## Everharts Play At Gayville Hall June 18

GAYVILLE — Gayville Hall presents traditional, old-time country music artists Bob and Sheila Everhart at 8 p.m. on Saturday, June 18, in Gayville. Gayville Hall's country music hosts, John and Susan McNeill will also perform.

Bob Everhart recorded six albums on the legendary Folkways label, earned a Grammy nomination, and has been an international ambassador for American country music since the 1970s, performing extensively most years abroad.

He was an early pioneer of the Branson, Mo., music scene, hosting the shows at Silver Dollar City. He also created and hosted for seven years the public television show "Old Time Country Music," which is still broadcast in reruns on stations in 22 states.

Everhart produces Iowa's annual "National Old Time Country Music and Bluegrass Festival" over the Labor Day weekend, which has attracted crowds of 35,000 each year since the 1970s.

His repertoire includes Woody Guthrie, Hank Williams, original tunes, bluegrass and gospel.

# Chickens Rule Roost In These Books

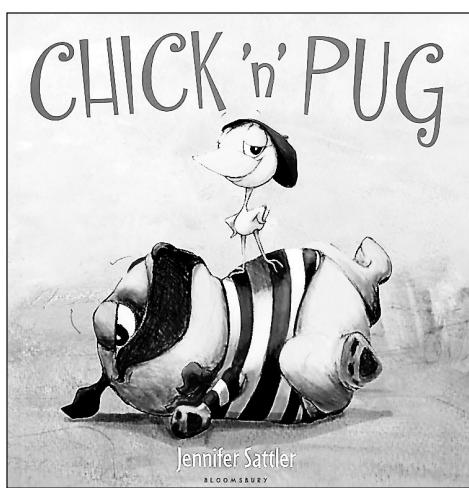

What could two chickens from two different picture books possibly have in common? Well, they both have these ideas about saving others and adventure.

In "Interrupting Chicken," Papa is reading a bedtime story to little red chicken. He starts off with 'Hansel and Gretel.' But just when he gets to the suspenseful part where the witch invites Hansel and Gretel into her house made of candy, a little red chicken jumps in front of them and yells, "Don't go in! She's a witch!" So they don't and the story ends.

Papa's a little irritated and makes little red chicken promise not to interrupt again. Little red chicken promises. Papa begins reading 'Little Red Riding Hood.' But just when Little Red Riding Hood meets the wolf, a little red chicken jumps in front of her and says, "Don't talk to strangers!" So she doesn't and the story ends.

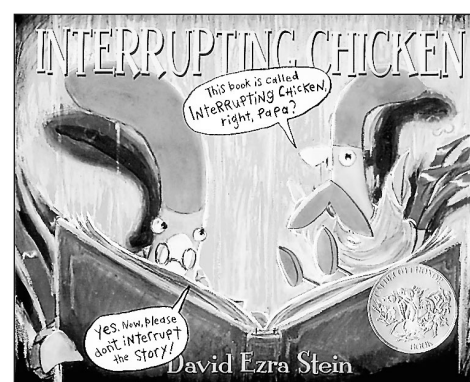
Papa's more frustrated by now and they try another story. You can guess what happens. So papa finally tells little red chicken that she must tell a story now. So she begins to make one up ...



This book, for children in preschool to grade 2, is just plain fun. After the first story that Papa reads, kids can guess what's coming and that's part of the fun.

In the book 'Chick 'n' Pug,' Chick craves adventure. After all, not much happens in the chicken coop. Certainly not like in his favorite book, "The Adventures of Wonder Pug!". So he sets off to find excitement.

Chick can't believe his eyes when he finds a real, live Wonder Pug. Even asleep, Wonder Pug looks wonderful to Chick. So he waits for Wonder Pug to wake up. And waits. And waits some more. Finally Chick is forced to wake him up.



Chick decides Wonder Pug must be saving his energy for his next great adventure. Chick is not disappointed when a strange lady puts a striped shirt on Wonder Pug. What moves Wonder Pug shows in removing the shirt!

When a cat invades Wonder Pug's territory, Chick is a bit puzzled by Pug's strategy to play dead. Perhaps Chick will have to drive out the invader himself ...

For the same age group as the first book, this book turns Chick's hero worship into the beginning of a friendship. Beauty and love truly are in the eyes of the beholder.

These books both empower the young chick to take action, something young children will thoroughly enjoy.

## Annual Midsommar Festival To Offer Food, History, Harmony

VERMILLION — Dalesburg Lutheran Church celebrates its 142nd annual Midsommar with history, music, fun and food on Friday, June 24. Valkommen! All are invited to share a day in the beautiful countryside near Vermillion, Centerville and Beresford.

The festival begins at 2 p.m. with an afternoon of history in the air-conditioned church. "140 Years of Dalesburg" will include songs and stories. After the program, visitors can browse booths and vendors and greet friends.

From 4:30 to 6:30 p.m., festival-goers can savor homemade meatballs, potatis kory and other tasty specialties at the Smorgasbord. Plus, homemade pie, taverns and snacks are available from 1 to 10 p.m. at the Youth Food Stand operated by the Dalesburg Lutheran and Komstad Covenant youth.

The evening program at 7 p.m. showcases harmony with The Great Pretenders of Pipestone, Minn. The quartet sings songs from the 1950s to present day. The group has been entertaining regional audiences for the past 25 years. Nordic Nimble Feet folkdancers will show off their ethnic folk dancing, and the program ends as all in the audience are invited to join dancers around the Midsommar Pole.

The festival dates back into the late 1860s, when settlers from Dalarna County of Sweden came to Southeastern South Dakota. Along the way, these pioneer families founded Dalesburg Lutheran Church, about 12 miles north of Vermillion, and started a Midsommar celebration tradition. Today, the festival features the efforts of three traditionally Swedish country churches in

the area, Dalesburg Lutheran, Dalesburg Baptist and Komstad Covenant.

- 1 p.m.: The Youth Food Stand, featuring pie, taverns and snacks, opens on the south lawn.
- 2 p.m.: Program in the air-conditioned church.
- Afternoon: Conversation, exploring and relaxing in the beautiful country atmosphere. Children's activities beginning at 5 p.m.
- 4:30-6:30 p.m.: Scandinavian Smorgasbord, featuring meatballs, potatis kory and other specialties made by church members. Cost is \$12 per person (\$4 for ages 8 and younger).
- 7 p.m.: Evening program on the beautiful north lawn (weather permitting). The program includes The Great Pretenders, Nordic Nimble Feet and Scandinavian ring dances for all around the Midsommar Pole. A friendly game of softball follows at the Ben Carlson Field across the road.
- Sunday, June 20: Sunday worship outside (weather permitting) at 9 a.m.

Dalesburg Lutheran Church is a traditionally Swedish church founded by Dakota Territory homesteaders who emigrated from Sweden in the 1860s. The first building was erected in 1874. The present sanctuary dates from 1897. The ELCA church features impressive woodwork, stunning stained glass windows, and, of course, Midsommar — all in a beautiful countryside setting.

Dalesburg Lutheran is 12 miles north of Vermillion on the University Road; or 5.5 miles west of I-29 exit 38 (Volin); or 9 miles south of Hwy 46 on University Road or 3 miles east of Hwy 19 on 306th St. (Volin Road).
