The All-School Reunion has its own committee, with Bruce Sparks heading up that group. Also included are Terry Hrdlicka, vice president; Bonnie Koster, treasurer; Donna Weerheim, secretary; Jennifer Koster, corresponding secretary; and past president Wanda Dally.

All-School registration begins Friday morning and continues into Saturday. Also on Friday, the Douglas County Historical Museum near the courthouse will be open, and also will be open during portions of the other three days. A craft fair also is expected on the courthouse lawn on Saturday.

A chili cook-off, with judging and awards, dominates Friday afternoon and early evening. Trolley rides and kid's train rides also will be available.

Neugebauer said she is excited about the A-City Harmony performance on Friday evening at 7.

"It's a great big choir," she said, that music teacher Whitney

Halverson has organized. The group had a Christmas concert in December, Neugebauer said, and impressed the community with its expertise.

Following the concert, which will be held at St. Paul Catholic Church, a movie will be offered at the Lorain Theater, followed by a dance on Main Street featuring Dustin Evans and Good Times.

At 7:30 a.m. Saturday, a 5K, 10K Run/Walk is scheduled for the school football field. For those who would rather eat, a breakfast cooked by the VFW begins at 7 a.m. under the Main Street tent.

Throughout the day, there is a Lions Car & Bike Show, Craft Fair, Kid's Water Fight, inflatables, a Bean Bag Tournament, the Lions Poker Run and bingo.

More than 600 people are registered for the school reunion, said Bruce Sparks, a 1988 Armour alumnus, with the banquet to be held Saturday evening in the Main Street tent. It will be followed by a movie at the Lorain Theater and a Main Street dance featuring the "Lightning Audio" sound system.

Sunday begins with a community church service at 9 a.m. in the Main Street tent, followed by brunch. The "125 Years of Memories" parade, with lineup at the 4-

H grounds, begins at noon, said parade chair Craig Krsnak.

"It will start on the north end of Main Street," he said, and will go south, over to Dobson Street and back north. It will end by The Moving Wall on the football field.

Krsnak said he expects the crowd-pleaser of the parade to be a hand-drawn hook and ladder truck that dates back to the late 1800s or early 1900s. He said local farmer Rodney Uttecht had obtained it from the Armour Fire Department several years ago, and has completely restored it. Armour firemen will pull it through the parade, said Bruce Sparks, and "it's going to be a nice little piece." People, he added, "will see things from every era" in the parade.

Following the parade, the Vietnam Memorial Wall dedication will be held at the football field at 2 p.m. People also will have an opportunity to visit the Memorabilia Room at the Masonic Temple and take advantage of the Barbecue Supper at the 4-H grounds at 5 p.m.

The capper for the evening is the Lawn Mower Races at Sunset Speedway, beginning at 7:30 p.m., followed by the fireworks at 10 p.m.

"We have put these races on before," commented Krsnak. "If you haven't seen this before, it is pretty unbelievable-these aren't your typical lawn mowers. The outlaw class, the top class, is clocked at 38 mph, and it's a short circle."

Monday's schedule includes trolley rides and Kids Train rides, the museum, and the Vietnam Moving Wall the main attractions.

"It's definitely been a community effort," said Neugebauer. She noted that many of the area's cancer walk teams have been involved. The Douglas County Cancer Walk is in July, she said, "so the teams are doing things to raise money and they are very involved" in making the celebration a success.

"Everybody's done really well," she said.
