public it serves.

"Newspapers have been called the watchdogs of democracy, and rightly so," Ehler said. "When we are at a public meeting, we are there for those who cannot be."

Hoffman indicated there was no gag order, but pointed out what he called excessive requests for Huether's time.

"Basically I said you were harassing the employee by asking numerous questions," Hoffman said, "and you put the gag order on."

In response to Ehler's question of whether there was no gag order, Hoffman said that was correct and that if there was no one else who could answer a question, Huether was the one to contact.

Hoffman said Royston was adding to what was in the minutes and was "dramatizing it for whatever reason I don't know." He said he had been at meetings, and not at meetings, and still "gets quoted." He also said words get

rearranged and called a quote.

Hoffman added that he still hadn't "figured out what we did wrong." He noted that Royston had a copy of the report, and he felt it was proper procedure to ask the council for approval before spending the money to have the city attorney review the report.

Rob Heisinger interrupted Hoffman, noting that the situation started by Hoffman denying him a copy of the report.

"I got my questions answered," Heisinger added, but not getting the report was the crux of the matter.

Former council member Greg Reiser said he thought the mayor had done the right thing in getting the council's approval first. He said that was not always the case in the past.

Teresa Mann, president of the Parkston Commercial Club, also defended Hoffman's actions, noting that before the club spends money, she has it approved.

Two council members Ken Henke and Rob Bertram also refuted what they had been quoted as saying in an article Royston had done about whether council members knew about the gag order placed on Huether. Royston stood by what was printed.

In that article, Royston had quoted each of the council members' response to her question of whether they were aware they were to be consulted prior to her talking to Huether. In that report, only two council members, Brad Hohn and Dale Hofer, had supported the mayor's actions.

Bertram added, "I'd rather you'd bug me than Brenda."

Royston asked for clarification of how her future contact with the finance officer should occur. Hoffman said her requests shouldn't be excessive, and that phone calls and emails were acceptable. Also, he said, if it is to be an interview, Huether would need to know, and that "casual conversations" should not be quoted.

After the meeting, Royston told the Press & Dakotan the reason there have been two or three phone calls on a topic is "you want to get it right; a journalist is to present the facts, and that is what I do ..."

"I know what we did and know we handled it professionally, and that we present information in a factual manner as it is presented to us."

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures fell Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery fell 1 cent to \$6.7225 a bushel; July corn fell 1.25 cent to \$7.0025 a bushel; July oats dropped 4.50 cents to \$3.5150 a bushel; while July soybeans slid 17.50 cents \$13.33 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle added 2.35 cents to \$1.1020 a pound; August feeder cattle gained 2.68 cents to \$1.3265 a pound; August lean hogs fell 0.37 cent to 94.85 cents a pound; while July pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.21 a pound.
