Police Arrest Man After He Enters Mo. River

A man was arrested early Tuesday after allegedly entering the Missouri River in Riverside Park and refusing to exit at the request of police officers. The Yankton Police Department received a report at 12:45 a.m. Tuesday that Brian Uhall, 31, had stated he was going for a swim in the river. Shortly thereafter, he was found by police standing in water over his waist on the submerged handicap dock on the west side of Riverside Park.

Because the dock is almost totally submerged in water, the entrance has been fenced off with warnings not to walk down the steps to it. According to Sgt. Doug Johnson, Uhall was "intoxicated and defiant." Shortly after 1 a.m., the Yankton County Office of Emergency Management and Yankton Search and Rescue arrived at the scene and prepared to deploy from the boat dock on the east side of the park if necessary.

Police negotiated with Uhall until he exited the river at 1:36 a.m. Ultimately, no recovery equipment had to be put in the water. Uhall was taken into custody and transported to the Yankton County jail.

He was arrested for trespassing after notice, which is a class 1 misdemeanor, and entering Riverside Park after it was closed, which is a city ordinance.

No-Boating Zone Declared On Vermillion River

PIERRE — To protect the public and limit further damage to homes and private property on and along the Vermillion River in Clay County, Gov. Dennis Daugaard has enacted a No Boating Zone effective at 8 a.m. on Tuesday, June 28. The No Boating Zone will be in effect for the Vermillion River starting at the Highway 50 bypass and continuing downstream to the confluence of the Missouri River. This order will be in effect until rescinded by the governor. State law gives the governor authority to prohibit or restrict recreational use or navigation on any portion of a river, lake or stream in order to protect the public peace, health, or safety, according to Jeff Vonk, secretary of the State Department of Game, Fish and Parks.

A violation of the public waterway restriction is a Class 2 Misdemeanor, punishable by up to 30 days in jail, a fine of \$500 or both.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for September delivery rose 21 cents to \$6.7175 a bushel; December corn jumped 26.25 cents to \$6.53 a bushel; December oats rose 11 cents to \$3.52 a bushel; while November soybeans rose 4 cents to \$13.19 a bushel. Beef futures rose while pork futures were unchanged on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle rose 0.38 cent to \$1.1175 a pound; August feeder cattle rose 0.65 cent to \$1.3787 a pound; August lean hogs were unchanged at 92.35 cents a pound; while August pork bellies were also unchanged at \$1.065 a pound.

benefits, which Democrats don't want cut. Lieberman and Coburn were not nearly as reluctant, including both in their prescription for Medicare. "Nobody's going to like this plan, we understand that," said Lieberman, who was the Democratic vice presidential candidate in 2000 but is now an independent who regularly picks spots to challenge his former party. His statement that Medicare can't be saved in its current form seemed a direct rebuttal to Obama, who said earlier this year that a House Republican proposal would "end Medicare as we know it" — something he vowed would not happen while he was in the White House. Coburn is a conservative Republican. But he challenged his party orthodoxy earlier this year when he said he was willing to include higher revenues as part of any deficit-reduction deal. The plan the two men outlined includes a gradual increase over the next five years in the monthly premium that seniors pay for doctor and other non-hospital services. Aides said it would translate into a monthly increase of \$15 to \$20 initially. The age of eligibility would rise gradually from 65 to 67. For the first time, better-off seniors would be charged more money for Medicare Part A, which covers hospital care. The same group already pays more for doctor visits as well as for prescription drug coverage and, under the plan, would face even higher monthly premiums. A major source of savings would come from making sure seniors pay out of pocket for at least a portion of their care. To accomplish that, Lieberman and Coburn

proposed barring insurance companies from selling Medigap policies that offer first-dollar coverage. The plan by Lieberman and Coburn would preserve Medicare as a government program, unlike a House GOP proposal that would require millions of future beneficiaries to purchase coverage from private insurance companies. Additionally, the plan includes a \$7,500 limit on out-of-pocket costs for doctor or hospital coverage, a provision designed to protect seniors who face potentially catastrophic costs. According to the most recent report by the Medicare trustees, the giant program's insurance fund is projected to run out of money in 2024, five years earlier than last year's estimate.
