Herndon described life on the road, using humorous terms, Lee said. "Ty joked the bus driver was nicknamed 'the vampire' because he slept all day and drove all night," Lee said.

Herndon has become very familiar with touring. He is currently playing a 16-day stretch with only two days' break. The band played Tuesday in Rapid City, traveled across the state for the Yankton concert and will play in Council Bluffs, Iowa, tonight (Thursday). Then it's to Denver for a stop before playing a Saturday concert at Tooele, Utah.

During Wednesday's barbecue, Herndon emphasized how he and Hayes found enjoyment as songwriters, Lee said. They are on the same record label, FUNL Music, and Hayes performs backup with Herndon's band.

"(Songwriting) is important to them," Lee said. "There's a lot of songs sold in Nashville, and they're happy to be writing their own songs."

"But Ty said he would take a George Strait reject," Suzan said with a laugh, referring to the country superstar.

FUNL Music has announced Ty Herndon as its flagship artist, and released to radio "Journey On," the title single from his upcoming album.

On a serious note, Herndon talked at the barbecue about part-

nering with former National Football League (NFL) player Kevin Turner to raise awareness about Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease.

Herndon shared the details of the story on his Facebook page.

Turner, an NFL fullback for eight years with the New England Patriots and Philadelphia Eagles, was diagnosed in May 2010 with ALS. Herndon and Turner are raising awareness about ALS' emerging connection to athletes exposed to repeated head trauma.

The two men met when Herndon performed at an ALS benefit concert. They discussed using the country singer's uplifting "Journey On" single as a signature song for The Kevin Turner Foundation.

The song was originally written as the title cut for Herndon's 2010 "Journey On" release. He immediately recognized the connection between the song's message and Turner's condition.

The two men teamed up for a video incorporating Turner's football career. The video was filmed at a Nashville football stadium last September.

The ALS video and awareness effort is just one example of Herndon's commitment to worthy causes, tour manager Scott Saunders told the Press & Dakotan.

"We just did a benefit for Joplin (Mo.) tornado victims just outside of Kansas City, and they hit their target dollar amount," Saunders said. "Ty does a lot of charity events to raise money. He also works with Make-A-Wish and appears at St. Jude's (children's hospital)."

Herndon plays a wide variety of venues, including smaller sites such as Dakota Theatre, Saunders said.

"We don't consider a venue too large or too small," he said. "We'll try something at any venue if it makes sense — if it furthers Ty's career, makes some money and covers road expenses."

Herndon enjoys playing theaters such as the Yankton concert, said Saunders, who doubles up as a keyboard player in the band.

"Theaters have been good to Ty," he said. "On any night, he might get an idea to try something different."

Herndon began performing professionally as a teenager.

At age 17, he performed at OPRYLAND USA as a cast member of "Today's Country Roads." He went on to compete in the first season of the television series "Star Search" and was a winner in the male-vocalist category.

His string of hits began in 1995 when the debut single, "What Mattered Most," soared to No. 1. He has sold more than 4 million albums and had 17 singles make the Billboard Hot Country Songs charts.

Herndon has won numerous industry awards, including a Dove Award and Grammy nomination.

He solidified his local fan base and added more admirers with Wednesday's concert.

Ironically, the Thons almost didn't enter the radio contest and attend the Yankton concert. The couple thought they would be taking their daughter to the Sioux Falls airport. But the daughter said to go for it, and the result turned

out well. In contrast, the Gasses had already bought their concert tickets. But they decided to enter the radio contest for the limousine ride and backyard barbecue with Herndon.

"I couldn't pass up the chance. When I won the contest, we gave away our other tickets so another couple could attend the concert," Suzan said.

And what did she have to do for the free tickets? "They wanted to know the real first name of Ty Herndon," Suzan said.

Just for the record, it's Boyd. Suzan particularly enjoys Herndon's song, "What Mattered Most," which went No. 1 on the charts. They also enjoy "Journey On" and its Christian theme.

The Thons have grown up with more of the Grand Ole Opry stars, but they said they are intrigued by Herndon's life story.

"If you read his (biography), he has come back from some really bad things," Verna said. "He has started over and has come up with Christian music."

The Thons hope that Herndon's concert is just the first of many more local performances by stars.

Tom thinks that country music resonates with small rural communities like Yankton.

"I think Nashville and country music is a lot like us — ordinary people," he said. "They work their way up to get what they have in life. They start out with a dream, and they put out a lot of effort to reach that dream."

Wednesday's dinner and concert solidified the couples' love for Herndon and his music.

"We're fans for life," Suzan said.

Beef and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle fell 0.18 cent to \$1.1157 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 0.10 cent to \$1.3777 a pound; August lean hogs rose 0.82 cent to 92.17 cents a pound; while August pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.065 a pound.
