**Feds Asking For Delay Of Barry Bonds Hearing**  
SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Federal prosecutors are asking for a two-month postponement of Barry Bonds' next court date. The government was expected to announce at a Friday hearing whether it intended to retry Bonds on three perjury charges a jury deadlocked on after a month-long trial in April.

Bonds was convicted of obstruction of justice and a judge was to set a sentencing date on Friday. His lawyers have filed legal papers asking that Bonds' conviction be tossed out. Prosecutors on Tuesday asked the judge to delay both hearings until Aug. 26. Bonds' attorneys oppose the request.

## Timberwolves Introduce Ricky Rubio

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — For two years, Minnesota Timberwolves fans have been tantalized by the myth of Ricky Rubio. Rubio's Spanish league games were rarely on television in the Twin Cities, so they watched grainy YouTube highlights — a behind-the-back pass here, a nifty dribble there — to get their fix. The air of mystery only seemed to increase the hype. The 20-year-old point guard held his first press conference in Minnesota on Tuesday, looking to pull back the curtain and introduce himself to the fans who have so eagerly anticipated his arrival. "I was so comfortable over there, but Minnesota makes me feel comfortable too," Rubio said. "(The Timberwolves) supported me, they were happy about my things, my winnings, in Barcelona, and I was like, oh, they want me over there. I feel that love over there. I want to give back that love." The Timberwolves drafted Rubio in 2009 with the fifth overall pick, but a large buy-out with his Spanish team at the time coupled with Rubio's desire to stay home and work on his game kept him from immediately heading to the NBA. It was a delicate negotiation at times, and president of basketball operations David Kahn, assistant GM Tony Ronzone, European scout Pete Philo and coach Kurt Rambis all chipped in to show Rubio and his family that coming to small-market Minnesota and playing for the struggling Timberwolves was the right move. "Yeah, I feel like they really want me," Rubio said. "It giving me confidence to play over here, for them. It helped me a lot. I'm so glad those guys are working over here with the Timberwolves because they are really good (people) and I felt like I'm at home." Kahn said the Wolves staff tried to make it a point since drafting him to make Rubio comfortable with them, which would ease the transition to a new culture, new city and new game.

Coker had shown promise with strong efforts against Indiana and Ohio State, and seemed to handle the pounding that night in Arizona without a problem. He set the program's record for carries and yards in a bowl game against the Tigers, while breaking off a 62-yard TD run that showcased his power through holes and his speed once he gets past them. Still, if Coker's going to handle the weekly grind of the Big Ten as Iowa's starting running back — a spot that rarely gets a breather — he knows this summer will be a critical one for building his strength and conditioning. Coker finished with 622 yards rushing as a true freshman last season despite making just four starts. He, junior quarterback James Vandenberg and receiver Keenan Davis headline a group of relatively inexperienced offensive players the Hawkeyes need to have breakout seasons in 2011.

# Aside From Cast, Pujols Feels Healthy

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Albert Pujols feels healthy enough to be in the St. Louis Cardinals' lineup. Too bad for him, he's wearing a soft cast for a broken left wrist that's expected to sideline him for six weeks. "To tell you the truth, I feel like I can play," Pujols said. "I'll just be positive and be in the lineup before you know it." The three-time NL MVP, who was put on the 15-day disabled list on Tuesday, wanted nothing to do with a question related to how the injury might affect upcoming free agency. After rebuking a reporter, seconds later Pujols ended a lengthy media session. "That's a stupid question," Pujols said. "That's ridiculous, come on. That's it." Pujols also bristled at the notion it's been an "odd" season thus far. Pujols cut off negotiations on a long-term contract extension at the start of spring training, then got off to a slow start. He's batting .279, 50 points beneath his career average, although he's turned it up lately and is among the league leaders with 17 homers and 45 RBIs.

"It's not strange, man," Pujols said. "We're in first place and this is not about me, this is about my team." Pujols was hurt taking an offline throw at first base Sunday when the Royals' Wilson Betemit collided with him. Before a CT scan revealed the fracture he had been optimistic that he hadn't been seriously hurt. He said he had full range of movement with the fingers. "I had a good feeling that I was going to be just a little bruised, but obviously it wasn't," Pujols said. "There was still a little pain that night but I feel good, no pain at all right now." "I mean, what can you do? It's one of those crazy things that happens in the game." The injury will test lineup depth for a team that entered Tuesday night leading the NL Central and already minus third baseman David Freese and outfielder Allen Craig. Matt Holliday moved up one slot to third in the lineup, taking Pujols' spot, and Lance Berkman played first base and batted cleanup against the Philadelphia Phillies.

"It was just a simple mistake, and we got it cleared up," Foxhoven said. "Nobody was upset with the ruling; it went really smooth." Wynot, currently third in the league standings, beat Freeman 7-4 that night, keyed by a home run and double from Lee Heimes. Though it mattered little in that game, or in many others, the "speed-up" rule stats that after the last defensive player crosses the baseline heading into the dugout, the opposing defense going out in the field has to be ready within one minute. That is why most teams pinch run for their catcher, so the catcher can get his gear on sooner and be ready for the next inning quicker. "We always try to find a faster runner, but Steve is by no means

slow." Foxhoven said. "We used him that night and I basically did not have any knowledge of a different ruling at that time."

At the midway point of the South Central League season, five teams are within two games of first place. And so far, there have already been some crazy finishes. The Crofton Bluejays sit in the first place at 8-2, a half-game
