Teens may join our newly formed summer reading book club. The summer reading programs at the library are free of charge with a few exceptions.

YRAA PILOT TRAINING SCHOLARSHIP

The Yankton Regional Aviation Association (YRAA) announces the opening for applications for the YRAA Pilot Training Scholarship. The \$750 scholarship was established in 2005 and is one way the 105 members of the YRAA promote general aviation in southeastern South Dakota and northeastern Nebraska.

The scholarship will be given to a "wannabe student" pilot or student pilot. Past scholarships have gone to people in Bloomfield, Neb.; Laurel, Neb.; Vermillion and Yankton.

The applicant must be at least 16 years old. Applicants who have soloed will be given priority consideration.

The applicant must complete the "YRAA Pilot Training Scholarship Application," sign it, and submit it to YRAA Secretary by Aug. 1. (YRAA Secretary Steve Hamilton, 303 Golf Lane, Yankton, SD 57078). If the applicant is less than 18 years old, the applicant's parent or guardian must sign the application.

The applicant must write a letter stating why they deserve the YRAA Pilot Training Scholarship, sign the letter, and submit it to the YRAA Secretary. The letter should describe the applicant's interest in aviation and future plans after achieving their pilot's license. The letter should also include accomplishments of the applicant as they apply to aviation such as Young Eagles flight, ACE Camp participation, aviation education program participation, Scouting aviation merit badge, or membership in aviation clubs or organizations such as AOPA, EAA, Civil Air Patrol, etc.

The applicant is encouraged to

have people submit letters of recommendation.

The selectee must pass a Third Class Physical Examination conducted by an Aviation Medical Examiner, at the applicant's expense, before receiving scholarship funds.

The funds are to be used as follows: \$150 paid after the selectee passes the written knowledge test, \$250 paid after the selectee solos, \$250 paid after the selectee passes the check ride, and \$100 paid after the selectee writes and submits a one-page story about their flight training (these amounts will be adjusted if the selectee has achieved one of the milestones before receiving the scholarship).

The scholarship funds must be expended within 24 months of the time of the award.

The training must be conducted at a Yankton area regional airport: Bloomfield, Creighton, Hartington, Parkston, Springfield, Wagner, Wayne, Vermillion, or Yankton.

A copy of the written knowledge test results, logbook solo endorsement, and logbook check ride endorsement should be mailed to the YRAA Treasurer as the training progresses. The YRAA will pay up to a total of \$650. The final \$100 will be paid after the scholarship selectee provides a 1-page typed summary / story about their training experience (total \$750) (see criteria #10).

The scholarship selectee shall report in a 1-page typed summary/story to the YRAA newsletter editor about their training experience within 2 years after receiving the award.

I took my van in for an oil change, wiper blades and general inspection. When the hood was raised, I discovered that some animal, probably a squirrel, had built a large nest next to the engine. Dried leaves, weeds, grass and stems sat next to the pulleys and belts. The mechanic completed the service and suggested that the brake and transmission fluids also should be changed, and that I needed a new battery and tires. I opted to wait till a later time. When I got the van home, I saw that all of the nesting material was still there. I would think that a decent mechanic would have taken the two minutes necessary to remove the foreign materials! Am I mistaken in expecting that much help? — Sam

TOM: No, you're not mistaken, Sam. He should've removed the nest. We put on a pair of gloves or get out the Shop-Vac, and do it all the time for our customers.

RAY: I suppose he may have been afraid to remove it. He may fear contracting hantavirus. Or he may have been opposed to removing it on humane grounds. He may believe that it's inappropriate to foreclose on a mouse's house without due process of law.

TOM: But even in that case, it would have been decent of him to let you know that he didn't remove it. Because someone should remove it. After all, twigs can get wedged between a drive belt and a pulley, and knock off a belt or get caught in your fan blower. Or, in a worst-case scenario, dried leaves and grasses can catch fire.

RAY: Of course, since you saw it there, too, you could simply have asked him if he would mind removing it for you, rather than assuming

he would. And then you could have thanked him for it, and everybody would have been happy.

TOM: After all, you did pay for an oil and filter change, not an oil and filter change, plus vermin removal.

RAY: It's something we do for customers, Sam. But since this guy didn't do it for you, you need to remove it yourself, or find someone who will. And by the way, if you can see nesting materials in the engine, there's probably more inside the air-filter housing, so be sure to clean that out, too.

South Dakota Commission On Child Support To Hold Hearings This Summer

PIERRE — The Governor's Commission on Child Support will conduct public hearings this summer to gather input on potential changes to South Dakota's child-support guidelines and related statutes.

The commission is conducting its required four-year review of South Dakota's child-support guidelines and is comprised of representatives of custodial and non-custodial parents, family law attorneys, the Judiciary, Legislature, and Department of Social Services. The commission may recommend changes that reflect adjustments in the costs of raising children, paternity establishment and disestablishment processes and presumptions, and other issues with related statutes. The commission will submit its report and recommendations to Gov. Dennis Daugaard by Dec. 31, 2012, to be considered during the 2013 legislative session.

In the Pierre area, members of the public can attend the hearing at 6-8 p.m. Monday, June 11, in Conference Room 3, located on the first floor of the Kneip Building, 700 Governors Drive. Members of the public from the Aberdeen area are invited to take part in the Commission on Child Support hearing by going to the Dakota Digital Network (DDN) Studio at Northern State University, in Room 117 of the Library Building, 1200 South Jay Street.

Public hearings will also be held on Monday, July 2, (6-8 p.m. MDT) in the Lincoln Room at the Ramkota Hotel, 2111 N. LaCrosse Street, Rapid City, and Monday, Aug. 13, (6-8 p.m.) in the Palisades rooms 1 & 2 at the Holiday

Inn City Centre, 100 W. 8th Street, Sioux Falls.

The hearings are not intended for specific comments or to address complaints involving individual child-support cases or visitation. Discussions during the public hearings will be limited to potential changes to the child-support guidelines and statutes.

Written comments or suggestions may also be submitted for consideration by the full commission by mailing them to the Department of Social Services, Attn: Child Support Commission, 700 Governors Drive, Pierre, SD 57501-2291 or by e-mailing DCS@state.sd.us.

South Dakota Boys State Held In Aberdeen

WATERTOWN — The 398 high school boys between their junior and senior years, who were delegates to the 70th Annual Session of The American Legion Boys State of South Dakota held their general election for state officers on Thursday, May 31. The candidates for governor and lieutenant governor of both parties, Nationalist and Federalist, were subjected to questions during mid-morning assembly in the Johnson Fine Arts Center on the campus of Northern State University. All delegates returned to their respective cities prior to lunch to cast their ballots.

After lunch, election results were announced by Boys State Executive Officer Todd Otterberg of Spearfish.

Ty Wiley of Sioux Falls, who will be a senior this year at Sioux Falls Washington High School, was elected as Governor.

Elected as Lt. Governor was Dustin Johnson of Brandon Valley High School.

John Sluneka of Sioux Falls and Mitchell Keena also of Sioux Falls were selected as the two delegates to represent South Dakota at The American Legion Boys Nation in Washington, D.C. in July. David Strain of Sturgis and Micah Robideaux of Rapid City were selected as Alternates for Sluneka and Keena, respectively.

Adrian Del Grosso of Huron was selected as the 2012 recipient of the Samsung, American Legion Scholarship of \$1,000. Del Grosso is now a national finalist and is eligible and entered into competition for an additional scholarship from The American Legion.

Other election results were Dylan Top of Sioux Falls for Attorney General; Stetson Heirigs of Aberdeen for Secretary of State; Brady Jones of Spearfish as State Auditor; Brady Daly of Sioux Falls as State Treasurer; Zachary Christy of Belle Fourche as Commissioner of School and Public Lands. Benson of Sioux Falls.

In non-political elections, the delegates also elected six justices to serve on the Supreme Court. Adrian Del Grosso of Huron was subsequently selected as the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

Ryder Wilson of Wall High School was selected as the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Adam Bierstedt of Sioux Falls was selected as the Nationalist Party Chairman and Dustin Johnson of Brandon Valley High School was the Nationalist Party Keynote Speaker. The Federalist Party chose Joseph Williams of Rapid City as their Party Chairman and Jack Seitz of Aberdeen as their Keynote Speaker.

Dustin Johnson of Brandon Valley High School captured the honors of Outstanding Speaker. Kyle Ortmeier of Faulkton was selected as the Outstanding Boys State Citizen.

The Chandler L. Beach Memorial Scholarship, which recognizes the Boys State Delegate who best exemplifies the purpose of American Legion Boys State of South Dakota, was awarded to Tanner Comp of Sioux Falls.

Nathan Ellenbecker of Pierre was selected as the Editor of the Boys State Daily Newspaper, the Sunshine Scribe and also was the Walter S. Travis Memorial Scholarship winner.

American Legion Boys State of South Dakota was held on the campus of Northern State University in Aberdeen, May 28-June 1 under the direction of Boys State Director Eugene Opbroek of Pickstown.
