," said Christine Hayes, Vice President of Communications at LifeServe Blood Center.

More than 75 percent of the blood collected in the region occurs at mobile blood drives organized by businesses, churches, communities and civic organizations. The anticipation of several mobile blood drive cancellations in the coming weeks is cause for great concern and could significantly impact LifeServe Blood Center's overall blood supply.

"At this time, we are still able to respond to patient demand but with additional mobile blood drive cancellations in the coming weeks, we need to increase our blood supply immediately to stay ahead of those needs," said Hayes. "There are so many individuals in need

of help during this devastation and our hearts go out to all of those directly impacted by the flooding. We commend the many individuals who have stepped up to lend a helping hand during this crisis. We hope we can encourage a few more to roll up their sleeves to help the community blood supply get back to a comfortable level."

Donors are encouraged to schedule an appointment today to give blood at LifeServe Blood Center's 1016 Jones Street location in Sioux City or at a local community blood drive. Eligible donors must be at least 16 years of age (with parental consent), weigh 120 pounds or more, and be in good general health.

Vermillion Offers Assistance To Flood Victims

VERMILLION — Any South Dakota homeowner affected by flooding along the Missouri River may be eligible to receive up to \$5,000 in relocation assistance from the Vermillion Area Chamber and Economic Development Company (VCDC).

As property damage continues to escalate along the Missouri River, the VCDC is offering to help homeowners rebuild in or relocate to Clay County, regardless of the location of their flooded home.

"The flooding has just begun to damage and destroy property," says Steve Howe, executive director of the VCDC. "As homeowners look at starting over in the coming weeks and months, we want to provide financial assistance and the opportunity for a fresh start."

Relocation assistance is available to all residents of flood-affected areas. Homeowners interested in purchasing or constructing a home in Clay County can receive up to \$5,000 to offset expenses.

- A \$3,000 one-time payment for homes purchased between \$100,000 and \$149,000;
- A \$4,000 one-time payment for homes valued at \$150,000 and above;
- A \$5,000 one-time payment for new construction.

"We want to show compassion for current residents and also give a helping hand to all those affected," says Howe. "If you are forced to relocate as a result of this historic event, we are here to help you defray the costs of moving or rebuilding."

as much as 10 feet above flood stage in Missouri.

Pearson said Monday's breaches would provide only a temporary dip in river levels. Once the water spreads out, the pressure will build up and the river will rise again.

That was already the case near Brownville, Neb., just downstream of the breaches, where the river level went from 40.74 feet on Monday to 39.54 feet on Tuesday fol-

lowing the breaches. But the river had started rising again by 3 p.m. Wednesday when it was at 39.92 feet.

John LaRondeau, a civil engineer with the corps, said the situation along the Missouri River is distinctly different than the one along the Mississippi River earlier this spring, when the corps intentionally breached a levee south of Cairo, Ill., to reduce the risk of flooding in the city. In that case, the Mississippi water levels were expected to recede soon after the breach, whereas the Missouri levels are not.

The flooding threat has complicated travel in the western Iowa-Missouri border area, and state

officials were preparing to close a stretch of interstate that runs between the two states.

Gary and Veronica Andrews of Ocala, Fla., were on a trip to Yellowstone National Park in Wyoming when they spotted what appeared to be a giant lake pressing up against I-29. They pulled off the highway about 9 miles north of Hamburg to find every gas station, restaurant and motel was closed and surrounded by sandbags and dirt levees.

In Council Bluffs, two riverboat casinos permanently moored along the Missouri River are being monitored for any sign of structural problems.

Suing and the sergeant had allegedly carried on a number of on-line conversations, according to the newspaper.

Suing and the officer allegedly set up a meeting in a Beatrice park, where police were waiting and took Suing into custody. He is currently being held at the Gage County Detention Center where his bond was set at \$10,000.
