Utica Water Tower Project Receives Funds

PIERRE — The state Board of Water and Natural Resources has approved an additional \$7,980 grant and loan package from the Consolidated Water Facilities Construction Program to Utica for improvements to the town's water tower, the office of Gov. Dennis Daugaard has announced. The funding — a \$3,990 grant and \$3,990 loan — is in addition to a \$30,000 grant and loan package awarded for the project last September. The additional funding is needed because bids received were larger than the engineer's estimate. The project involves cleaning and sandblasting the reservoir portion of the tower and priming and painting the tower's substructure. The total estimated cost of the project is \$40,980.

Saturday, June 27, 1936
 • The sixteenth annual state convention of the society of Gideons of South Dakota and its Auxiliary, opened in Yankton this forenoon. The convention programs will continue through this afternoon and evening, with a banquet tonight, and the closing sessions will be held Sunday afternoon.
 • Between forty and fifty carloads of Yankton people paid their respects to Ponca, Neb., yesterday afternoon, leaving here from 1 to 2 o'clock and arriving there in time to take part in a considerable portion of the festivities held in commemoration of the eightieth anniversary of the founding of the town, the program being delayed by a storm that left about an inch and a half of moisture in the vicinity of the town.

50 YEARS AGO
Tuesday, June 27, 1961
 • A laggard cool front that stalled in Canada has unhinged South Dakota's weather, letting a heat wave boil up and bringing turbulence to the northeast area, including hail and a tornado funnel that touched ground south of Aberdeen. Indications on Monday were for South Dakota to start a cooling trend.
 • Mrs. Hattie Hoff Ewald, who obtained her doctor's degree at the University of South Dakota June 5, will inaugurate a special television teaching program at Central Missouri State college, Warrensburg, this fall. Dr. Ewald, a member of the USD summer session faculty in the school of education, is a former faculty member at Southern State Teachers college, Springfield.

Firework Safety Urged For Fourth of July Holiday

PIERRE — Retail fireworks sales begin Monday in South Dakota, and State Fire Marshal Al Christie is urging residents to put safety first as they celebrate the Fourth of July holiday.

Fireworks sales are legal from June 27-July 5 in South Dakota. Fireworks may be discharged in the state during that same period, unless local ordinances set tighter limits, Christie says. Cities may adopt more stringent limits on use of fireworks.

"Fireworks are a tradition on Fourth of July, but every year we have a few injuries and some unintentional fires," Christie said. "Too often, those things happen because people were careless and didn't use common sense. Two simple safety tips are to follow the instructions on the product and to avoid using fireworks in places where a fire could start."

While much of South Dakota is wet this summer, people still need to take precautions to avoid starting fires, Christie said.

"Beyond that, if the instructions say to light the fuse and get away, please do that," he said. "Don't combine different types of fireworks or try to explode home-made ones. Keep a source of water handy and never try to relight a dud."

Christie also reminded parents that, while sparklers are popular with younger children, they can cause painful burns and should be used with adult supervision.

"There's a large amount of people that are on Facebook, so one of the biggest benefits is that a lot of word of mouth goes into it."

JOINT INFORMATION CENTER

The Joint Information Center, or JIC, provides press releases, story links, flood inundation maps and various contact numbers. People from across the region post comments and questions, which Lazo said gives the Corps opportunities to squelch rumors.

"One of the main things we want to do is to get rid of rumors people might hear from somebody else," he said. "Facebook allows them to ask questions and we can respond right away. During events like this, one small rumor can have devastating effects, because people will believe them."

The JIC's mission on the page is listed as "ensur(ing) timely and coordinated release of accurate information to the public." Lazo said the timely aspect to the updates — often posted often within seconds — is almost as important as the content itself.

"With this, there's no waiting period," he said. "Before, we were getting the information to the media outlets, and then they post it online or run it on TV, and that takes time."

Time is something organizations are cognizant of when it comes to providing accurate information to those who need it, according to Layne Stewart with Clay County Emergency Management.

Stewart has helped develop

the county's website (claycountyoem.org) into a place that features press releases, Facebook feeds, Gavins Point Dam release schedules, flood maps and other informational links.

"What I've really tried to do is make it a one-stop shop," Stewart said. "I want to try to get as much information up as I can, so people don't have to sort through pages and pages of stuff."

Though the county website is not solely dependent on Facebook, it does allow people who don't have an account to still stay active, as evidenced by the submitted river photos linked last week.

TWITTER PART OF PROCESS

Stewart said he also recently signed up for a Twitter account (@ClayCountySDEOM), and is in the process of expanding the county's presence that way.

"Although I've noticed there's kind of a gap, it's one of those things that you either really know about or you're clueless," he said. "The Twitter thing is new to me. My hopes are in the very near future to actually expand the Twitter stuff and maybe make it something more useful to us, not even just with the flood."

One of the most popular online groups that has sprouted because of the flooding is a Facebook community page called, "2011 Missouri River Flood." It was created by Francis Cantrell of Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Jason Smith of western Iowa.

The group's description reads, "Most of us don't know each other but will be bound together over the next few months and longer by the events that none of us can control."

People and other organizations have posted story links, updates on affected areas and photos of the river's rise.

There is also a Facebook page called "Displaced Union County Residents" that has nearly 350 members as of this weekend. The group's description says that it was formed to "share resources and tools to cope with evacuation and returning home."

Union County also boasts its own avid Facebook user in State Sen. Dan Lederman. The Republican, who serves District 16, which includes Union and Lincoln counties, was forced to evacuate his home in Dakota Dunes with his Jessica and three children.

He has been active in the two major social media realms, Facebook and Twitter, by posting links and photos to his fans and followers. The links to his different avenues are featured prominently on the top of his website — ledermanforsenate.com.

Overall, the benefits of Facebook are many, but it depends on who uses the site, Stewart said.

"For the most part, I think people are appreciative of it," he said. "I've gotten a few comments from people who aren't all that familiar with Facebook. It's just the whole idea of using it or not using it."

In Yankton alone, many local Facebook users have posted their own photos of the increased releases from Gavins Point Dam over the past three weeks.

Throughout the summer, that trend may gain in popularity, Rhoades said.

"I think people are curious what's going on, all the way down the river, from Montana to Omaha (Neb.)," she said. "When you're on Facebook, you see so many people posting their own photos, especially here in town with Gavins Point Dam."

"These are all things we will never see again."
