

\$5,000 Lottery Ticket Sold In Tyndall

PIERRE — A Wild Card 2 ticket sold in Tyndall is worth \$5,000 following the May 30 drawing.

The lucky ticket holder matched five of five white ball numbers but missed the Wild Card to take the game's second prize. Winning numbers are 1, 15, 17, 23 and 26; the Wild Card is the Jack of Diamonds.

The ticket holder should sign the back of the ticket immediately and put it in a safe place before contacting the Sioux Falls Lottery office at 605-367-5840 or the Pierre Lottery office at 605-773-5770. The odds of winning \$5,000 playing Wild Card 2 are 1:90,619. Winners have 180 days to claim their prize.

Wild Card 2 is played only in Idaho, Montana, North Dakota and South Dakota. The jackpot currently sits at \$155,000 for the next drawing tonight (Saturday).

Bon Homme County's voter registration includes 1,837 Republicans; 1,566 Democrats and 482 independents.

As far as the reason for the expected low turnout, Brunken cited a lack of races up and down the ticket that would bring out voters.

"For the Republicans, there is the presidential primary, which is all decided, and we have the four candidates running for the District 19 House of Representatives. For District 21, there's no state races or legislative races, just the president's race for the Republicans," she said. "The Democrats, countywide, have the one U.S. House race between Matt Varilek and Jeff Barth."

No Bon Homme County independents have asked so far to vote in the upcoming Democratic primary, Brunken said.

"The Democrats allowed the independents to vote in their primary in 2010, but Bon Homme County had no Democratic primary that year, so it wasn't something that we needed to address in 2010," she said.

The polls are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday with results posted on the secretary of state's website. However, no results can be released until 8 p.m. Central time, after polls close in the Mountain time zone in the western part of the state.

Brunken was appointed auditor in 2008 and will be working her second primary election and third general election. She likes the quick reporting of results on the Internet, with information refreshed about every five minutes.

"I was never part of the old (reporting) system, but it's very nice to have web-based information," she said. "We enter our information as we get it, and it goes straight to the secretary of state for anybody who wants to watch returns."

The following races are slated in area legislative districts:

- In the District 16 House race, which covers Union and southern Lincoln counties, Republicans will choose from among Don Lantis of Dakota Dunes, Jim Bolin of Canton, Patty Miller of North Sioux City and Kevin Jensen of Canton.

The top two finishers advance to the general election, where they face Democrats Juanita Grewing of North Sioux City and Ann Tornberg of Beresford. They

don't require a primary, as both advance to the November election.

- In District 18, which represents Yankton County, Republicans will vote in a House primary from among Matt Stone, Thomas Bixler, Mike Stevens and Thomas D. Stotz, all of Yankton. The top two finishers face Democrats Charlie Gross and Bernie Hunhoff, both of Yankton, who automatically advance to the general election.

- In District 19, which covers Douglas, Hutchinson, Hanson, McCook and northern Bon Homme counties, the Republicans will decide the House primary race involving Kyle Schoenfish of Scotland, Stace Nelson of Fulton, J.E. "Jim" Putnam of Armour and Roger Hofer of Bridgewater. The top two finishers advance to the general election against Democrat Alan Fenner of Menno.

The following is a round-up of area county races:

CHARLES MIX: The Republican primary for county treasurer pits Jessica Nielsen of Pickstown against Karol Kniffen of Wagner.

DOUGLAS: The Republican primary for auditor includes Gary Denke of Delmont and Jeanette Smith and Phyllis L.

Mehren, both of Armour.

HUTCHINSON: The Republican primary for District 2 county commissioner sends Gillas J. Stern against Steven G. Friesen, both of Freeman.

TURNER: The Republican primary for state's attorney sees Matthew L. Olson of Centerville face Tiffani Landeen of Parker.

YANKTON: The Republican primary for at-large seats on the Yankton County Commission includes the field of James Van Osdel and Mark E. Johnson, both of Yankton, and Connie S. Kerns-Grams of rural Irene.

The following local races will also be decided Tuesday:

ANDES CENTRAL: Voters in the Andes Central school district will elect three board members for three-year terms. Running for the seats are incumbents Terry Svatos and Debora Houseman; Nicole Gray, who was appointed to the board last winter; and challenger Tonya Dion.

VERMILLION CITY COUNCIL: The Central Ward alderman race features Kelsey Collier-Wise and Jenny French.

VERMILLION SCHOOL BOARD: The school board candidates include Mark Bottolfson, Tim Schwasinger and Dave Stammer.
