Pujols Out 6 Weeks With Wrist Fracture

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Concluding a news briefing about Albert Pujols' injury that killed the mood at Tony La Russa's charity golf event, the St. Louis Cardinals manager let down his guard. "I'm going to go find a place to cry," La Russa said. Pujols will be out an estimated six weeks with a fractured left wrist from a first-base collision over the

weekend. Baseball will be without a three-time NL MVP and the Cardinals, tied for first in the NL Central, are left to absorb another devastating blow in a season marred by injuries. "You can't replace a player of his magnitude," general manager John Mozeliak said. "It just seems like we've had to deal with one injury after another."

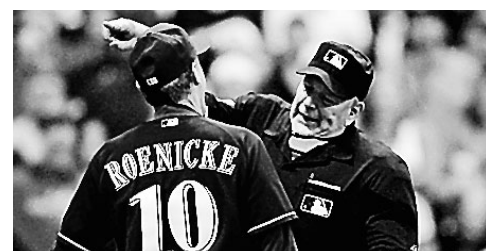

Bahamas Drops Rape Charges Against FIU's Wittels

NASSAU, Bahamas (AP) — A court in the Bahamas dismissed a rape case Monday against a Florida International baseball star and two friends who were accused of sexually assaulting two American teens after a night of drinking at an island resort. Judge Derrence Rolle-Davis dropped the charges against Garrett Wittels and two friends from New York at the request of prosecutors who said they had no case against the men. The judge ordered the \$10,000 bond paid by each should be returned. "You are free to go," he told them. Outside court, Wittels, who had a 56-game hitting streak end earlier this year, shook hands with police and his lawyers. He and his two friends, Robert Rothschild and Jonathan Oberli, declined to speak to reporters.

Kool Earns Preseason Nod

South Dakota State junior Tyrel Kool, a Yankton native, was named to the Honorable Mention offense list as part of Consensus Draft Services' preseason All-America honors, according to a release Monday. Kool was listed by Consensus Draft Services as a wide receiver, which is what his main position was in 2010, but it is expected that the 5-foot-9, 190-pound speedster will return to running back in 2011. Kool led the Jackrabbits in receiving yards last season as a top wide receiver, with 64 catches for 808 yards and two touchdowns. He also rushed 11 times. SDSU opens its season Sept. 3 against Southern Utah in Brookings.

Texas had been 8-1 in elimination games during the postseason, starting with the Big 12 tournament. get them moving in the right direction." The Marlins are expected to hire another manager after this season before moving into their new ballpark next April. But if McKeon can pull off a repeat of 2003, he might get a multiyear contract. That team was floundering when he took over in May, and he led it to a title, with postseason wins over the Giants, Cubs and Yankees. "They're looking for the same magic from Jack they had before," said Dusty Baker, who managed that Cubs club and is now the Reds' manager. "I'm happy to see Jack back." After three successive winning seasons with Florida, McKeon retired as manager at age 74 in 2005. There had been a buzz for several years that he wanted to return to the dugout. "I had a little sieuta," he said. "After I laid out for a year and a half or two years, I started to miss it."

Having his dad here for as long as the Gamecocks stay alive makes this CWS an even bigger thrill. "My dad's been a huge inspiration for baseball for me," he said. "It's definitely nice to have him out here." Is he worried about his dad getting another job? "No, he'll be OK," Michael said. "Gamecock Nation will help us out." WATCHING FROM AFAR: South Carolina's Robert Beary had a special fan monitoring Sunday night's thrilling 5-4 win over Texas A&M — his father, Kevin, now stationed in Afghanistan. Kevin Beary, a Florida county sheriff the past 16 years, is in his second tour of police duty in Afghanistan. With the Taliban and other government enemies still a threat, the work is perilous. "There's danger all over," Robert said. "They lose guys all the time. And it's not always gun fire. It's suicide bombings. He's been taught to keep his head down." Robert Beary was able to speak to his dad by e-mail and phone earlier Sunday.

This is the second consecutive season Florida has changed managers in June. Fredi Gonzalez was fired and replaced a year ago by Rodriguez, a first-time major-league manager. In McKeon, the Marlins found a replacement with plenty of experience. "He's got the energy to do it," said Gonzalez, who now manages the Braves. "He's a character, too." McKeon also came out of retirement at 72 to take over the Marlins 38 games into the 2003 season. That hiring made him the oldest manager to take over a big league team, and he quickly revived a franchise that had managed just one winning record in its 10-year history. Florida beat the Yankees in the World Series, and McKeon received the NL manager of the year award for the second time. Now he'll try to orchestrate a similar turnaround. The Marlins were only two games behind NL East leader Philadelphia when

the month began, but they've tumbled to last place and began the week at 32-40. McKeon was born Nov. 23, 1930, in South Amboy, N.J. He began his professional baseball career as a minor league catcher in 1949 and managed 2,269 games in the minors. He took his first big league managerial job with Kansas City in 1973 and has also managed Oakland, San Diego and Cincinnati, nearly leading the Reds to a wild-card berth in 1999, when he won NL manager of the year. He returns to the dugout with a career record of 1,011-940. Red Sox manager Terry Francona said he found McKeon's latest career comeback amazing at age 80. "I know one thing, I'll be dead by then," Francona said. "This job does take a lot out of you. But he hasn't managed for like five years, so I guess he's all fired up. He did a pretty good job the last time."

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
