

from 12,600 in 2001 to 24,700 in 2011. Kim Meester, owner of Archery Outfitters in Sioux Falls, said his store has experienced a "huge increase" in bow sales. He's heard there's a waiting list for equipment because suppliers can't keep up. "It's really taken again," Meester said. "I think the economy might have something to do with it, too. There's a little bit of an initial investment, but once you have that done it's a pretty inexpensive sport. And there's a pretty good offering as far as what you can do." Coincidentally, Meester got involved in archery in 1985, not long after the "Rambo" series — another Hollywood offering that featured bows and arrows — debuted on the big screen. As for the variety, there are different types of bows and different objects at which to take aim with carbon arrows. The two most popular bows are the recurve and the compound. The compound is comparatively stiff and incorporates a pulley on each end, making it more energy efficient and requiring less strength to draw. In theory, it's modern and easy to use. But it's not gaining as much steam as the recurve, a more traditional, basic and difficult bow. The recurve is used in the Olympics — another upcoming event playing into

the boom — and the movies, hence the recent popularity. Likewise, target shooting — both the paper kind and 3-D foam animals — is on the rise because that's most commonly associated with recurve bows than game hunting. "It's my favorite sport," 8-year-old Simone Schneekloth said during a break in her indoor lesson at Archery Outfitters. Schneekloth picked up the sport in April because her younger brother, August, had tried and liked it. She got hooked up with some gear — her bow is pink — and a coach, local archery pro Hugo Barrientos. During 60-minute sessions, Schneekloth fires five arrows over and over at a paper target stationed maybe 15 feet away. It's extraordinary to see a recent second-grade graduate, twin braids in her hair and minus one front tooth, draw a bow, steady herself and then sling a carbon arrow into a waiting bull's-eye. "Children can compete at just about every tournament available because there are set ranges that are shorter to accommodate them," explained Barrientos, who finished eighth in the pro division of indoor nationals earlier this year. "That's the future of the sport." Canton High School students Jordan Wiebe and Kendra Rock were on the other end of the same indoor range earlier this week. They bought bows during the school year, excited by an archery unit — part of NASP — in their agriculture class. Already an avid

hunter, Wiebe sees the sport as a new challenge and plans to get deer and turkey licenses in the coming seasons. As for Rock? "It's something different to do," she said. The sport has found a foothold in South Dakota. In 2007, the National Field Archery Association, the largest archery group in the country, moved its headquarters from California to Yankton. Since then, it has opened a 22,000-square foot, multi-million dollar facility with support from sporting goods giant Easton, organized the most lucrative indoor archery event ever with a total purse of \$165,000 and helped start an archery team at Mount Marty. (The NCAA classifies archery as an emerging sport, meaning it's working toward official sanctioning.) Did Hollywood create all of that? Hardly. The NFAA, for example, has been around since 1939 and has affiliates in all 50 states. But including archery in so many recent films has encouraged the masses to get involved with programs that have long been in place. That's good for the sport. "This has been the national shot in the arm that we've needed," said NFAA president Bruce Cull, "because it's just perpetuated things. The support is already there through organizations like us and USA Archery. Now, (kids) can revert back to those coaches and teachers and people who are already there to help them."
