

**2 Teens Accused Of Assaulting 5-Year-Old**

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Two teenage boys are accused of sexually assaulting a 5-year-old girl in a Douglas County park and filming the incident. The Douglas County sheriff's office told KETV-TV that two 13-year-olds made the girl undress and perform sexual acts Tuesday afternoon in the park. The office says they made a video of the assault. The boys were arrested on suspicion of first-degree sexual assault and spent a night in a detention center. They've since been released to their parents. Their case is in juvenile court, and their names have not been released. Calls to the sheriff's office rang unanswered Saturday, and a message left for an official there wasn't immediately returned.

**Daugaard Chides Corps For Releases**

PIERRE (AP) — South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard says he's disappointed about plans to increase water releases from the Oahe Dam Saturday and Sunday. **S.D. AG Warns Of Phishing Scams**

PIERRE (AP) — Attorney General Marty Jackley is reminding consumers to be cautious of an identity theft scam known as phishing. Jackley says hackers in a recent data security breach obtained credit account numbers, names and contact information such as email addresses. Social Security numbers, birth dates, card expiration dates and the three-digit codes were compromised. He advises residents to avoid supplying personal information in an email request. Even though hackers might not initially gain all the information they need to access consumer funds, they might have enough contact information to elicit more information through targeted attacks. He says always enter Web URLs manually and do not follow a link to a secure site from an email.

**Man Pleads Guilty To False Tax Return**

SIoux FALLS (AP) — A Sisseton man has pleaded guilty in federal court to filing a false income tax return. Authorities say Edward Red Owl failed to report more than \$90,000 of income that would have resulted in taxes of more than \$20,000. Red Owl faces a maximum penalty of three years in prison and a \$250,000 fine. Sentencing is set for Oct. 17.

**Tourists Hurt During Simulated Shootout**

HILL CITY (AP) — Three tourists visiting South Dakota were hurt Friday night as they watched a simulated Old West shootout that has been a long-time charity event in Hill City. The Pennington County Sheriff's Office identified the injured Saturday as Jose Pruneda, 52, of Alliance, Neb., Carrol Knutson, 65, of Birchwood, Minn., and John Ellis, 48, of South Connessville, Penn. Their injuries were described as non-life threatening. All were taken to a Rapid City hospital for treatment. Police said they confiscated weapons and interviewed witnesses at the scene, but no further details have been made available. Authorities are asking for help from people who may have video footage of the event. "We're trying to sort it out and put together what happened out there," Lt. Marty Graves told The Associated Press on Saturday. Brenda Nolting, president of the Hill City Area Chamber of Commerce, told the Rapid City Journal the event should be stopped. "This is a horrible thing," she said Friday. "We're sick about it. I'm sick for the families. This is just a shock for everybody who's here."

**MISSOURI RIVER FLOODING**

**Nebraska Nuke Plant Issues Flood Alert**

OMAHA, Neb. — The Nebraska Public Power District issued a flooding alert Sunday for its nuclear power plant in south-east Nebraska as the Missouri River continues to rise. Mark Becker, a spokesman for the Columbus-based utility, said the "notification of unusual event" sent to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission was expected as the river swells above record levels. The declaration is the least serious of four emergency notifications established by the federal commission. "We knew the river was going to rise for some time," Becker said. "It was just a matter of when." The plant was operating Sunday at full capacity, and there was no threat to plant employees

or to the public, he said. The notification was issued about 4 a.m. Sunday, when the river reached 42.5 feet, or 899 feet above sea level, at the Cooper Nuclear Station near Brownville. Cooper is at 903 feet elevation, and NPPD officials said the river would have to climb to 902 feet at Brownville before officials would shut down the plant. Becker said the river is expected to crest there at a little over 900 feet. At such a level, officials would need to barricade internal doorways at the plant to protect equipment. The plant has been preparing for the flooding since May 30. More than 5,000 tons of sand have been brought in to construct barricades around it and access roads, according to NPPD. Becker said workers will continue to monitor the flood protection to ensure it's holding up

against the swollen river. "It seems to be doing pretty well," he said. The corps said Sunday that the river level at Brownville had surged about 2 feet from Saturday morning to Sunday morning and continued to rise. Col. Bob Ruch attributed that to heavy rain on the Nishnabotna River, which flows into the Missouri River, and to some erosion along a levee upstream at Hamburg, Iowa, that created a water pulse. Water was flowing over a levee near Brownville and into farmland but the levee was being built up to alleviate that, said Jodi Fawl, spokeswoman for the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency. Nemaha County emergency manager Renee Critser said that as workers were building up one section of the levee Sunday to alleviate the overtopping between

Brownville and Nemaha, water would flow over in another spot. Workers continued Sunday afternoon to add sandbags along the levee to keep the water at bay. "It's nothing major," Critser said. The Cooper Nuclear Station is one of two plants along the Missouri River in eastern Nebraska. The Fort Calhoun Station, operated by the Omaha Public Power District, is about 20 miles north of Omaha. It issued a similar alert June 6. The river has risen at least 1.5 feet higher than Fort Calhoun's 1,004-foot elevation above sea level. The plant can handle water up to 1,014 feet, according to OPPD. The water is being held back by a series of protective barriers, including an 8-foot rubber wall outside the reactor building. Flooding remains a concern

all along the river because of the massive amounts of water released by the Army Corps of Engineers from upstream reservoirs. The river is expected to rise as much as 5 to 7 feet above flood stage in much of Nebraska and Iowa and as much as 10 feet over flood stage in parts of Missouri. The corps expects the river to remain high at least into August because of heavy spring rains in the upper Plains and substantial Rocky Mountain snowpack melting into the river basin.
