Generator Users Cautioned During Flooding Situations

DES MOINES, Iowa — MidAmerican Energy Company urges customers whose utilities are impacted by rising Missouri River floodwaters to exercise caution when operating a portable generator.
Customers choosing to use generators to provide electrical service during this emergency should follow proper setup and operation guidelines. Generators are internal combustion engines used to generate electricity. They are useful when temporary or remote power is needed; however, improper use can result in electric shock to the user or utility workers.
Customers using generators should notify MidAmerican Energy immediately at 888-427-5632. This information helps utility workers identify the location of additional connections to the electric system.

When using a generator, use only Underwriters Laboratories-listed, three-prong extension cords that have a grounding conductor. Plug appliances into the extension cord first, and then plug the extension cord into the generator outlet. Never use electrical tools or appliances with frayed cords, missing grounding prongs, or damaged or cracked housings.
Beware of fuel-related fire hazards. Never refuel a generator while it is running or warm to touch. Store flammable liquids outside of living areas in properly labeled, nonglass safety containers. Store the containers away from fuel-burning appliances.
Use extension cords safely.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for July delivery fell 13 cents to \$6.5925 a bushel; July corn edged up 0.25 cent to \$7.005 a bushel; July oats dropped 1.5 cent to \$3.50 a bushel; while July soybeans added 2.75 cents to \$13.3575 a bushel.
Beef and pork futures rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
August live cattle added 1.77 cent to \$1.1197 a pound; August feeder cattle gained 2.85 cents to \$1.3550 a pound; August lean hogs rose 1.82 cent to 96.67 cents a pound; while August pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.065 a pound.
